Mr. CARPENTER of Somerset: Mr. President, I would like to inquire if L. D. 135, Bill, "An Act Relating to Fishing for White Perch" is in the possession of the Senate?

Mr. WOODCOCK of Penobscot: Mr. President, I rise to inquire if S. P. 432, an Order relative to a Legislative Research Committee Study of Federal Social Security for State Employees, is in the possession of the Senate?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that is in the possession of the Senate having been held at the request of the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Woodcock.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Woodcock of Penobscot, the Senate voted to reconsider its action of the last legislative day whereby the Order received a passage; and on further motion by the same Senator, the Order was laid upon the table pending passage.

Mr. Woodcock of Penobscot was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate.

Mr. WOODCOCK: Mr. President. last week it was my privilege to witness the three games that the Bangor High School basketball team played in down at the Boston Garden. I think it is appropriate that a remark or two be entered upon the record in tribute to their great efforts in their own behalf and on behalf of all the people of the State of Maine. They really made history down there, because it was the third time in the history of the New England Tournament that a Maine team has reached the finals, the other two being the famous Little Boy Blues team from Portland in 1936, I think it was, who lost in their triple overtime playoff, and of course the wonderful Waterville High School team in 1944 which did win the only New England Championship won by a Maine high school team. But the Bangor Club was particularly interesting to those of us who followed it this year because when they started out the season in the first seven games they lost four and they were not considered a very good bet to make the Eastern Maine Class L Tournament. However, they got going during the season and ended up as State champions. It was as a result, I think, primarily, of the magnificent team effort. Down there in the Garden Jim Mooney was their second most prolific scorer, stepping in to take his place there were two substitutes who alternated, Boyd Osler and Dick Shaw, who both did great jobs.

One of the aspects of the tournament that appealed to me particularly was the wonderful backing that the team received from all the fans of the State of Maine. As we are all aware, athletic loyalties often do run deep, but these fans would come down, probably in many cases backing teams that the Bangor Rams had beaten en route to their own championship, but yet they all cheered one hundred per cent as one man for their representatives down there in the Garden.

I do want to mention too the magnificent coaching job that the team received from Coach Red Barry. He certainly did a superb job in bringing the Rams up to a tournament caliber team. In watching basketball for the past twenty-five years I have never seen a coaching effort any greater than the one Coach Barry accomplished this year with the Rams.

One other item I would want to mention before I conclude is the impeccable conduct that all team members showed down there along with all their fans, including the band which did such a swell job, and of course the attractive cheerleaders. I think it reflects a great credit on the teachers down there at the high school who have had jurisdiction over these young men and women, and on the parents themselves for the innate good faith which each one of these representatives from Maine showed while in Boston. It certainly fills me with a great deal of pride to be a resident of a city in the state that these splendid representatives call home, and I think that with the future of the State in their hands we haven't got much to worry about. They certainly showed a lot of responsibility and a lot of courage in a game where there is certainly a great deal of tension. They have earned the accolade of praise that has been visited upon them throughout the State, and I think that in the annals of the sporting history of the State of Maine their accomplishment will live forever. (Applause)

The PRESIDENT: On behalf of the Senate, the Chair extends appreciation for the very appropriate remarks by the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Woodcock. I know that everyone in Maine took tremendous pride in the great effort that the Bangor Rams displayed in the New England Basketball Tournament last week.

This Thursday evening, March 26th in the hall of the House at 7:30 P.M.
