Mr. Sweetser of Cumberland was granted unanimous consent to address the House.

Mr. SWEETSER: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: This is another "Apple Week." For some seven years we have had in this state a statewide committee, made up of various apple growers and members of the Pomological Society. The Commissioner of Agriculture has been Chairman of that committee. The purpose has been to find a better market for their fruit. Some years this campaign has been quite extensive; we have had street parades: we have had the election of an Apple Queen; and, on one occasion our representative, dressed in the costume of "Apple Annie" went so far as the State House in Boston, and there we discussed the matter of the apple market with the Governor.

War conditions, of course, have eliminated this fanfare that we have done so well with in the past years, and in the past two or three years we have devoted our atten-tion primarily to publicity through the press and cooperation with the various wholesale and retail grocers

throughout the state

For the comparatively small funds that have been expended, the work of the committee has yielded a most satisfactory result in increasing the demand for apples, both by the consumer and by the distributors who

ship outside the state.

The apples placed on your desks today are there through the efforts of this committee and constitute one more step in trying to give favorable publicity to an industry that represents a crop this year of almost a million bushels of fruit which is known to be the finest for health and happiness. Our slogan, which you will see in the grocery windows everywhere in the state, is: "Maine Apples on Parade." (Applause)

The SPEAKER: I am sure the members of the House will enjoy the apples and that they also have enjoyed the remarks made by the

gentleman.
