#### SENATE

Tuesday, March 25, 1947.

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Reverend Charles A. Clough of Augusta.

Journal of Friday, March 21st, 1947, read and approved.

Mr. Leavitt from the Committee on State School for Boys, State School for Girls and State Re-formatories, reports as follows:

The Committee on State School for Boys, State School for Girls and Reformatories have made their bi-annual visitation to these four institutions, namely the State School for Girls at Hallowell, the Women's Reformatory at Skowhethe Men's Reformatory at South Windham and the State School for Boys at South Portland and heg leave to report that they found these institutions in excellent physical condition and the per-

sonnel and superintendents very courteous and efficient. However, we believe that the cost of these institutions is way out of line in comparison to other institutions in the state and the committee recommends that the Governor and Council instigate a thorough study

into these institutions costs.

The Committee also recommends that, as an experiment to see how these farms affect the expense of operations of our state institutions, the farm at Skowhegan be closed except for two or three men for what little truck farming they can do with the girls. We further rec-ommend that Mr. Buzzell of the Department of Animal Industry be authorized to sell the stock and credit the department. We suggest that perhaps it would be well to keep a few pigs to eat up the garbage and that perhaps the farm could be used to advantage in raising 1,000 or more hens.. The Committee recommends that this Institution contract out the hay and sell to the highest bidder.

The Committee further recommends that suggestion to put pas-teurizing plants in the Institutions be turned down and also that the suggestion of the Commissioner suggestion of the Commissioner that the State build a Quonset Hut Gymnasium at the State School for Boys be turned down and that the old gymnasium on the third floor of the administration building be put into condition as soon as funds are available, which can be done for approximately \$10,000 including the fire escape. The Committee also recommends that the cupola be taken off the Administration Building at South Portland as that is only a hazard.

At the Men's Reformatory at South Windham, the Committee recommends that the necessary funds be appropriated to construct rooms needed to isolate certain psychological cases which are interfering with the set program of the Institution.

The Committee wishes to point out that at all institutions there is a great need for books to create a library and knowing that the homes of all Legislators and their friends are cluttered with books which they never intend to look at again, suggests that each Legislator make an effort to send these surplus books to the institution nearest to his or her home in order that these libraries may be built up. Mr. CROSS of Kennebec: Mr. President, may I inquire if there is in the possession of the Senate, Senate Order Relative to Opinion of the Supreme Court on the Constitutionality of Legislative Document No. 1309?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state the order is in the possession

of the Senate.

Upon motion by Mr. Cross of Kennebec, the Senate voted to reconsider its former action whereby the order received passage.

Mr. CROSS: Mr. President, there appears to have been a discrepancy or clerical error in this order relative to one of the Roman numerals and the Supreme Court thinks it should be amended so as to put it in proper form. At a later moment I will also ask to amend the original bill which also has a clerical error. I present Senate Amendment "A' and move its adoption.

The Secretary read Senate Amendment "A": "Senate Amend-ment 'A' to Senate Order Relative to Opinion of Supreme Court on the Constitutionality of Legislative Document 1309. Amend said order by striking out in the twenty-second line thereof the Roman numeral 'IX' and inserting in place thereof the Roman numeral 'LII'."

Thereupon Senate Amendment "A" was adopted and the order as so amended received passage.
