His Excellency, HUGH J. ANDERSON,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief,

SIR:—There have been received from the General Government the past season, 444 rifles, being our quota of arms for 1844.

In the arsenals at Portland and Bangor, there are nearly twelve thousand muskets and rifles belonging to the state, several thousand of which have been examined the present season, and put in a good state of preservation.

The keepers of these arsenals have discharged their duty with fidelity.

There are 41 artillery companies in the state, in the possession of property, amounting to more than fifty thousand dollars. During the present season I have visited a number of the gun-houses, and in several of them found the public property in a state of exposure. Unless a military spirit should be revived in our state, this property will be neglected and exposed to waste, and it may become necessary for the state to take possession of it, and provide for its safe keeping.

By Resolves approved March 21 and 22, 1844, the following specific appropriations were made, and for the faithful expenditure thereof, the Acting Quarter Master General was made accountable, viz :

The accounts of the Adjutant General and Acting Quarter Master General for 1844, have all been examined and settled by the governor and council, and the unexpended balance of the appropriations for 1844, being two hundred six dollars and seven cents, have been paid to the treasurer of state.

The militia law of last winter has been in operation only a short time, but the character of the effects likely to result from it, is too strongly marked to be the subject of any mistake or difference of opinion.

That law was certainly not designed to encourage a martial spirit in our citizen soldiery. The utmost which was hoped or claimed for it was, that it might keep up such elements of a military organization as were admitted on all hands to be indispensably necessary. It is my duty to say, that even this little has not been achieved by it. Many of its provisions are obscure, while others conflict with themselves, and evidently militate with the laws of the United States. In its practical operation it has proved a complete nullity. It is, in a vast majority of instances, entirely disregarded, and no effective form exists to enforce such of its enactments as are deemed really salutary.

All the officers in commission when this law took effect, are entitled to an honorable discharge at their pleasure. If the service of the militia was required by any public emergency, its total abandonment might be effected in a single day, by their resignation. In such an event we should be without military organization, without any reliable military force. Such an effect, I apprehend, was not contemplated by the framers of the law.

Can it be either for the honor of our state, or the safety of her citizens, to virtually overthrow a system so intimately identified with our republican institutions—one that has ever been regarded of such vital importance to their perpetuity, and the unimpaired enjoyment of the blessings they guaranty?

Unless a martial spirit is preserved in our citizens, we shall soon be without even the elements necessary to constitute a soldiery. This spirit can only be kept alive by measures of government designed to encourage and foster it.

The laws of the United States require the Adjutant General to make abstracts of the annual inspection returns received from companies, and lay the same annually before the commander-in chief of the state; and also to transmit a duplicate of the same to the president of the United States, on or before the first Monday of

January, of each year. Although imperative upon the Adjutant General annually to make such returns, yet the effect of the existing law of the state, utterly puts it out of his power to discharge the duty.

Only very partial returns have been made to this department the present season; and to comply as nearly as practicable with the provisions requiring annual returns, I herewith lay before your Excellency, abstracts predicated upon the returns of last year.

Upon the annual returns of the military force of the state, our quota of arms from the General Government is based. Failing to make such returns, must eventually operate to deprive us of the proportion of arms, to which we are justly entitled.

In my previous annual reports, I have presented the principles necessary, in my opinion, to preserve our militia system in a state of efficiency. I have done so from a profound conviction, that a well organized citizen soldiery is essential to social good order, and to the security of the country against foreign aggression; and my conviction has been confirmed by the lamentable scenes enacted in one of our principal cities, during the past summer, and which were mainly attributable to the want of an effective military force within the reach of the civil power.

Two plans for the re-organization of the militia, one based upon a compulsory, and the other upon a voluntary service, the soldiers in either case, to be furnished with arms by the state, will be presented in due season to the committee, who will have that subject under consideration.

There is, and probably ever will be, a diversity of opinion in regard to the details of a militia system. Public sentiment, however, if I have not mistaken it, urgently demands some effective system, providing for an active and well disciplined soldiery of from ten to fifteen thousand.

It is the province of the legislature to determine whether any, and what military organization shall be kept up in the state. Their discretion is limited only by the paramount requirements of the laws of the United States. Within these limits they are supreme. Directly representing, as they do, the interests and wishes

of the people, they may be safely relied upon to exercise their power with a due regard to all the responsibilities which attach to it.
