REPORT.

LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1860.

To the Governor and Council of Maine:

I herewith submit the Annual Report of the operations of this Department the present year.

Under Resolves of the last Legislature, I have expended on roads and bridges the sum of \$3,465 43, as follows :

On the bridge leading from the town of Princeton to Indian township, in Washington county, the town of Princeton having completed the bridge according to the conditions of the Resolve,	\$400 00

I have appointed as agents to expend the foregoing appropriations, Messrs. Eben Woodbury of Houlton, J. B. Blanchard of Blanchard, Seward Dill of Phillips, R. S. Rich of Thorndike, and John Sawtelle of Princeton. Their returns, in so far as they have been made, are highly satisfactory; and I have assurances from the most reliable sources, that the appropriations have been faithfully and advantageously expended.

The Legislature, at its last session, authorized me to expend the sum of three thousand dollars in building a bridge over the Aroostook river, in the town of Maysville, provided the inhabitants of Aroostook should raise and expend an equal amount, "and sufficient to complete said bridge to the satisfaction of the Land Agent."

Early in the summer, I was informed by leading citizens of that county that the sum contemplated by the Resolve had all been subscribed, and I accordingly appointed Ferdinand Tinker, Esq., of Calais, to make the necessary surveys and estimates, and report forthwith to this Department. Mr. Tinker performed this service in a thorough and satisfactory manner, assuring me that a substantial and permanent bridge could be erected for the sum thus subscribed, together with the appropriations made by the Legislature.

Mr. Tinker was then instructed to collect the subscriptions and commence operations on the plan reported by him on the completion of his survey. He has succeeded in raising, in money, labor, and building materials, the sum of twenty-seven hundred dollars, and has expended that amount. In some respects, the season has been unfavorable, the drought in the early part of the summer having rendered it difficult to procure the lumber as fast as needed.

The heavy loss sustained by many of the subscribers at Presque Isle, by reason of the destructive fire that occurred in that place in the early part of the season, rendered it almost impossible for them to meet their subscriptions; and although the amount unpaid is very small, I am forbidden by the provisions of the Resolve to advance the sum appropriated, till the whole subscription shall have been paid in and expended. A few hundred dollars will secure the bridge against the dangers of the spring freshet, and I would respectfully suggest that the necessary appropriation be made by the Legislature, if the delinquent subscribers shall find themselves unable to make good their pledges.

In compliance with Resolves passed at the last and previous sessions of the Legislature, and under the direction of the Gover-

nor and Council, I have caused to be lotted for settlement, and the more effectual protection of the timber, in whole or in part, the following townships: No. 14, Range 4; M, R. 2; 9, R. 4; 9, R. 6; 11, R. 3; L, R. 2; also, 3, R. 4, and 3, R. 5, west of Bingham's Kennebec Purchase, in the county of Franklin, and the S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of No. 6, R. 6, conveyed by my predecessor, in 1859, to Hon. John Appleton and Charles E. Dole.

Public lots have been located in Nos. 12, R. 3, 12, R. 4, and 13, R. 3; and some lots in Eaton Grant have been divided for the convenience of settlers. In No. 5, R. 13, lines have been run between the State lands and that part of said township conveyed to G. K. and E. D. Jewett, and roads have been located for settlers. I have caused to be located in this township 1000 acres of land for public uses.

Division lines have been run in sundry blocks conveyed in No. 4, R. 13.

Roads have also been located for the accommodation of settlers in Nos. 3, R. 5, and 4, R. 4.

Of the towns set apart for settlement in Franklin county, only the south half of No. 3, R. 4, has been lotted, though the exterior lines of both townships have been traced out, and in accordance with the provisions of the Resolve a road has been located from Rangely settlement, some six or eight miles towards the Canada line.

These surveys have been required by the wants of the settlers already located, and the increasing applications for new lots by emigrants from the older portions of our own State, and from other sections of New England, and New York, and have been committed to Benj. F. Cutter of Standish, Jona. Russ of Farmington, Hiram Chapman of Newcastle, Lore Alford of Oldtown, John Gardiner of Calais, David Haynes of Patten, and Luther H. Eaton of Bangor. The surveyors have all closed their field work, and will undoubtedly make their returns within the time allowed by law.

By a Resolve of the Legislature, approved March 14, 1860, the Land Agent is authorized "to convey a strip of land on the eastern side of Indian township, in the county of Washington, one mile in width, to any parties who shall build a good turnpike road across said township." I have appointed Putnam Rolf, Esq., of Princeton, to lay out the road contemplated by the Resolve.

He will in due time make his report to this Department, and I

am assured that a responsible party will make the road as soon as it shall have been located.

Before Massachusetts conveyed to Maine her interest in her lands here, sales of timber had been made by that State, some limited and others unlimited, as to the time for removing the timber from the townships thus permitted, but with a promise or condition expressed, that "if any part of said premises shall be sold for settlement, the timber shall be removed from the land which may be so sold, the next lumbering season after notice of such sale shall have been given" to the grantees.

Since the date of purchase by this State, several of the townships permitted have been lotted for settlement, and the lots entered upon, under certificates issued by the land department, and in some instances the settlers, while acting in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes, found themselves in conflict with the grantees or assigns, and additional legislation may be required to relieve these cases from embarrassment.

I am not clear as to the course to be pursued in serving notice upon the holders of these permits. It is claimed on the one hand, that the certificate alone constitutes a sale, while on the other hand it is urged that all the duties required by the settler shall have been performed before the grantees or assigns shall be obliged to vacate the lots, under the permits held by them for removing the timber.

It is respectfully suggested that some action be taken to relieve the department of the embarrassment incident to these relations of the grantees to those of the settler.

This department has paid into the Treasury, during the past year, \$31,452.81.

The Legislature of 1859 passed a resolve, "that payment of one-third part of the principal and interest due the State on all the notes given for any tract of land is hereby required to be made, on or before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and sixty; one-third part September 1st, 1861; and the remaining balance on such notes on or before September 1st, 1862.

"If any such payments shall fail to be made in the manner, and at the times aforesaid, all the tracts, townships or parcels, for which the notes so unpaid were given, shall be, and the same are hereby declared forfeited to the State, without any further time for reclaiming the same, together with all the payments made thereon."

With few exceptions, payments were made in compliance with the provisions of the resolve.

The demand for timber lands for several years past has been so slight, that the Governor and Council have directed no sales of townships or parts of townships, as they are authorized by law to do, and the receipts for lands sold have consequently been very light.

By an act of the last Legislature, the Land Agent is authorized to sell timber upon the public lands; and in accordance with the provisions of said act, I have sold permits on several townships and parts of townships, which will insure some operations, and add a few thousand dollars to the receipts from this department, the ensuing year. From all the sources at the command of the department, I feel assured that the payments into the Land Office for the year 1861, will reach, at least, the sum of fifty thousand dollars.

The steady settlement of the public lands in Aroostook, and the consequent rapid development of the wealth of that extensive region, must prove extremely gratifying to every intelligent observer of the progress of our State. In the decade just closed, the increase of population in the county has been in the unprecedented ratio of eighty per cent., the aggregate in 1850 being 12,533, and in 1860, 22,489. Large as this appears, it yet fails to give a proper idea of the present rate of growth, for during the last three years, the additions to the population have been quite as large as they were the first seven years of the decade, and there is a steady annual increase, not only in the aggregate but in the ratio, reckoning from the fixed number in 1850.

In population, Aroostook is now larger than Piscataquis, Franklin or Sagadahoc, and falls only about five thousand behind Lincoln. While the increase in population is thus gratifying in *quantity*, a still larger field for congratulation is found in the *quality* of the people who are settling there.

In no section of our country can a more intelligent and enterprising class of men be found—a class better fitted to endure the toils and privations of frontier life, or to establish the institutions, which are at once the distinguishing mark and the ornament of a New England community. During the year just closing, their industry has been rewarded with the most abundant crops, and the inhabitants are more than ever persuaded that Aroostook is destined to be the most beautiful and productive portion of our State. So impressed are they with the advantages of their location, that ordinary discouragements do not affect them, and hence the dis-

astrous fire at Presque Isle, though operating injuriously for a time, seems to have been no serious draw-back to the prosperity of the community.

Among the causes leading to this rapid development of Aroostook, the most potential and decisive is that to be found in the beneficent policy pursued by the State, in regard to its settling lands. Sold as they are at the low price of fifty cents per acre, and payment received in work on the public roads, within three years from the date of purchase, an opportunity is afforded for industrious and worthy men to acquire an independence on easier terms than can elsewhere be presented—realizing, indeed, on our own soil all the advantages for the poor man, that may be expected to result from the Homestead Bill, when its principle shall be applied by Congress to the National Domain.

The efforts of my predecessor in office, (Hon. Noah Barker,) were judiciously and most effectively directed to disseminating a knowledge of the advantages presented by Aroostook, and in this way the attention of those seeking new homes has been enlisted. Emigration has thence been attracted from all parts of New England, and from the adjoining provinces of Great Britain, and in the success which has attended the labors of these pioneer husbandmen and in the contentment which characterizes the entire population of Aroostook, we have the most reliable promise of the future growth and continued prosperity of that important section of our State.

In addition to the encouragement to immigration which has been afforded by the merely nominal price of land, the liberal policy of the State in regard to roads and bridges, has been attended with very excellent results. With this increase of the facilities of intercommunication, and the anticipated connection at the proper season with the railroad lines of the State, the people of Aroostook feel every assurance that their agricultural products will never be without a good market, and that, in this respect, they are far more eligibly located than those who are settled in the distant Northwest. Thus far there has been a home market for all products, at highly remunerative prices, and it is believed that facilities for market will increase in quite as rapid a ratio as the production will demand. It will be the aim of this department to do all in its power to guard the rights of the settlers, and to add to their prosperity, in the belief that by thus enhancing the value of that portion of our domain, the highest interests of the State will be most certainly and effectually promoted.
