SENATE

Friday, March 21, 1947.

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Reverend Elmer Colcord of Gardiner.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

On motion by Mr. Cross of Kennebec, out of order and under sus-pension of the rules, it was

We passed the bill out and it has been approved by the Governor and the purpose of this bill is to repeal the one we have passed and to set up a new bill which provides that the salaries shall be paid out of the general funds of the state. of the situation-because it would be very unfortunate for this matter to ride along as it is-that you will give unanimous consent for the introduction of this bill, that we may correct the error.

Comes from the House, received by unanimous consent and referred to the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs.

In the Senate:

Mr. NOYES of Hancock: Mr President and Members of the Senate. Down in Bangor we have an air field known as Dow Field. This field has been a terminal for the Northeast Airlines for some 12 vears or more. The army some few weeks ago decided that the Northeast Airlines could no longer use Dow Field and on last Saturday the final decision came through. Dow Field was no longer available for Northeast Airlines as a term-inal. The bill would provide that the Northeast Airlines use the field in Old Town. The necessity of this legislation is to enable the city of Bangor to spend money in Old Town and this terminal is in an area which will serve approximately 100,000 people. I can see no delay caused by the introduction of this measure and I hope the resolve will be admitted.

Thereupon, the resolve was received by unanimous consent.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, the resolve was laid upon the table pending reference.

Orders

Mr. CROSS of Kennebec: Mr. President and Members of the Senate. I am about to introduce an order on which I would like to make a slight explanation beforehand. This Order is a Senate Order to ask a question of the Supreme Court as to the constitutionality of a pending bill which is be-fore us. This is a bill to issue bonds, under a certain highway article in the Constitution. There have been grave doubts by several members of this Body and members of the other branch of the legislature as to whether or not we can legally issue bonds without going to the people.

As a brief background to this, let me say that the legislature in 1941 did authorize the reissuance of bonds under a previous constitutional amendment and these bonds were issued in the amount of \$700,000. In the last legislative session, the legislature also approved an act which issued, or reissued, three million and some four

hundred thousand dollars. This year there is pending this bill to authorize the reissuance of \$3,358,000 which is very necessary for the matching of federal funds for the next biennium. If we are not able to match these federal funds through a temporary bor-rowing, there will be a very grave situation in the highway depart-ment and major tax revenues or some drastic curtailment of highway activities will be necessary.

Therefore, in order to clear up this situation I have prepared this question to the Supreme Court asking for an interpretation or a ruling from them as to the constitution-ality of the issuance of these highbonds and at the proper time way I will table the bill in question and hold it for an answer from the Court.

Mr. President, I present an Order and moved its passage.

The Order was received and on motion by M^r. Cross of Kennebec, reading of the Order was dispensed with.

Thereupon the Order received a passage.

Mr. HOPKINS: Mr. President, this bill has quite extensive amendments and perhaps by way of explanation I might tell the Senate that the amendments are important in that they take out the provision that requires adjusters to report to the department any fires which it is believed are incendiary. The reason is very simple. The fire adjuster is a private citizen and would be liable if he made false charges against anyone to the State. We have a department of arson here which takes care of that very nicely, so that part is removed by this amendment.

Thereupon, House Amendment "A" to Committee Amendment "A" was adopted in concurrence. Committee Amendment "A" as amended was adopted in concurrence, and the bill as so amended was tomorrow assigned for second reading.
