To the Senate and House of Representatives:
I herewith communicate for the consideration of the Legislature, the Report of the Inspectors of the State Prison at Thomaston.


## State Prison Inspectors' Report.

## To the Governor and Council of the State of Maine :

The Inspectors of the State Prison commenced their Annual Examination of the Prison concerns, and the auditing, correcting and settling the accounts of the Warden, with the State and with the Prison, on the fifth day of January, 1835.

Their visit to the Prison, was deferred to this time, in consequence of the necessary absence of Messrs. Smith, and Knowles. They continued their examination until the eighth instant, when having examined and audited the Warden's general account with the State, they adjourned to the 16 th, to afford the Clerk and Commissary, an opportunity to make up the accounts with the different departments.

On the 16 th, 19 th, and 20 th, they finished auditing the accounts and now transmit to the Governor and Council, the Warden's account with the State, certified by the Inspectors, for the year ending the last day of Nov. 1834, and his account with the Prison, together with "an account "of stock on hand of different kinds, as well at the begin"ning, as at the close of the year, the several sums expend"ed for materials, food, fuel, clothing, bedding, ligbts, "tools, and other articles; the amount of manufactures, "and other articles sold from the Prison, together with an "estimate of the probable income and expense for the "next year."

By the Warden's account, including the credit for the amount received from the Treasurer of the State, it will appear that a balance of three thousand six hundred ninety two dollars and seventy two cents, is due from him to the State.

This account, as the Inspectors have had occasion to remark in previous Reports, cannot be critically correct, inasmuch as the amount of Stock is fixed according to the judgment of appraisers, and may vary somewhat from the true value, and the same articles may be appraised differently at the close, and at the commencement of the year.

The Inspectors at their present meeting, have examined the Prison, its books and records, the various work shops and offices, and find them all in good order. The convicts are obedient and orderly in their deportment, and cleanly in their persons. Their health has been as good during the present, as in any past year ; and their conduct has been generally, such as to meet the approbation of the officers.

The number of convicts at the last Annual Report, was seventy five. The present number is sixty four. Seventeen have been received at the Prison since the Inspectors' last Report, (Sept. 27,) and ten have been discharged on expiration of their sentences.

Ebenezer P. Staples, employed as Overseer and laborer in the Blacksmiths shop, at one dollar and 25 cents per day.

The Warden has contracted with Mr. Thomas O'Brien, to transport the convicts from the different Goals in the State, and from the custody of any officer of Court, to the Prison, for the present year, for three hundred and ninety dollars, and he has given bond for the faithful performance of the contract.

Prior to October last, the Warden advertised according to law, for Sealed Proposals for furnishing and delivering at the Prison, food, clothing, bedding and raw materials necessary for the Prison, and no proposal to furnish any of the articles aforesaid at a price below the sum estimated by the Inspectors, as the lowest price for which said articles could be furnished, being made, he was advised by the Inspectors to procure supplies for the Prison, in such manner as he might deem most for the interest of the Institution. And purchases have been made and supplies furnished by him from time to time, and at such times and from such persons as offered the most favorable terms, whether in small or large quantities.

Six thousand four hundred and thirty five dollars and twenty cents, the proceeds of Granite shipped to New Orleans in 1833, and which in the Inspectors Annual Report, constituted an item in the account of the Stock on hand, has been received and credited the State by the Warden. He has also disposed of a part of the Gramite which has been in New York for a market since 1833. On this stone, owing to the strong prejudice existing there, against all State Prison work, and the cost of storage,

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there will probably be considerable loss. The Inspectors have advised the Warden to have this Stone disposed of as soon as may be at the opening of the spring, at auction, if no more favorable mode is furnished, or to have it transported to another market.

No part of the demands against Ira Norris and his surety Mr. Holt, or from Foster Bryant, has been recovered since the last Annual Report of the Inspectors.

Judgment has recently been recovered against Foster Bryant for the amount of his notes and interest, and legal measures are now being had to coerce payment.

The principal expenditure during the past year, under the head, Building and Repairs, has arisen from the rebuilding of the Prison Lime Kilns, at an expense of $\$ 53333$. From these, in consequence of the time taken in re-building, and the low price of Lime, there has been but little profit during the past season.

The Inspectors have pursued the following calculations in order to ascertain the expense of food per day, and of clothing a year, for each convict.

The net income of the Lime Rock Quarry, paying every expense, except for Guard and Overseer, is $\$ 2,152$ 18, the sum divided by the number of days' work performed in the Quarry, gives 752 cents earnings of each convict employed in the Quarry, per day.

The net income of the Shoemakers' Department, paying every expense, except the Guard and Overseer, is $\$ 85898$, which divided by the number of days' work performed gives 36 cents 7 mills earnings of a convict, per day.

The income of the Wheelwrights' Department, paying every expense, except for Guard, is $\$ 55399$, and by the same process, gives 50 cents 3 mills per day, for the labor of each convict.

The income of the Granite Department, paying every expense, except for Overseers and Guard, is $\$ 1,46008$, which by the above process, gives $2 \mathbb{2} \mathrm{cts}$. 6 mills per day for the labor of each convict. To guard the Granite Yard, there are constantly employed three men, and sometimes four, besides the $O$ verseer.

The Inspectors forbear to express any speculative views they may entertain, respecting the propriety of warming the various shops and offices of the Prison, in some other than the way at present employed ; of the removal of the shops occupied by the Shoemakers, Wheelwrights and Blacksmiths, and of erecting others, differently construct-

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ed and differently located; or as to the propriety of a different direction being given to the labor of the convicts employed at the Stone Shop, or of some mode of guarding the same at a less expense, believing that the Report of the able Committee appointed by the Legislature, for the purpose of examining into the general concerns of the Prison, will probably embrace these, as well as other subjects which may tend to decrease the expense of the Prison to the State.

The Warden in his Report to the Inspectors, represents Samuel Prouty, to be a convict, under sentence for life, that he is thirty-five years old, and was convicted of an attempt to commit a rape, that he has been confined in Prison, in pursuance of his sentence over ten years, that his conduct during his imprisonment has been uniformly correct. He further observes, "that it is his belief to con"tinue Prouty longer in Prison, will neither be productive "of good to him, or be beneficial to the community."

The Inspectors, in consideration of Prouty's good conduct in Prison, and that he has already been confined a term of time, beyond which, no person guilty of the offence for which he is convicted, under the most aggravated circumstances, can be sentenced under the present law, concur in the opinion expressed by the Warden, and respectfully recommend the said Prouty to the clemency of the Governor and Council.
