STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED

AND FIFTY-FIVE.

AN ACT for the promotion of Medical Science in the State of Maine.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of any warden,

- 2 superintendent, governor or commissioner of the alms
- 3 house departments, or other officer having any charge
- 4 of any of the prisons, penitentiaries or alms house de-
- 5 partments of the State, supported entirely at the pub-
- 6 lic expense, and of the overseers of the poor of any
- 7 town, and the mayor and aldermen of any city in this
- 8 State, to deliver to any regular chartered medical col-
- 9 lege or school in this State, or on application from
- 10 the trustees or teachers thereof, or any regular physi-

11 cian duly qualified according to law, for the purposes 12 of medical or surgical study, the remains or bodies of 13 any persons dying in any of the aforesaid institutions, 14 under the charge of said officers, or the remains or 15 bodies of such persons as are required to be buried at 16 public expense, within their respective towns or cities, 17 to be by them used in this State for the advancement 18 of anatomical and physiological science, the preference 19 in all cases to be given to medical schools or colleges 20 established in this State as aforesaid, for their use in 21 the instruction of students: Provided, that the said 22 person so dying shall not have requested to be buried, 23 or shall not have been claimed or demanded for inter-24 ment by any relative or friend of said deceased person 25 within twenty-four hours after death, and satisfying the 26 proper authority thereof; in which case said remains 27 shall not be so delivered but shall be interred in the 28 usual manner.

SECT. 2. No person who may be known to have 2 relatives, whether near or abroad, and no one confined 3 for debt, or as a witness, or on suspicion of crime, and 4 no proper traveller, shall be delivered for the purposes 5 aforesaid; but shall be buried in the usual manner;

- 6 and it shall be the duty of said wardens and said other
- 7 officers to faithfully protect the rights of humanity,

It shall be the duty of the said teachers

- 8 which these provisions are intended to secure.
- 2 of said schools and colleges and said physicians to 3 provide for the interment and to inter in proper coffins 4 and appropriate cemeteries, the remains of all bodies 5 after they shall have answered the objects of this act; 6 and that the expenses of said interment shall be paid 7 by said teachers and physicians; and for any viola-
- 8 tion of this provision, they shall, on conviction, forfeit '9 for the benefit of the *poor*, not less than twenty-five
- 10 or more than fifty dollars. And any overseer of the
- 11 poor in the town in which such forfeiture shall be
- 12 incurred, may prosecute for, and recover the same.
 - Sect. 4. The remains or bodies of such as may be
 - 2 delivered to the medical schools, colleges or physicians
 - 3 as aforesaid, shall be used for the purposes described
 - 4 in this act, in this State only, and whoever shall re-
 - 5 move such remains beyond the limits of this State,
 - 6 shall, on conviction thereof, be adjudged guilty of a
 - 7 criminal offence, and shall be imprisoned in the State

- 8 prison in this State, for a term of not less than one 9 year.
- Sect. 5. All acts inconsistent with this act, are 2 hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect from and 3 after its approval by the governor.
