HOUSE

Friday, February 21, 1941.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. Cunningham of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

From the Senate: The following Communication: (S. P. 462)

MAINE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

February 19, 1941.

To the Honorable Members of the 90th Legislature:

I have a communication dated February 14th from the Senate with the House concurring, directing me to furnish the Legislature a statement of all receipts and all dis-bursements of the Maine Development Commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1940.

From the Senate: The following Order

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Clerk of the House prepare each week for the use of the Legislature a cumulative index of all bills and resolves introduced during the session showing precisely the important steps in the consideration of each and its final disposition or thereof be printed, and one copy thereof be laid upon the desk of each member of the Legislature (S. P. 465)

Came from the Senate, read and passed.

In the House:

Mr. Pratt of Turner, offered House Amendment "A" and moved its adoption.

House Amendment "A" to Joint Order relative to Cumulative Index. (S. P. 465)

Amend said Order by striking out the following words after the word "concurring" in the first line there-of: "that the Clerk of the House prepare" and inserting in place place "that thereof the following words: there be prepared under the direc-tion of the Clerk of the House"

And further amend said Order by adding at the end thereof the following sentence:

"The Clerk of the House is here-by authorized, with the approval of the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs, to employ all the necessary clerical assistance to prepare such weekly cumulative index."

Thereupon, House Amendment "A" was adopted.

Mr. PAYSON of Portland: \mathbf{Mr} Speaker, I move the indefinite postponement of the order as amended. In support of my motion I wish to make this explanation to the House:

We have gone through this formality of amending the order so that it may be in proper form if you decide that you want this index. It is not for me to determine whether you want it or not, and this amendment was necessary if you do want it.

This index would cost the State about six thousand dollars to prepare and present to you for the re-mainder of the session. The informaticn that is contained in that index you can find by going into the office of the Clerk at any time, and unless you are carrying a load of innumerable bills, that is not too much to ask to save six thousand dollars, in my opinion.

A simpler index, not cumulative, but gotten up just once, can be pro-vided for about six or seven hundred dollars. The index that I now speak of, perhaps if it were gotten out sometime next week, would show you every bill introduced, its docket number, the name of the sponsor formed and what had happened to the bill up to the time the index was gotten out. After that you would have to keep track of the bill yourself. It is my opinion that six thousand dollars is too much to pay for this cumulative index which is asked for here where the information is so easily available in the office of the Clerk at any time.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. Payson, moves that the order as amended be in-definitely postponed. Is the House ready for the question? As many as are in favor of the indefinite postponement of the order as amended

will say aye; those opposed no. A viva voce vote being taken, the motion prevailed and the order as amended was indefinitely postponed in non-concurrence and sent up for concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The Clerk has in his possession an additional paper from the Senate, which does not appear upon the printed calendar.

From the Senate: The following Order:

I wish to thank Mr. Williams for his very kind remarks and the House for the action taken this morning in giving me leave of absence.

I do not know how many of you legislators had the experience I had during my campaign for this seat. The remarks made about the Leg-islature in general—I am not speaking of my constituents in Bangor and the eastern part of the State were not always too complimentary to the Legislature. I got some ideas that I have been obliged to change. In fact, I didn't have those ideas, but some people have those ideas. I have found this Legislature, in my experience, is a pretty good cross-section of the State of Maine and a pretty good argument for democ-

It has been my privilege here to renew some old friendships and renew some old friendships and make some new ones. I have enjoyed serving here very much. I leave here with a very deep appre-ciation of the problems before this Legislature and also appreciation of the time and thought and hard work which the members of this Legislature are putting in and I am very sorry I cannot be here to finish the term. (Applause)

On motion by Mrs. Grady of Whitefield, the House voted to take from the table the fourth tabled and unassigned matter, Bill "An Act Relating to Nursery Stc.k" (H. P. 1568) (L. D. 923), tabled by that member on February 19th, pending reference.

Mrs. GRADY: Mr. Speaker, now ask leave to withdraw this bill because the provisions of this bill are taken care of in another bill. The SPEAKER: The gentlewo-

man from Whitefield Mrs. Grady, asks leave to withdraw this bill. Is it the pleasure of the House that leave to withdraw be granted?

The motion prevailed, and the bill was withdrawn, and sent up for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Dutton of Bingham, the House voted to take from the table the third tabled and unassigned matter, Bill "An Act Relating to Sunday Moving Pictures," (H. P. 5) (L. D. 4) tabled by that gentleman on February 18th, pending assignment for third reading.

Thereupon the bill was assigned for third reading on the next legislative day.

On motion by Mr. Payson of Portland, the House voted to take from the table the seventh tabled and unassigned matter, Joint Order Relative to Controller furnishing List of Salary adjustments for October, November and first half of Decem-ber, 1940, (H. P. 1605) tabled by that gentleman on Feb. 19th, pending passage.

Mr. PAYSON: Mr. Speaker, I ta-bled this matter because I thought that possibly the information re-quired in it was contained in the report of the Investigating Com-mittee. I find that the sponsor of the order desires more defailed in-

formation, so I take it from the ta-ble so that it may be passed. The SPEAKER: Is it the pleasure of the House that the order receive passage?

The motion prevailed and the or-der received passage and was sent up for concurrence.
