Tuesday, January 21, 1947.

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Reverend Tom G.

Akeley of Gardiner. Journal of Thursday, Ja 16th, 1947, read and approved. January

(In the Senate on January 9, 1947, read and passed.)

Comes from the House passed as amended by House Amendment A in non-concurrence.

In the Senate:

Mr. CROSS of Kennebec: Mr. President and members of the Senate, this order as you know is the usual cloture order introduced each session. The dates in the order were practically the same as they have always been and the fact that they seem early to the members of the legislature was only because of the fact that we met this year the first day of January. This type of order is usually put in to expedite matters and to set a deadline that will assist the legislature in operating its own affairs. Inasmuch as this has been amended, I don't see that it would serve any useful purpose to argue the matter and so I move that we recede and concur with the House.

The motion to recede prevailed House Amendment A was read and adopted in concurrence and the Order as amended by House Amendment A was passed in concurrence.
