To the Governor and Council of the State of Maine:
The Inspectors of the State's Prison present the following

## REPORT.

They have attended to the duties required of them by the laws, and have, from time to time, made known the results of their labors in special Reports, to which they ask leave to refer.

At the close of the year, however, they have, as their duty required, been engaged in a more thorough examination of all the affairs of the Institution, especially as it regards its financial concerns, and the economy of its expenditures.

On an examination of the Warden's accounts, we state it thus:

On examination, we find the State debtor to the Prison, as follows:

Leaving a balance in favor of the State, 5,13833
Still, as the State paid during the last year, $\$ 9,73600$, and the whole amount of receipts from sales falls short of the disbursements $\$ 4,58309$, it will become necessary to make further appropriations for the current year.

There are demands against individuals, of the year 1837, and previous, which are not here included :-some of these are sperate, some desperate, and no certain calculations can be made of them. From these data, and the Reports of previous years, the amount required may be ascertained. We refer for our estimate, to the documents annexed, marked C.

The old demands, some of which are in suit, are scarcely worth mentioning :-at least, the prospects concerning
them are so dubious, and every year growing darker and darker, that it would be unsafe for the best calculator to hazard a conjecture, or entertain a hope, concerning them.

The expenditures for improvements or repairs, have been only trifling, and none have been allowed but such as were clearly indispensable.

The Police of the Institution, is as good, perhaps, as it can be, without a radical change of the whole system. The expediency of any change of the penitentiary system, and if any, what, is not within the province of the Inspectors; especially, as the whole subject has been, and still is, under the consideration of a Committee of the Legislature.

It will be perceived by reference to the schedule annexed, that while some of the departments of labor are profitable, others are a losing concern;-still, as all are in some measure dependent on each other, it would be difficult to dispense with either. The team which is chiefly auxiliary to the Lime department, is a heavy expense, and it may be somewhat doubtful whether it might not be better economy to dispose of it, and depend on hire altogether,

At any rate, the expense of taking Lime rock up from the quarry, at the average depth of 80 feet, and at an angle of ascent, in some places, of 30 degrees, by animal power, must be indeed great. We submit whether steam machinery might not be applied at a moderate expense, and at an immense saving of animal labor.

The prisoners for the past year, have been healthy, with few exceptions;-their food is plain but wholesome ; their clothes are suitable and neat, and their cells are as pure as cells so constructed can be. The convicts are treated kindly, and the diseased are suitable attended. No death has occurred during the year.

Religious service is performed every Sabbath afternoon, and except in the winter, a Sabbath school is regularly attended each Sabbath, under the superintendence, of the Rev. Mr. Washburn, the Chaplain. The chamber used for a chapel and school room, is comfortable and convenient, and a Library is commenced of about two hundred volumes, consisting chiefly of bibles and testaments, and such plain and interesting moral and religious books as are suitable to such minds as are to be found in such a place.

The number of prisoners is now 73 ; the number on the 31st Dec. 1837, was 77. There have been received since, 38. Discharged, 38 ; pardoned, 3 ; and escaped, not retaken, 1. Of the 73 now in Prison, 51 are Americans; 11 Irish; 4 English; 3 Nova Scotians; and 4 Mulattoes. The crimes are: Larceny, 44; Forgery, 3; Counterfeiting, 3; Burglary and Larceny, 2; Adultery, 3 ; Felonious assault, 4; Attempt to commit a rape, 1; Maiming, 1; Lewdness, 1; Bigamy, 1; Manslaughter, 6; Arson, 2; Murder and Commutation, 1 ; Robbery, 2. The highest number within the year was 84 , and the lowest 64 .

In examining the disbursements we find the expense for transporting convicts to the Prison and furnishing them with means to depart, are no small items. We have perceived too that many are sent here for short periods, say six or seven months. Now as such might be confined in the County Gaols, and punished there, with quite as much effect, and this expense of transportation be thereby saved, it may be proper to inquire for a remedy, and whether the fault is in the law or in its administration.

There has also occurred a difficulty in regard to punishing for repetitions of the same penitentiary offence, where the previous convictions were not known at the
trial. The Act of the 25th February, 1824, provides, that in such case, the Court, on confession of the party, verdict of a jury, or otherwise according to law, may extend the imprisonment even during life.

This provision is not only of doubtful constitutionality, but has proved'useless, at least in practice. Its repeal or modification is recommended.

It is perhaps matter of conjecture, what will be the future expenses or profits of the institution. Times change and markets for the articles manufactured here, will fluctuate. This year lime has been particularly depressed. The market for boots and shoes is increasing, and it is difficult to supply the demand.

The Inspectors have only to add, that the accounts of the Prison are neatly, and as far as we can judge from minute inspection, accurately kept; and we see nothing in the whole administration for criticism or animadversion.
