STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED THIRTY.

AN ACT TO REPEAL THE ACTS CONSOLIDATED IN THE REVISED STATUTES OF THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED THIRTY.

Be it Enacted by the People of the State of Maine:

Sec. 1. The public acts, passed during the years hereinafter named and herein designated, are repealed, except so far as they are preserved or excepted in the following sections; but no other acts or parts of acts are repealed.

1915

Chapters numbered three hundred nineteen and three hundred fifty, which are found in the appendix to the Revised Statutes of the year one thousand nine hundred sixteen.

1916

All the chapters of the Revised Statutes of the year one thousand nine hundred sixteen numbered one to one hundred forty-eight, inclusive, except Chapter 75, entitled "The Insolvent Law" and amendments thereof.

1917

Chapters numbered one to three hundred six, inclusive, except Chapter 89, entitled "An Act to Refund a certain Bond Issued in favor of the Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospital."

Chapter 151, relating to conveyance of a certain lot of land by the state of Maine to the European & North American Railroad.

Chapter 187, relating to the issue of war bonds.

Chapter 219, Section nineteen, the portion of said section as follows: "Provided, further, that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish for, take, catch, or kill any kind of fish at any time in Rangeley Lake, in the County of Franklin, by still or plug fishing, so called."

Also Chapter 142, relating to local regulation of sea and shore fisheries.

1919

Chapters numbered one to two hundred thirty-nine, inclusive, and chapters two hundred forty to two hundred sixty-four, inclusive, of the Public Laws enacted at the special session of the year one thousand nine hundred nineteen and chapters two hundred sixty-five to two hundred sixty-eight, inclusive, of the Public Laws enacted at the special session of the year one thousand nine hundred twenty, except

Chapter 12, relating to flowage of the Penobscot Indian reservation.

Chapter 28, amending the charter of the Bath Military and Naval Asylum.

Chapter 189, relating to cooperation with the United States in the settlement of returned soldiers, sailors and marines.

Chapter 264, relating to a bonus to Maine soldiers and sailors in the war with Germany.

Also Chapter 251, Sections one to six relating to highway and bridge bonds.

1921

Chapters one to two hundred twenty-four, inclusive, except

Chapter 45, relating to the Municipal Court in the city of Bath.

Chapter 94, relating to the directors of the Maine General Hospital.

Chapter 134, relating to the reissue of bonds of the Maine Military Service loan.

Chapter 165, relating to bonds under the provisions of the act known as the Maine Military Service loan.

Chapter 214, an act providing for the purchase or taking by process of law the toll bridge between the State of Maine and the State of New Hampshire, extending from South Berwick in said State of Maine and Dover in said State of New Hampshire, in conjunction with the State of New Hampshire.

Also Chapter 131, relating to highway and bridge bonds.

1923

Chapters one to two hundred twenty-five, inclusive, except

Chapter 128, relating to alewife fisheries.

Also Chapter 92, Sections one to five relating to highway and bridge bonds.

1925

Chapters one to two hundred fifteen, inclusive, except

Chapter 9, relating to the Portland Municipal Court.

Chapter 11, relating to the Lincoln Municipal Court.

Chapter 12, relating to the Portland Municipal Court.

Chapter 134, relating to the State of Maine building at West Springfield, Massachusetts.

Chapter 139, relating to the Portland Municipal Court.

Also Chapters 203 and 315, relating to highway and bridge bonds.

And also Chapters 32, 89, 152, 157 and 158, relating to local regulation of sea and shore fisheries.

1927

Chapters one to two hundred sixty-three, inclusive, except

Chapter 18, entitled, "An Act to Assent to the Purpose and Provisions of An Act of the Congress of the United States entitled 'An Act to Authorize the More Complete Endowment of Agricultural Experiment Stations, and for other Purposes.'"

Chapter 120, Section one, relating to the Recorder of the Belfast Municipal Court.

Chapter 222, relating to the schedule of fares between Peaks Island and the Portland mainland.

Also Chapter 187, relating to highway and bridge bonds.

And also Chapters 9 and 10, relating to local regulation of sea and shore fisheries.

1929

Chapters one to three hundred sixty-six, inclusive, except Chapter 141, Sections nine and eleven, relating to transfer of proceedings from the supreme judicial court to the superior court.

Chapter 168, relating to wards in the city of Portland.

Chapter 183, Section six, relating to a state geologist.

Chapter 255, Section seven, relating to the Maine School for the Deaf.

Chapter 328, relating to a commission to recommend changes in the Sunday law.

Also Chapter 291, relating to highway and bridge bonds.

And also Chapters 29, 30, 38, 46, 47, 48, 56, 63, 99, 109, 130, 148 and 278, relating to local regulation of sea and shore fisheries.

Sec. 2. The private and special acts passed during the years hereinafter named and herein designated, are repealed; but no other such acts are repealed.

1919

Chapter ninety-one, relating to the use of hooks of trawl and nets.

1921

Chapter seventy-eight, Section six, relating to copies of records of deeds in Knox county admissible in evidence.

Sec. 3. The repeal of the acts and parts of acts aforesaid does not revive any of the acts repealed by them. Acts of incorporation declared to be public acts are not repealed. The acts declared to be repealed remain in force for the trial and punishment of all past violations of them; and for the recovery of penalties or forfeitures already incurred; and for the preservation of all rights and their remedies existing by virtue of them; and so far as they apply to any office, trust, judicial proceeding, right, contract, limitation, or event, already affected by them.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect on the tenth day of November nineteen hundred thirty.
