## THIRTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE.

No. 41.] [HOUSE.

Adjutant General's Office, Augusta, March 23, 1852.

In obedience to your order passed 22d instant, calling on this department for "a detailed statement of the gun-houses and lots in five councilor districts, and unserviceable ordnance sold, as reported in his last annual statement, and the several purchasers of the same," I herewith transmit copies or abstracts of such reports, orders and accounts, relating to the subject, as I find among the papers of the office.

As those proceedings were had under a resolve of the legislature of August, and of an order in Council of November, 1850, and I entered upon the duties of this office in January, 1851, I am without other knowledge of those transactions than the records afford.

I answer, "whether any, and if any, what gun-houses and ordnance have been since sold, and for how much, and to whom, and the agents employed to sell the same, with a copy of their accounts rendered for such service," in the accompanying papers marked  $\Lambda$ ., B., C., D.

## REPORT.

#### [COPY.—ORDER IN COUNCIL.]

#### STATE OF MAINE.

In Council, November 23, 1850.

The standing committee on military affairs, to which was referred the subject of gun-houses and military ordnance belonging to the State, and not under the control of any military company, having had the same under consideration

#### REPORT:

That there are thirty-one gun-houses, and should be sixty-two pieces of artillery, thirty-one tumbrils, fifty to one hundred sets of harness, together with the carriages and equipments of the same, of the value of fifty thousand dollars. Said property is located in the following towns, viz: (county of York,) York, Saco and Limerick; (county of Oxford,) Paris, Turner, Livermore and Bethel; (county of Kennebec,) Monmouth, Waterville, Readfield and Clinton; (county of Waldo,) Frankfort; (county of Lincoln,) Bath, Topsham, Warren, Boothbay, Bristol and East Thomaston; (county of Cumberland,) Danville, Freeport, Gray and Westbrook; (county of Hancock,) Orland; (county of Washington,) Eastport and Calais; (county of Somerset,) Norridgewock, Anson and St. Albans; (county of Franklin,) Farmington and Wilton; (county of Penobscot,) Garland, Lincoln, Bangor and Brewer.

Your committee have reason to believe, from all the evidence they can obtain, that the oun-houses are very much out of repair, and thereby, the artillery ordnance remaining in the same is not only exposed to the weather, consequently injuring, but the guns not being under the charge of any one, are used and injured by boys in the village where the same are located; and in two instances that have come to our knowledge, two brass pieces of the value of from eight to ten hundred dollars, have been unlawfully taken and carried to California.

Under this view of the case, and believing that the property if it remain, where it now is, not under the control of any responsible person, that the same will decrease in value every year, and finally be a total loss to the State, your committee would recommend that the governor and commander-in-chief cause an order to issue, causing the councilor from each district to take charge of said gun-houses and artillery ordnance in their respective districts, and to have the ordnance removed to the State arsenals at Bangor or Portland, as soon as the same can be done, at a fair price, the same to be removed in season for a report from each councilor at the last session of the present council. In the meantime, your committee would recommend to each councilor to examine the gunhouses in his district, and if the same are not in suitable repair, so that the property will be protected from the weather and not liable to damage by being openly exposed, to have the same property stored until he shall have the same removed to the State arsenals, aforesaid. Also, if in his judgment it would be for the interest of the State, to have the gun-houses sold, either at public or private sale, and the proceeds thereof applied towards defraying the expenses of the transportation of the ordnance to the State arsenal.

#### GEN. GREENLIEF WHITE:

SIR—In accordance with the authority vested in me by yourself, under act of the last legislature, I have attended to the duties relating to the gun and gun-houses in the counties of Penobscot and Piscataquis district, and also in Belfast, and

#### REPORT:

The gun-houses were situated in Lincoln, Brewer, and Garland. The gun-house in Lincoln I sold to Joseph Shaw for twenty-five dollars. It was old and much broken up and was worth no more; the guns, &c., were hauled by Joseph Whittier to Bangor, fifty miles, for twelve dollars, and are now in the arsenal at Bangor.

The Brewer house is in good order, and as a company were about to be organized, I thought best to await that event; the guns &c., are well cared for.

The gun-house in Garland was in good order, but I could not get over fifty dollars for the same, which I concluded to accept, and

have sent to L. D. Hayes, representative in the last legislature, the deed of the same, to be issued when the price is paid. The guns &c., that were here stored have been moved to Hartland, which was some time since.

The Belfast gun-house has not been sold, it would bring about fifty dollars; the lot is not owned by the State. The guns &c., were by my direction placed on the wharf for the purpose of being removed to the arsenal at Bangor, when H. W. Cunningham seized the same, and he should be held responsible for the same.

My bill accompanies this report.

GEN. GREENLIEF WHITE, Acting Q. M. General:

Sir.—I was authorized by Alfred Redington, under date of Dec. 5, 1850, then acting Q. M. general, to dispose of the several gunhouses in the county of Cumberland, and to transfer the State property contained in them, to the arsenal at Portland, or to that at Bangor. In obedience to that direction, I have attended to said business, and now make my report to you.

I found on examination four gun-houses in the county, viz: in Gray, Westbrook, Danville, and Freeport.

At Gray I found two brass six pounders, and in excellent condition, as also were all the harnesses and other fixtures belonging to the same. These I transferred to the arsenal at Portland, and subsequently sold the gun-house to Moses Plummer, Esq., for fifty dollars, this being the newest and most valuable one in the county. The lot when it ceased to be used by the State for a gun-house, reverted back to its former proprietors.

At Westbrook I found the gun-house vacant, but upon enquiring of Capt. Geo. T. Hedge, keeper of the arsenal at Portland, he informed me that he had caused the ordnance of the State to be transferred from Westbrook to the arsenal by order of Gen. Redington; that said pieces were brass six pounders and in prime order. They were shown me, and I found such to be the fact. The gunhouse there was small and a very old one, and the lot was of little value; they were sold at auction. The lot was purchased by Mr. Joel H. Murray for seven dollars, and the building by Rufus Morrill for twenty-nine dollars.

At Danville the artillery pieces were two brass four pounders, which, with the fixtures, were in fair condition; these I transfered to the arsenal, and upon a subsequent visit, sold the gun-house to Mr. F. B. Cobb, of Danville, for the sum of thirty-five dollars. The lot was deeded to the State by Mr. Edward Little, for a nominal sum, as long as used for a gun-house, which of course reverted back to the heirs of said Little.

At Freeport I could not find the key to the gun-house; and on the next morning after my arrival I entered by force, where I found it had been entered during the night, (by several persons I should judge,) and the two brass three pounders taken from the carriages, carried away and secreted; nothing else was missing. The carriage fixtures, &c., I had removed to Portland, all of which were in decent order. The gun-house was old and poor, having been built more than half a century ago; the lot was also of little value, being some distance from the village. These I had sold at a subsequent date at auction. The gun-house was sold to Mr. Charles Andrews for thirty-seven dollars and twenty-five cents, and the lot to Mr. David Dennison for seven dollars.

I have arranged with persons there to inform me if any information is gained of the missing pieces, and I doubt not they will yet be secured.

I have searched thoroughly the records in the register's office at Portland, but can find no record of the lot of thirty acres situated in Freeport, deeded to Maine by Massachusetts.

The gun-house and lot in Portland had already been disposed of by Capt. Hedge, as he informed me, by direction of Gen. Redington, and the proceeds of sale passed over to him.

By a resolve of August, 1850, authorizing the sale of such property contained in the Arsenals as the interest of the State demanded, after a personal examination thereof I directed that eight brass cannon, being unfit for service, be shipped to Boston, and there sold at auction; this was done, and they were sold for the sum of \$648 70, from which deducting the expense of the sale and of transportation, \$35 79, there is left as net proceeds to the credit of the State, \$602 91. I found in the Arsenal at Bangor a lot of old tin ware, &c., of little value, which I ordered sold at auction; this was done by M. Saunders, jr., keeper of the Arsenal, for \$193 12—the expenses of this sale was 19 81; leaving \$173 31 to the credit of the State.

There was a lot of harnesses, wheels, saddles, old iron, which was sold by the keeper of the Arsenal, at private sale, for \$608 36, which is credited to the State without deduction.

There has been received by George T. Hedge, keeper of the Arsenal at Portland, for sales of unserviceable ordnance since I entered upon the duties of the office, the sum of \$1,700. Should a detailed account of the articles sold, for which this sum was received, be desired, it will be furnished.
