All his life he was a crusader and we do not think of him as dead and gone for no mere incident like bodily death will hinder the prog-ress of that indomitable spirit onward and upward forever. We thank God for him and we pray for the people he loved.

In these days of crisis may we be wisely led. May Thy servant, the new President, seek first Thy king-dom and his righteousness. May he be a learner in the school of the holy spirit. Deliver us from fear and despond-

ency concerning the future. Abraham Lincoln died but the republic lived. Woodrow Wilson died but America went on. Franklin Delano Roosevelt has left us for higher spheres of service. Thou dost bury the workman but Thou dost carry on the work.
