Tuesday, April 9, 1957

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by Captain Ash, Salvation Army, Augusta.

On motion by Mr. Dow of Lincoln, Journal of last Friday read and approved.

WHEREAS, Mighty Aroostook County produces countless cords of peerless pulpwood from its tremendous tracts of trees, and

WHEREAS, its rolling countryside has lent itself magnificently to the location of some of the mightiest air bastions in all of the United States Air Force, and

WHEREAS, the fabulous folk of Aroostook have forged forward with true pioneer instinct and are developing new and potentially great industries, such as the processed potato industry and the frozen food industry.

NOW THEREFORE, be it known that I, Waldo Clark, the duly qualified constitutional officer of this Senate, as provided for in Article IV, part Second Section 7 of the Constitution of Maine, do hereby ORDER and proclaim that this Ninth day of April, Nineteen Hundred and Fiftyseven be designated as AROOSTOOK DAY in this Senate Chamber.

Mr. MARTIN of Kennebec; Mr. President and members of the Senate: I will start out by saying that I shall, at the end of my brief talk, move that we accept the "Ought not

to pass" report of the committee. However, I would like to call to the attention of the Senate that there are many citizens in this State who, by reason of the fact that they reside on and part of their employment is on the Federal Reservation at Togus, have been disfranchised. We have out in Togus on the Federal Reservation a number of citizens, perhaps up to a hundred, who cannot vote in any election. In fact, one girl born on the reservation has never been able to vote. Many of these people come from out-ofstate, and after they reside on the reservation so many years the state from whence they came disfranchises them. It is a serious problem, because we all know everyone should have the right to vote. However, this Legislature, and I think perhaps the Committee on Judiciary, was correct in that this was not the answer. I might state that the United States Congress has a committee investigating the same

I will present after this an order, but at this time I would move that the committee report be accepted.

The PRESIDENT pro tem: The Senator from Kennebec, Senator Martin, moves that the "Ought not to pass" report of the committee be accepted. Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

The motion prevailed and the "Ought not to pass" report of the committee was accepted and sent down for concurrence.
