Mr. Campbell from the Committee on Salaries and Fees on Bill "An Act Adjusting the Salaries of All Full-time State Employees" (H. P. 73) (L. D. 53) reported "Ought to pass" as amended by Committee Amendments "A". "B" and "C".

Report was read accepted and the Bill, having already been printed, was read twice under suspension of the rules.

Committee Amendment "A" was read by the Clerk as follows:

Committee Amendment "A" to H. P. 73, L. D. 53, Bill "An Act Adjusting the Salaries of All Full-Time State Employees."

Amend said Bill by striking out the figures "\$300,000" in the 3rd line of Section 3 thereof and inserting in place thereof the figures '\$317,000.'

Further amend said Bill by adding at the end of Section 3 thereof

the following:

'In allocating this appropriation to the various departments, the allocation for the bureau of health of the department of health and welfare shall be based on total number of full-time state employees of the bureau of health regardless of appropriation fund from which paid.'

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bucksport, Mr. Sargent.
Mr. SARGENT: I move that the

bill lie on the table.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Bucksport, Mr. Sargent, moves that this bill, with accompanying papers, lie on the table pending assignment for third reading.

(Cries of No, No)

The SPEAKER: All those in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Bucksport, Mr. Sargent, that the bill, with accompanying papers, lie on the table pending assignment for third reading will rise and remain standing until the monitors have made and returned their count.

A division of the House was had. The SPEAKER. One having voted in the affirmative and fifty-four in the negative, the motion to table does not prevail.

Is it now the pleasure of the House that the rules be suspended and the bill be given its third read-

ing at this time?

Mr. Mills of Farmington: Mr. Speaker, may I speak on this motion?

The SPEAKER: The question of suspending the rules at this time is not debatable. Is it the pleasure of the House that the rules be suspended and the bill be given its third reading at this time?

Thereupon the bill was given its

third reading

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Farmington, Mr. Mills.

Mr. MILLS: Mr. Speaker, if there is any question at all about this bill, think that these amendments should be properly gone over and that we should take time to consider them now.

The reason that we hoped to defeat the motion to table the bill was because it is very imperative that it go through and be enacted promptly to prevent a decrease in State employees' salaries on the 5th day of February. It is not with any thought of cramming anything through in a hurry except that hurry seems to be very necessary in this instance.

I want to take up these amendments one by one, so there will not be any confusion about them. They are already in the bill now, of course, but, at the same time, I want them properly understood.

Committee Amendment "A" raises seventeen thousand dollars more than was originally appropriated. It also makes a change in that the State employees shall be counted no matter from what funds they may be paid, and the reason for that is that in the Department of Health & Welfare there are, I think, 122 employees who are paid from Fed-

Now last summer when this original bill, this cost of living increase. was passed, it was not necessary for this extra seventeen thousand dol-lars, because Federal funds were lars, available at that time to give them that cost of living increase. But at

this time, if this bill went through Committee Amendment without "A", there would be some 122 State employees who happen to be paid from Federal funds who would not get the increase. It is not an in-crease; it is a continuance of the present status; in other words, their pay would not be increased \$7.20 next week. That is merely to make it uniform for all State employees and to make sure that some 122 of them do not get a cut next week.

Committee Amendment "B" is for this purpose: The appropriation under the bill runs only to the end of the present fiscal year, to the last day of June of this year, but the salary provisions in it run ad infinitem. They would just go on and there would be no money to pay them. It was the feeling of the committee—I am not a member of the committee, but I was present there, and I think they expressed it so I can pass it on to you—it was the feeling of the committee that the matter should terminate completely at the end of the fiscal year and that the Legislature should speak through another measure in regard to the future beyond the fiscal year. That is the point in Committee Amendment "B." It brings the whole thing to the end, not only the appropriations but the other provisions of the bill. It is the intention, I understand, of some members of the Legislature to see that a continuing bill is presented in another form, this being merely a stop-gap measure to take care of the emergency.

Committee Amendment "C" is the State Police provision. There was some question about the interpretation of the bill as it was drawn in that it might include the Deputy Chief and the Chief of the State Police, inasmuch as they now have commissions as a Major and a Colonel. This amendment would make sure that they are excepted, because they are taken care of by the Governor and Council. This was suggested and recommended by the Chief of the State Police. and it is merely a routine clarification amendment.

I hope that is a satisfactory explanation. If there are any questions, do not hesitate to ask them. We want to be sure that we have our two-thirds vote when this matter comes up in a short time this morning.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bucksport, Mr. Sargent.

Mr. SARGENT: Mr. Speaker, I rise to a point of personal privilege.
The SPEAKER: The gentleman may state his point of personal privilege.

Mr. SARGENT: I wish for an opportunity to explain the motion which I made to table this bill.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman

Mr. SARGENT: Mr. Speaker, I
had hoped that the House would extend me the usual courtesy of allowing this bill to be tabled over the week-end, because there are certain employees of the State whom I have found do not come under this classification of classified em-ployees, and I had hoped to have the opportunity to prepare a further amendment to be put on this bill which would take care of a point which I think should be taken care of.

The SPEAKER: The question before the House is on the passage of the bill to be engrossed. Is it now the pleasure of the House that the bill be passed to be engrossed as amended?

The motion prevailed and the bill was passed to be engrossed as amended.

On motion by Mr. Mills, it was ordered that the bill be sent forthwith to the Senate.

The SPEAKER: The House may be at ease pending the sound of the gavel.

### House at Ease

Called to order by the Speaker.

The SPEAKER: Is it now the pleasure of the House to take up out of order a bill on its passage to be enacted?

An Act Adjusting the Salaries of All Full-time State Employees (H. P. 73) (L. D. 53).

The SPEAKER: This Bill, having had its three several readings in the House, and having been passed to be engrossed, and having had its two several readings in the Senate, and having been passed to be engrossed, and the Committee on Engrossed Bills having reported that it is truly and strictly engrossed, it now the pleasure of the House that it be passed to be enacted?

This being an emergency measure, under our Constitution it requires the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lewiston, Mr. Jalbert.

Mr. JALBERT: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: Very briefly, on this bill, may I state that last summer the intention was not originally an increase but rather an adjustment of salaries. The particular bill being rushed through today is not justly in the category of an increase. If it were not passed, next Wednesday every State employee would be without that adjustment that was granted to him.

I thought I would bring out that point, knowing that perhaps all members did not fully understand it.

In regard to those employees that were left out, as the gentleman from Bucksport, Mr. Sargent, brought out, the same thought occurred to me. I believe one of the superintendents of the Highway Commission told me that some of these field employees were those who were part-time, not classified, and, consequently, they would not come in on the full amount of this adjustment. I merely bring out this point.

The SPEAKER: All those in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will please rise and remain standing until the monitors have made and returned their count.

A division was had.

The SPEAKER: One hundred and twenty having voted in the affirmative and none in the negative, and 120 obviously being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill is passed to be enacted. It will be signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Mills, the bill was ordered sent forthwith to the Senate.
