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SENATE

Tuesday, February 13, 1945.

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Reverend Cymbrid Hughes of Augusta.

Mr. CLEAVES of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move that the majority report "Ought to Pass" be accepted.

Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would like to speak for a moment on the highlights of this bill.

We are advocating in this recreation bill that this State of Maine take leadership in a new and vital field of human activity, a field that is still in its infancy and one that is rapidly challenging the best thoughts and minds of the business, social and public minded leaders of our country. This bill was not presented for your consideration until an exhaustive study had been made as to its ideals, its needs and its demands by local communities.

We propose that a State Recreation Division be set up headed by a paid director and five non-paid representative citizens, appointed by the Governor and Council as an advisory committee, this paid director to be a professionally trained man in this field of activity. If leadership and advice is not provided on the State level, many local recreation programs will doubtless disintegrate and those that are in the process of organization will be unable to procure the help which will be so valuable in the initial phases of planning. The State Recreation Division would provide advisory service and technical assistance on recreational problems upon request, to towns, cities, counties and areas within the State in the best traditions of preserving local autonomy, initiative and responsibility.

The local recreation committees would include representatives from the school, the church, the mill, management and labor, and the business men of the town. Although the greater part of the recreational activities of a town might be arranged to promote the welfare of the younger generation, it would have a wider application than school programs as we ordinarily think of them. These programs gather into their fold the young people in school, those that are in the dangerous age between twenty and thirty, the returning veterans and, last but not least, the fathers and mothers.

At this point, I want to bring to you the fact that sixty towns in this State of Maine already have established local recreation committees. Thirty towns have applied for assistance in establishing for themselves an intelligent plan of recreation. There is no question in my mind that in the event of the passage of this bill that this number w_{11} be quadrupled within a period of thirty days.

of thirty days. We are not asking this state to pay out \$15,000.00 on an item that is non-productive and merely a financial outlay. We are asking them to invest \$15,000.00 in a proposition that will bring the finest dividends in return of any that we know.

You, as business and professional men, do not have to stretch your imagination one iota to visualize the tremendous impetus that this will give in its cooperation with the Maine Publicity Bureau, the Maine Development Commission and your Chambers of Commerce in promoting Maine as Vacationland and Maine as the ideal spot for industrial expansion.

The scope of this bill is so farreaching that it is a challenge to our imagination in listing the beneficial results to this state. As the home is the hearth of our nation, so is community recreation the fundamental spark plug of local spirit, pride, coordination and teamwork of the community. Each integral community added to another forms what we know as the State of Maine, and the progress, development and success in each community must ultimately crystallize and reincarnate our Maine State Motto "Dirizo".

I hope that the majority report "Ought to Pass" will prevail. The PRESIDENT: The question

I confess that this is a matter which I have not been able to study into up to the present time and in view of the vast scope which this is going to take in, according to the words of the Senator from Cumberland, I move that this be laid upon the table pending acceptance of either report.
