The Honorable Speaker of the House Ninety-third Legislature.

Dear Sirs:

I deem it a pleasure to transmit herewith a letter from the Honorable Percival P. Baxter of Portland in which he offers an additional 10,740 acres of land in the Katahdin Baxter State Park area for public purposes.

This generous gift, if accepted by the 93rd Legislature, would increase the area of the Baxter State Park, which includes Mount Katahdin, to 127,028 acres.

Mr. Baxter's offer commands the deepest appreciation of every citizen of Maine, for he is making available to us and our children and the thousands of tourists who visit Maine each year one of the most magnificent natural recreational areas in the United States.

I solicit your most serious consideration and urge the acceptance of this gift, under the same terms and conditions as the previous ones, as being in the public interest.

Communication

To the Honorable Horace A. Hildreth, Governor and the Honor-able Senate and House of Representatives of the Ninety-third Legislature:

"Beginning in 1931 I have come to several Maine Legislatures offering gifts of land to the State of Maine in Trust, and I now come to you to offer another gift, this one

of ten thousand seven hundred added to BAXTER STATE PARK in the Mount Katahdin region.

Up to the present time I have donated to the State one hundred sixteen thousand two hundred eighty-eight (116,288) acres and the additional acreage which I now bring to you will increase the total area of the park to one hundred twenty-seven thousand twenty-eight (127,028) acres, or approximately five and one-half $(5\frac{1}{2})$ Maine Wild Land townships.

In order that there may be a complete and accurate record of my gifts to the state over the years, I am including in the Act of Acceptance a list of the gifts in detail so that in the years to come this will be available to those who may be interested to have the record spread before them. Those of the members of this Ninety-third Legislature who have served in previous Legislatures, no doubt are familiar with the procedure adopted in connection with these Gifts.

The land that is now being do-nated to the State is my most re-When you accept cent purchase. this gift I then shall have donated to the state all the land in the Katahdin area that I have acquired since I began my project in 1917. one hundred twenty-seven This (127.028) thousand twenty-eight acres is a continuous unbroken area except for the fact that in the southwestern corner there is still out-standing an undivided ownership of six thousand seventeen (6,017) acres which I have not yet acquired and which is not included in the total of one hundred twenty-seven thousand twenty eight (127,028) acres.

I am still interested to enlarge the area of the Park and shall do so from time to time as additional purchases are made.

The conditions placed in the Act of Acceptance are the same as those in former Deeds of Gift. It now is just thirty (30) years since in just thirty (30) years since in 1917 I first conceived the project of donating to the State of Maine a large area of land for public park and recreational purposes. I shall be pleased if you will accept this gift in the spirit in which it is offered.

"Resolve in Favor of the Town of Palermo." (S. P.) Mr. CROSS of Kennebec: Mr. President and members of the Senate, the action I am about to take upon this Resolve I would like to explain to you in a few words. Most of you are familiar with the situation—I don't think I need to go into it very thoroughly—regarding the so-called Special Resolves. This particular resolve is a hold-over, I believe, from the last Special Session and merely illustrates what will face us as time goes on. We passed, and most of you here had the priv-ilege of voting either for or against it, an act which I introduced at the last session of the legislature setting up a substitute plan for the equitable distribution for unimproved roads. more of money Ι don't think there is any contention that we wish to muzzle any proper resolves for that purpose. It was the intent to substitute a better plan and one which would not be so open to abuse as the so-called blanket road resolves.

Now there will be, I anticipate, an attempt to, shall we say, have their cake and eat it too by certain members of the legislature and they will attempt to continue to have the so-called blanket. I have no inten-tion of assuming the attitude that I know more than the rest of the legislature in regard to that problem. My only intention is, for the moment at least, to see that these things are held until such time as we have heard from the Governor in his budget message and see what action he will take in that message to set up any funds for that purpose, what action he will take by recommending funds for the so-called Cross bill, and after that time arrives, I will take further action to the best of my ability on these resolves. these resolves. But for the moment I will ask your indulgence on a motion, Mr. President, that this re-solve be laid upon the table.

Thereupon, the resolve was laid upon the table pending reference to a committee.
