## ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE WARDEN OF THE MAINE STATE PRISON.

Sir,
Please lay before the Legislature this Report, shewing the condition of this Institution for the year commencing Nov. 1, 1834, and ending October 31st, 1835.

Respectfully, your Obt. Servant, JOEL MILLER, Warden.

The amount due the State from Stephen Holt of New York is yet due and unpaid. The Thomaston Bank and the Central Bank, Hallowell, have each recovered judgement against Foster Bryant, no part of which has to my knowledge been paid by Bryant. Edwin Smith, Esq. was employed the
early part of the last summer to go to New York and Philadelphia for the purpose of adjusting and bringing these demands to a close, but was unable to procure payment at that time. The reduced number of convicts at this prison has rendered the institution by far less productive than was anticipated, the same number of guards and overseers being required for the sixty-five convicts, (the number now in prison,) as would be required for three times that number, and the same expense for fuel, \&c. \&c. I deem it unnecessary to trouble the Legislature with any remarks in relation to the construction, location or discipline of the Prison, or of the productiveness or unproductiveness of the various departments connected with the institution, inasmuch as the Committee appointed by the Governor and Council in pursuance of a Resolve of the last Legislature, have visited the Prision for the purpose of examination, and will I have no doubt in their Report exhibit a very full and particular account of the operations of the institutior. There was due from the Warden to the State upon a settlement of his account up to 31st October, 1834, \$1,142 74, which amount has been paid to the State by being deducted from the amount due from the State to individuals. It will appear that the amount due from the $W$ arden to the $S$ state though fully paid, cannot appear in the 'Treasurer's Report of the Finances, as the same did not pass through his
hands. A part of the demands due the State from individuals, (as appears by a schedule in the office of the Treasurer of State,) have been left with Edwin Smith, Esq. for collection, which when collected will be paid over to the State Treasurer. This being my last annual communication to the Legislature, will, I hope, be a sufficient apology for a single remark in relation to the unfortunate beings committed to my charge. The cells of this prison are so constructed that no warmth can be communicated by any possible means whatever, to the convictsthe consequence is that a large amount is consumed annually for the purchase of bed clothes, which is found in extreme cold nights entirely insufficient to keep the convicts from suffering with the cold. To claim therefore for this State the high honor for its wise and liberal policy and for this Institution the highest rank among similar Penitentiaries in this country, both in relation to the discipline of convicts and to the pecuniary operations of the Institution, I beg leave to call the attention of the Legislature to this important subject.
