#### SENATE

#### Thursday, January 9, 1947.

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Reverend Merle Golding of Augusta.

Journal of vesterday read and approved.

ORDERED, the House concurring, that when the Senate and House adjourn, they adjourn to meet on Tuesday, January 14, 1947, at 4.30 o'clock in the afternoon. (S. P. 38) Sent down for concurrence.

Mr. BARNES of Aroostook; Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent of the members to address the Senate

Mr. BARNES: Mr. President and members of the Senate, a word of explanation is due as to the small packages you see on your desks this morning. During the war the Featherweight Products Company of Fort Kent was making dehydrated potatoes which were wholly taken up by the armed forces. We up in Aroostook are always trying to find different ways to merchandise our one product, and dehydrated potaone product, and dehydrated pota-toes didn't seem to be going too well. One day one of the girls in the firm took some of these dehy-drated potatoes, mixed them with dough and water, cut them up into bits, threw them into deep fat and fried them. The resulting product, in my opinion, is good and that is the product here. I hope the mem-hers of the Senate will enjoy them bers of the Senate will enjoy them.

#### Orders

On motion by Mr. Cross of Kennebec, it was

ORDERED, the House concurring, that no bill for private or special legislation be received by this legislature after twelve o'clock noon, of Wednesday, January 29th, 1947, and that no other bill or resolve be received by this legislature after twelve o'clock, noon, of Wednesday, February 5th, 1947, except by unani-mous consent in the body in which it is introduced, and it was further

ORDERED, that any bill or re-solve which shall be received in either body of this Legislature by unanimous consent, after the times above set, shall stand referred to the Ninety-fourth Legislature if unanimous consent for its reception is not given in the other body in concurrence. This order shall not apply to bills reported by any joint standing or joint select committee, in the regular course of business nor to such bills and resolves as are intended only to facilitate the busi-ness of the Ninety-third Legisla-ture; and it was further

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate cause a copy of this order to be published in all the daily and weekly papers of the State, commencing January 21st, 1947, and continuing up to and in-cluding February 5th, 1947. (S. P. 48)

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the foregoing order was returned from the House, having been read and passed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Haskell of Penobscot, it was

ORDERED, that a message be sent to the House of Representatives proposing a convention of both branches of the Legislature to be held forthwith in the Hall of the House for the purpose of extending to his Excellency, Governor HOR-ACE HILDRETH, an invitation to attend the Convention and make such communication as pleases him.

The Secretary delivered the message and subsequently reported that he had performed the duty assigned to him.

Subsequently a message was re-ceived from the House by Mr. PEASE, its Clerk, concurring in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of extending an in-vitation to his Excellency, Governor HORACE HILDRETH, to attend the Convention and make such communication as pleases him.

The Senate retired to the Hall of the House of Representatives where a joint Convention was formed.
