## SENATE

# Friday, April 10, 1953.

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. Marvin Palmerlee of Augusta.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

On motion by Mr. Haskell of Penobscot, out of order and under suspension of the rules, it was

ORDERED, the House concurring, that when the Senate and House adjourn, they adjourn to meet on Tuesday, April 14, 1953 at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the foregoing order was returned from the House, having been read and passed in concurrence.

### Orders of the Day

Mr. DUNHAM of Hancock: Mr. President and members of the Senate, at the request of the Chairman of Sea and Shore Fisheries Committee I would like to introduce an order and move its passage.

Thereupon, out of order and under suspension of the rules, Mr. Dunham of Hancock presented the following order:

ORDERED, the House concurring, that bill "An Act Repealing Law on Canning of Clams and Mussels (H. P. 1112) (L. D. 1247) be recalled from the Legislative files to the Senate for further consideration."

Thereupon the order was adopted and sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Collins of Aroostook, the Senate voted to take from the table, bill An Act relating to the Biennial Revision of Sea and Shore Fisheries Laws (H. P. 151) (L. D. 148) tabled by that Senator on March 12 pending passage to be enacted.

Mr. COLLINS: Mr. President, this act was tabled because at the time it was up for enactment it was our understanding that it took away certain revenues from the State. We now find that that was not the case and I therefore move the pending question.

Thereupon the bill was passed to be enacted.

On motion by Mr. Haskell of Penobscot the Senate voted to take from the table, bill, An Act relating to Salaries and Travel of Superintendents of Schools (H. P. 325) (L. D. 393), tabled by that Senator on April 9, pending first reading.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Dunham of Hancock the bill was given its first reading, Committee Amendment "A" was adopted without reading, the Rules were suspended and the bill as so amended was passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Boucher of Androscoggin the Senate voted to reconsider its former action taken earlier in today's session whereby bill, An Act Amending the Charter of the Municipal Court of the City of Lewiston (H. P. 547) (L. D. 527) was passed to be engrossed, and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was laid upon the table pending passage to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Haskell of Penobscot the Senate voted to take from the table Resolve Providing for the Printing of MAINE POLLEN SURVEY (S. P. 478) (L D. 1333) tabled by that Senator on April 9th pending passage to be engrossed.

Mr. HASKELL of Penobscot: Mr. President, I offer Senate Amendment "A" and move its adoption. In support of that motion I will say that this amendment has the unanimous approval of the Appropriations Committee and further that it does not change materially the bill.

Thereupon, Senate Amendment "A" to L. D. 1333 was adopted without reading and the resolve as so amended was passed to be engrossed.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Collins of Aroostook, out of order and under suspension of the rules, it was

ORDERED that whereas the concurring action of the two branches has indicated that general funds income must be restated to account for the lower income from sales taxes on motor vehicles, be it therefore

ORDERED that the Senate members of the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs present to each Senate member on the next legislative day a tabulation that would indicate the changes in the appropriation measure that to them would be most acceptable as a means of accomplishing a balanced general fund budget.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Chapman of Cumberland, the Senate voted to reconsider its action taken earlier in today's session whereby it passed to be engrosed, bill, An Act Removing Violations of the Liquor Law from the Criminal Law (S. P. 221) (L. D. 587); and on further motion by the same Senator, the bill was laid upon the table pending passage to be engrossed.

Mr. Butler of Hancock received unanimous consent to address the Senate.

Mr. BUTLER of Franklin: Mr. President and members of the Senate, I wish to call to your attention that at the public hearing held April 1 by the Natural Resources Committee of which I happen to be Chairman, I was then requested for permission to take a tape recording of the proceedings by one of the proponents of the Turner Bill. This request was refused by myself. I have since found out that that proponent on his own initiative, unbeknown to your Chairman has had a tape recording of the proceedings made and that same proponent has made remarks concerning the laxity of the proceedings of our hearings in that we are

not paying strict attention to what is being done therein.

The Chairman has been informed that the mike in question was set up outside of the room. While I am not condoning or recommending this procedure, I simply wanted it on the record so that in case of a future occasion of this sort it would then be preferred that permission to take this recording was not from the Chairman.

Mr. Haskell of Penobscot was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate.

Mr. HASKELL: Mr. President and members of the Senate, were I the presiding officer I think probably I would immediately bang the gavel and tell the Senator that he is out of order in suggesting what I am about to suggest.

It seems to me that if, in an informal way and with the assistance of our very efficient Secretary and his various secretaries and clerks, we could split up this tabled section of our calendar and give to the Senator from Aroostook, Senator Collins, the tail end of the calendar for his exclusive list, giving an exclusive numbering sequence and leaving the rest of the tabled matters for items that are not related to his dispositions on the appropriations measure, we would have a much less confusing calendar. I realize that all of the rules and regulations are to the contrary but in an informal way I think it would make for a less confusing calendar if the Secretary could arrange that, probably by a nod of his smiling countenance.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that the Secretary is perfectly willing to co-operate in every way possible.
