STATE MILITARY DEFENSE COMMISSION

ture House of Representatives Gentlemen:

As requested in your Order of January 13, 1942, I wish to report that we now have available for the of the Private and Special Laws of 1939, an unallotted balance, all of which is reserved for contingencies for projects that have been undertaken, amounting to \$140,805.61. In addition, we do have several

projects for which allotments and commitments have been made but on which construction has started. This figure amounts not to \$266,070.08.
