REMARKS.

In presenting the annual Report, the Treasurer would respectfully submit the following observations to the Legislature respecting the Finances of the State.

By a Resolve of the Legislature, passed the eighth day of March last, the Treasurer was authorized to receive from the several Banks to which Loans had been made, by authority of the Governor and Council, the amount of the Loans and interest on the same, amounting in the whole to the sum of Fifteen Thousand, Three Hundred Forty-Five Dollars and fifteen cents, which sum has been appropriated for the purpose of discharging the immediate expenses of the last Legislature.

The Resolve authorizing the Treasurer to obtain a Loan to enable him to discharge the State Debt which became due on the first day of May last, in case such loan should be required for that object ; and it having been found necessary to borrow the sum of twenty thousand dollars, the Treasurer obtained that amount of three several Banks in the City of Portland, which, together with the revenue of the State, enabled him to redeem twenty-five thousand Dollars of the debt then due.

Five thousand Dollars of the loan obtained for discharging the State debt has been reimbursed, which leaves the sum of fifteen thousand dollars remaining unpaid, for the payment of which provision is to be made by the Legislature.

The payments made during the present year have reduced the State debt to the sum of Forty-three Thousand Dollars, Twenty-five Thousand of which will become due in the year 1838, and the remainder is redeemable at the pleasure of the Legislature.

The sum of one thousand, nineteen dollars and eighty-eight

cents was deposited in the Treasury of the State on the seventeenth of February last by Samuel Lowder, Jr., Esquire, Public Administrator on the estate of Sarah Leonard, of Bangor, in the County of Penobscot, deceased, which is subject to the order of the Legislature.

The amount estimated to be received from the Land Agent for sales of public Lands has exceeded the estimate for the present year, and a large portion of the amount received has been realized from sales of land belonging to Massachusetts and Maine.

In the collection of the State Taxes on unincorporated Townships and unorganized Plantations for the year 1831, which were not paid on or before the first day of May last, the Treasurer, in the discharge of his duty issued Warrants to the several Sheriffs of the Counties in which those Townships and Plantations were designated in the Tax Act for that year, for the collection of the same. Subsequent to the issuing of the Warrants, information relating to the aforesaid Townships and Plantations was received by the Treasurer, sufficient to warrant him to stay the execution of the Warrants as their prosecution would subject the State to much unnecessary expense.

The several Clerks of the Judicial Courts have been prompt in paying into the Treasury the respective amounts due from them for Justices' Fees accruing to the State.
