Prayer by the Rev. Dr. Wood of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

### STATE OF MAINE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT AUGUSTA

### February 10, 1941

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

I am transmitting to you herewith a summary statement of the financial standing of the State of Maine as of December 31, 1940.

This statement was prepared by the State Controller, reviewed by the State Commissioner of Finance, and checked by the State Auditor. Their letters of transmittal to me accompany this report.

accompany this report. In place of the estimated overdraft of \$438,513.34 shown for this fiscal year in the budget document recently submitted, the present report indicates an ovedraft of \$703,-613.00.

Of this increase of \$265,099.66 in estimated overdraft, \$200,000 is accounted for in the State Pauper Support Account. There was originally estimated in the Budget Report a \$300,000 overdraft in this account to provide necessary funds to take care of all bills that would be presented for payment up to the close of the fiscal year, June 30, 1941. Subsequent to making up the Budget Report, a great number of old bills, representing in some instances obligations incurred during the previous fiscal year, were presented to the Controller for payment.

This situation has resulted in the State Controller and Budget Officer recommending that the method of accounting as regards payment of State Pauper bills be changed from a cash basis, as provided in the Budget, to an accural basis. This new method of accounting will reflect a correct picture of the actual yearly costs of the Department by making the appropriation for the fiscal year provide for the bills incurred during the fiscal year. The anticipated overdraft of

overdraft of \$29,000 in the Bureau of Accounts and Control does not represent any expenditure additional of State Funds as a whole, but corrects a practice whereby in past years the Highway Funds have been charged a greater proportion of the total costs of this Department than the actual services rendered could justify. Therefore, in order to correct this situation, a greater charge should be levied against the General Funds of the State, and a cor-respondingly lesser charge made against Highway Funds. By doing this, each branch of our Govern-ment will reflect its true cost.

Although the balance sheet as of December 31, 1940, shows cash on deposit of \$3,903,321.64, this amount, together with other receivables, is obligated to meet known outstanding obligations of the State, as of December 31, 1940.

Mr. Fenlason then offered House Amendment "A" and moved its adoption.

House Amendment "A" to H. P. 869, L. D. 302, Resolve in favor of Horace Polchies, Representative of the Penobscot Tribe of Indians. Amend said Resolve by striking

out from the third line thereof the "\$100.00" and inserting in figure place thereof the figure \$200.00.

Mr. McGlauflin of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I am still in favor of the Indian receiving at least two hundred dollars.

I note on Page 3 of this morning's Kennebec Journal that we pay at least sixteen different men in this State a sum exceeding one hundred dollars a week, and there are an innumerable number of men who get above seventy-five dollars a week, and yet this House is stag-gered when it comes to paying an Indian the sum of two hundred dollars.

Mr. MURCHIE: Mr. Speaker,

Eighty-three having voted in the affirmative and 52 in the nega-tive, the motion prevailed and House Amendment "A" was adopted and the resolve as amended was assigned for second reading on the next legislative day.

The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, under the Constitution, it requires the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of this House. All those in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and stand in their places until counted and the monitors have made and returned the count.

A division of the House was had. One hundred and thirty-four having voted in the affirmative and none in the negative, 134 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.
