LAND OFFICE, Augusta, Feb'y 21, 1842.

To Hon. SAMUEL H. BLAKE,

President of the Senate:

THE undersigned, in answer to an order of the two branches, passed the 16th inst., requesting the Land Agent "to report to the Legislature as early as practicable, the amount of settling land sold by the Land Agent during the past year, the persons to whom sold, the price per acre, and where the same is located. Also, to whom permits have been granted the past year to cut timber on the State's land, and on what terms, and in what townships. Whether any part of the price of any permit has been released to any person—if so, to whom, the amount, and the reason for such release. Also, the amount of all expenses connected with the sale and settlement of stumpage, paid by the Land Agent, during the year 1841, and the amount of cash received by him for stumpage," respectfully submits the following schedules and documents marked  $\Lambda$ , B, C, and D, containing the information required by the order before named.

Schedule A contains an account of all the sales of land during the year 1841, and also the sales of the present year up to the 18th inst., showing the names of the purchasers, the quantity sold, and price per acre.

Schedule B contains a list of all the licenses granted to

cut timber upon the public lands during the past year, showing the names of the persons to whom the licenses have been granted, the tracts so permitted, and the price per thousand feet. Where the timber is to be settled for by the ton, it is so stated in the schedule.

It appears from the books in this office, that Messrs. Clay, Dinsmore & Co. had a license from the Land Agent in 1840 to cut timber upon township No. 1, range 13, during the winter of 1841,-that the timber cut under this license was not to be paid for until the fall of 1842, unless the logs came down the first year. James Rogers had a license to cut timber on township number 6, range 1, N. Bingham's Kennebec purchase, on terms similar to those contained in the license to Clay, Dinsmore & Co. The documents marked C, consisting of an extract from the "waste book," kept in this office, and the reports of Isaac S. Small, William F. Leavitt and David Smiley, a copy of the permit to Clay, Dinsmore & Co., and the instructions to William F. Leavitt and Isaac S. Small, all having reference to these licenses, contain all the information to be obtained from the books of the Land Office in relation to this matter. Neither of the sums, however, referred to in the entry upon the waste book, have been endorsed upon the respective bonds of Clay, Dinsmore & Co., and James Rogers, given for the payment of the timber out under these licenses.

Sheet D contains a statement of all expenses connected with the sale and settlement of stumpage, during the year 1841, the amount received for timber, and the amount remaining due January 1, 1842.

The account of expenses in relation to selling and collecting stumpage, includes the amount paid during the year 1841. A small amount so paid was for bills which accrued

in 1840, and there is also a small amount of bills accruing in 1841 which has not yet been paid. The aggregate of the table of expenses will be found to correspond very nearly with the true amount of expenses for the year 1841.

In addition to the licenses granted to cut timber upon the public lands, during the present winter, it appears that Zebulon Ingersoll was authorized by the Land Agent to grant permission to the settlers upon the Aroostook river to cut fifty tons of timber each upon the public lands. No written permits were given to these settlers; but Mr. Ingersoll gave verbal permission to such as applied to enter upon certain townships, belonging to this State, upon certain conditions. These conditions and the names of the applicants, with the locations assigned them will be found in the document hereto annexed marked E.

Stover Rines was also authorized to grant permission to the settlers upon the St. John river, to cut fifty tons of timber to a family, and also to grant permission to Leonard Coombs to cut about one thousand tons, also to allow Joseph Holland to cut logs for the use of the Fish river mills. But no information has been received at this office, that any lumbering operations are going on upon that river, under the authority given to Mr. Rines, except under the permission given to Joseph Holland, who is cutting logs for the use of the mills occupied by him.

N. B. The terms of the foregoing licenses are, generally that the stumpage shall be paid to the State on the first day of July; but a few are made payable on the first day of August next. But if the timber

shall not come to market the present year, the payment is to be extended one year. In all cases the State retains a lien upon the timber till payment is made, and a bond with sureties considered good for the amount, is also taken in each case, to insure payment to the State.

## Copy of a permit to Richard Clay and als.

Know all men by these presents, that I, Rufus McIntire, Agent to superintend and manage the sale and settlement of the public lands of the State of Maine, do hereby grant to Richard Clay, William Clay, Charles Moore and George Moore, all of Gardiner, in the county of Kennebec, and Bradbury T. Dinsmore, of Anson, in the county of Somerset, permission to enter upon and cut and remove the pine timber from the following tract of land belonging to the State of Maine, viz: township No. 1, in the thirteenth range, west from the east line of the State, upon the following conditions, viz:-the said Clay and Dinsmore & Co., within ten months from the date hereof, enter upon the tract aforesaid, and cut therefrom during the said ten months the pine timber suitable for making boards, in a prudent and saving manner, on the ground cut upon, by cutting all timber suitable for market, without making strip and waste thereof, and shall on or before the first day of September next, pay to the Land Agent of the State of Maine, four dollars for each and every quantity of timber sufficient to make a thousand feet of boards, which shall have been by them cut during the then preceding year. The quantity of timber cut by them shall be ascertained and determined by a person to be appointed by the Land Agent or his assistant, who shall make allowance for rots and shakes only.

And the said Clay and Dinsmore shall give notice to the Land Agent, or his assistant, or to the person appointed to inspect and survey said timber, at what time and place the timber cut by them, during the year, shall be deposited and ready for inspection and survey, previous to its being driven down the streams or rivers, and shall also give information of all the marks of said timber, and of the whole number of logs cut. If said Clay and Dinsmore shall fail to give seasonable notice, as aforesaid, so that the timber cut by him [them] or his [their] authority, cannot be ascertained, or shall not give a true account of the marks of the timber, or not give the true number of logs cut, or shall in any way secrete any of the timber, so that the person appointed to inspect and survey the same shall be prevented from obtaining a correct account of the quality and quantity of the timber cut, such surveyor shall estimate the quantity according to the best information he can obtain, and said Clay and Dinsmore & Co. shall pay at the rate of eight dollars per thousand, for each and every thousand feet of good pine timber, according to the estimate of the surveyor, unless the said Clay and Dinsmore & Co. shall have been prevented, by unavoidable misfortune, from exhibiting such timber in a situation to have the same properly inspected and surveyed, of which the surveyor is to judge and report, and in such case payment is to be made according to the estimate of the surveyor, at the price first named. The surveyor aforesaid shall also judge and determine, whether the pine timber has been cut in a saving and prudent manner. And if such surveyor shall determine, that the said Clay and Dinsmore & Co. have made unnecessary strip and waste, he shall ascertain and report the amount thereof, and said Clay and Dinsmore & Co. shall pay for all timber so wasted as if cut. And the said Agent hereby reserves a lien upon all the timber cut under this permit, and the boards and other lumber manufactured therefrom, until all sums shall be paid, with the right to sell and dispose of the same; and said Clay and Dinsmore & Co. shall board the person, who may be appointed to survey said timber, at said Clay and Dinsmore & Co.'s expense, while he may be necessarily in said service. Dated the sixth day of November, 1840.

And it is understood that if at least one half of the timber, cut under this permit, shall not with due diligence on the part of the operators be floated down to Anson, before said first day of September next, then the payment of the stumpage due shall be postponed one year, with interest on the same.

"Upon application of James Rogers and Messrs. Clay, Dinsmore & Co. for a deduction to be made from the scale of timber cut by them respectively, the last winter, on townships No. 6, R. 1, and No. 1, R. 13; and having employed David Smiley, Esq., an experienced surveyor, to re-survey the timber cut upon No. 1, R. 13, and upon examination of his report, the Land Agent being satisfied that the woods' scale was too large, a deduction is to be made from the account of Clay, Dinsmore & Co. equal to 257,196 feet, which at \$4 per M is \$1,028 78.

And in the case of James Rogers, Isaac S. Small, the scaler, having reported that there should be a deduction of from 10 to 15 per cent. from his scale to make it equal to Kennebec survey, a deduction of 10 per cent. is made from James Rogers account equal to 197,231 feet at \$2 per M., which is \$394 46."

COPY of the conditions returned to the Land Office by Zebulon Ingersoll, Esq., Assistant Land Agent, upon which the settlers upon the Aroostook river were allowed to cut timber during the present winter, together with the names of applicants for that privilege and their locations by him.

"Applications having been made to the Land Agent, to grant permission to the actual settlers on the Aroostook river to cut a small quantity of timber during the ensuing winter; representing that their condition and actual wants require that such permission be granted-and the Land Agent having authorized the undersigned to proceed to the Aroostook and inquire into the premises and if deemed necessary to allow the said settlers to cut not exceeding fifty tons each; and having visited the Aroostook river for said purpose in pursuance of said instructions, and being satisfied that the wants and conditions of the said settlers require that some indulgence of the kind be allowed; and that the same may be done without detriment to the public interest, I have in pursuance of said authority and instructions, allowed the following persons, being actual settlers upon the Aroostook river, to enter upon the tracts of land written against their respective names, for the purpose of making the quantity of timber allowed during the ensuing winter, upon the following conditions and restrictions, to wit:

Each person is allowed to cut fifty tons of timber and no more on the tracts named against their respective names; and the right hereby granted shall not be transferred to any other person whatever; and the stumpage shall be settled for at the rate of one dollar per ton, and paid in money to the Land Agent, after the same shall have been measured upon the bank and before the same is put into the stream.

In cases where timber shall be cut upon lands heretofore conveyed by the State, and where the State holds notes for the same unpaid, all timber so cut shall be holden for payment of one dollar per ton to be paid over to the Land Agent, and the same endorsed upon the notes given for the lots from which the timber shall have been taken, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to pay said notes.
