STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE
HUNDRED AND FIFTEEN.

AN ACT TO REPEAL THE ACTS CONSOLIDATED IN THE
REVISED STATUTES OF THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND
NINE HUNDRED AND FIFTEEN.

Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Maine:

SEC. 1. The public acts, passed during the years hereinafter named and herein designated, are repealed, except so far as they are preserved or excepted in the following sections; but no other acts are hereby repealed.

1903.

All the chapters of the revised statutes of the year nineteen hundred and three, numbered one to one hundred and forty-five, inclusive.

1905.

Chapters numbered one to one hundred and seventy-eight, inclusive, except

Chapter 172, Section one, relating to corporations.

Chapter 175, entitled "An act authorizing the acceptance of the conveyance of the Kennebec Arsenal property by the State of Maine," and

Chapter 176, entitled "An act giving the trustees of insane hospitals authority to control and occupy Widow's Island."

1907.

Chapters numbered one to one hundred and eighty-nine, inclusive, except

Chapter 39, entitled "An act to assent to the purpose and provisions of an act of the Congress of the United States, entitled 'An act to provide for an increased annual appropriation for agricultural experiment stations and regulating the expenditure thereof,'" and

Chapter 109, Section one, relating to corporations.

1909.

Chapters numbered one to two hundred and sixty-five, inclusive, except Chapter 127, Section one, relating to corporations.

1911.

Chapters numbered one to one hundred and ninety-nine, inclusive, except

Chapter 182, Section one, relating to corporations.

1912.

Chapter numbered one of the laws enacted at the special session of the legislature convened in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve.

1913.

Chapters numbered one to two hundred and twenty-one, inclusive, except

Chapter 94, entitled "An act providing for the appointment of two delegates to a New England railroad conference and the payment of their expenses."

Chapter 168, entitled "An act to establish a board of state park commissioners and to define its powers and duties," and

Chapter 186, Section one, relating to corporations.

SEC. 2. The private and special acts passed during the years herein-after named and herein designated, are repealed; but no other such acts are repealed.

1907.

Chapter numbered two hundred and eight, entitled "An act authorizing the agent of the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians to remove any of the distressed poor of that tribe to either reservation within his agency limits."

Chapter three hundred and sixty-six, entitled "An act in relation to compensation for clerk hire in the office of the clerk of courts for the County of Androscoggin."

Chapter four hundred and twenty-five, entitled "An act to provide for a clerk for the register of deeds for the northern registry of deeds for Aroostook County," and

Chapter four hundred and twenty-eight, entitled "An act relating to the office of register of probate of Androscoggin County."

1911.

Chapter fifty-seven, entitled "An act to improve certain state lands."

SEC. 3. The repeal of the acts aforesaid does not revive any of the acts repealed by them. Acts of incorporation declared to be public acts are not repealed. The acts declared to be repealed remain in force for the trial and punishment of all past violations of them; and for the recovery of penalties or forfeitures already incurred; and for the preservation of all rights and their remedies existing by virtue of them; and so far as they apply to any office, trust, judicial proceeding, right, contract, limitation, or event, already affected by them.
