Thursday, February 6, 1941.

STATE OF MAINE Department of Health and Welfare Augusta

February 4, 1941.

To The Honorable Senate and The House of Representatives Gentlemen:--

In accordance with your request dated October 22, 1940, the Department of Health and Welfare submitted a report of its investigations of the Androscoggin River. report shows pollution to the extent that it is evident that some steps should be taken to remedy the situation. We hereby submit suggestions for remedial legislation concerning the conditions found in the Androscoggin River:

It is recommended that suitable legislation be enacted setting up a Sanitary Water Board consisting of the Commissioner of Health and

Welfare, Commissioner of Agriculture, Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game, Chairman of the Public Utilities Commission, a representative of the manufacturing interests of the State, and a municipal official to represent the municipalities of the State, who should serve without additional remuneration.

The members, representing anufacturing interests of the manufacturing the State and the municipalities, should be appointed by the Governor to hold office for a term of years, to serve without pay except necessary

travel expense.

It is recommended that the Director of the Bureau of Health serve as Secretary Ex Officio of the Board. He should receive no additional compensation but should, during the interim between meetings of the Board, handle correspondence, cause such investigations to be made and such reports and data assembled as the Board may authorize.

Powers and Duties of the Board. The Board should be authorized to study, investigate, and determine ways and means of eliminating such pollution as may be defined in the Act, from the inland waters

of the State;
To require submission of plans and specifications for and securing of permits from the board before construction of any new sewerage or waste disposal systems covered by the Act;

To require owners of sewerage systems to submit such plans as may be required, and to make rules and regulations such as may be necessary for the review of all plans and the manner of submitting

To order discontinued discharge of sewage or waste when, after investigation and hearing, the Board decides that such discharge of sew-age or waste is contrary to public

health or welfare;
To cooperate with any neigh-

boring state for the purpose of carrying out the intent of law, with respect to waters that run through

both states;
To make use of such assistance for investigations, surveys and re-view of plans as existing State Departments may be able to render;

To revoke or modify permits granted under this Act, when in the opinion of the Board it appears necessary to abate or prevent pollution, after due hearing of the in-

terested parties.
Provision should be made for authorization by the Governor and Council for additional necessary expenditures not included in regular departmental budgets, to carry out the purposes of this report or any legislation arising therefrom.

To provide for the repeal of any part of Section 13 of Chapter 62 of the Revised Statutes or of any other act or statute inconsistent with these recommendations or any legislation arising therefrom.
