## REPORT <br> Of the Inspectors of the State Prison.

To the Governor and Council of the State of Maine.
The Inspectors of the State Prison, Messrs. Ingraham and Knowles, (Mr. Smith being necessarily absent,) met at the Prison on the fifth day of January instant, to audit and examine the Warden's accounts, and to inspect the concerns of the Prison generally. They continued their investigation of the accounts until the 9 th, and adjourned to the 14 th. On the 14 th and 15 th, they finished the examination of said accounts, and found them duly vouched and correctly stated. They then adjourned to the 19 th , to give the Clerk time to make up the accounts of the different Departments of the Prison.

And now, all the Inspectors being present, they respectfully submit to the Governor and Council, the following statements and remarks, together with the Warden's account by them certified, and the accounts of the different Departments of the Prison, shewing the profit or loss of each, as the Report of their doings.

The account of the Warden with the State, as certified and approved by the Inspectors shows a balance due from him to the State of two thousand two hundred and fiftysix dollars, sixteen cents. In this account, the sum of three thousand four hundred and thirty-three dollars, and thirty-four cents, received by the Warden from the State Treasurer is credited.

Any balance in the Warden's accounts of last year, in his settlement with the Committee of the Legislature, is not included in the accounts examined by the Inspectors. The result of that settlement not having been carried into the Warden's books of the present year, and the Inspectors having no knowledge of the mode in which it was effected, they have confined their examination to the actual receipts and disbursements at the Prison for the past year. The accounts of the Warden by them certified, are thus made up with the exception of the sum received of the Treasurer as before named.

The following calculations have been made to ascertain the net earings of a convict per day in any Department.

The nett income of the Lime Quarry for the past year, paying every expense except Guard and Overseer is $\$ 3,-$ 241 17. This sum being divided by 3068, the number of days work performed in the Quarry, gives one dollar five cents, six mills, as the nett earning of a convict per day in the Quarry.
The nett income of the Shoe-makers' Department, paying every expense, guard and overseer excepted, is $\$ 51204$; this sum divided by the number of day's work performed, being 2097, gives twenty-four cents, four mills, the nett earnings of a convict per day.

The same process respecting the Wheel-wrights' Department, will give thirty cents and three mills, as the nett earnings of a convict employed there per day.

A similar process respecting the Blacksmiths' Department, will give fifty-five cents and eight mills, as the nett earnings of a convict per day in that Department.

These Department are the principal ones in the Prison, except that of the Granite shop at the shore, where are employed the greatest number and the most effective men.

The nett earnings of a convict in these Departments vary from one dollar five and a half cents to twenty-four and a half cents per day, as before stated, while the labor of the convicts in the Granite shop, insread of a profit, has not been productive of sufficient to pay the expenditures.

Experience of past years would justify an expectation of a similar result from the labor in this Department, though not to the extent which appears from a calculation made from the items of the present account.

Not a small portion of the apparent loss in this Department, arises from the fact, that the Stock on hand at the commencement of the year, in the yard, at New York, and elsewhere, has been disposed of at a less price than its estimated value. But making due allowance for losses arising in this way, the Inspectors are satisfied that the dressing of Granite, particularly of the Hallowell Granite, in this Prison, cannot be carried on without a loss to the State, owing in part to the location of the Granite Yard, requiring as it does, a separate guard sufficient to guard the whole Prison, if the convicts were employed within the upper Prison yard. This opinion has often been expressed by the Inspectors at the Prison, and stated in their reports. Yet a change of employment could not well be effected, until new and convenient work shops should have been erected, to accommodate those employed in the Granite yard.

The Inspectors are of opinion, that a greater number of men can be profitably employed in the Lime Quarry, than have heretofore been employed there, and have so advised the Warden.

They have also recommended to him to employ none of the convicts in the Granite yard, who can be employed in any other Department.

The following process will show the cost of food per day, and clothing per year, of a convict for the past year.

FOR SUBSISTENOF.


Nothing has been collected of Ira Norris, or of his surety, Stephen Holt. The executions obtained against Foster Bryant in Philadelphia, have not been satisfied. Soon after the judgments were obtained against said Bryant there, he removed to the City of New York, and his bail died without leaving property, and the payment of the executions were thus avoided.

Propositions have been made by Bryant for a compromise, and copies of the judgments, and the necessary papers and authority, either to renew the judgments against said Bryant, in the State of New York, or to effect a set-
tlement with him in some other way, have been forwarded to an Attorney in New York, the result of whose doings is not known to the Inspectors. It is supposed that the adjustment of this claim has been protracted in conse. quence of the sickness and absence of the gentleman to whom it was entrusted in New York.

Since the last Quarterly Report, Oct. 16th, sixteen convicts have been received into the Prison, one has been pardoned, one has died, and seven have been discharged on expiration of their sentences. The number now confined, is sixty-five, as they are thus situated and employed.

The Calender of punishments shows the following punishments to have been inflicted by order of the Warden since the Inspector's last report.

Oct. 20th, Isaac Torrey, for disobeying the orders of one of the overseers, and using threatening and insolent language, was sentenced by the Warden to five days solitary confinement.

Dec. 10th, Abraham Plaice, for disobedience and insolent language to one of the overseers, was sentenced to one day solitary confinement.

Dec. 24th, William Obrien, for disobeying the orders of one of the overseers of the prison, was sentenced by the Warden to four days solitary confinement.

The prisoners have been generally orderly and obedient. They have been very healthy. There has been no death from sickness during the year.

The convict who died since the last report of the Inspectors was Timothy Hill, a deaf and dumb man, who was confined for Larceny. His death was occasioned by a block of wood falling from the bank to the bottom of the lime quarry, where he was at work, and striking his head in its passage.
