Mr. Payson of Portland presented the following Order and moved its passage:

ORDERED, that the House Lockers in the retiring room be fixed in their present locations.

Mr. PAYSON: Mr. Speaker, this order may require some explanation. There is one set of lockers in the House Retiring Room that seem to be movable.
