

#### MAINE STATE LIBRARY.

#### STATUTE REGULATIONS.

Books may be taken from the Library by the Governor, Members of the Council, and of the Legislature, Judges of the Judicial Courts, Secretary of State, Deputy Secretary of State, Adjutant General, Attorney General, Land Agent, Reporter of Decisions, Counsel engaged in argument of causes before the law courts in the middle district, Superintendent of Public Buildings, Superintendent of Common Schools, Superintendent of the Insane Hospital; Chaplains, Secretary, and Assistant, Secretary of the Senate; Chaplains, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk of the House; Secretary and Members of the Board of Agriculture, during the session of the Board, provided that this privilege to the Members of the Legislature, and those officially connected therewith, shall be limited to the time the Legislature shall be in session.

Any person taking books from the Library shall first give sufficient personal security for their return within twenty days.

No person authorized to take books from the Library shall be permitted to have at any one time more than three volumes, nor shall the same be retained more than three weeks, and all shall be returned on or before the first day of January annually.

The following books shall not be taken from the Library room, except for the use of either House, or of the Committees of the Legislature during its session, or for use in the Supreme Judicial Court in term time; all books presented by the United States or any of the States; all works, books and documents relating to the laws, or Legislative proceedings of the United States or other States or countries, all digests, reports of decisions, and works relating to the science of the law, and Vattemare's exchanges.

Every person shall be answerable for all damage done by him to any book, and in case of the loss of any volume belonging to a set, the person answerable therefor shall procure a new volume or pay in money the value of the set.

Actions for the breach of said regulations may be brought by the Librarian in his own name for the use of the State, and in case of his death or removal from office, the action shall survive and be prosecuted by his successor.

## REPORT.

To the Honorable Legislature of Maine:

In compliance with 5th section of chapter 25 of Public Acts, approved March 13th, 1861, I submit the following

#### REPORT:

I have received from the State Treasury, during the past year, on account of the Library, the sum of two hundred seventy-eight dollars and fifty cents, \$278.50.

The expenditure for the purchase of books for the Library, for the same period, has been two hundred sixty dollars and eighty-six cents, \$260.86.

I subjoin a list of all books, maps and charts, acquired during the year, by purchase, donation and exchange.

I received charge of the Library July 1, 1861. There had not been at that time any arrangement or classification of the books in the present Library room.

By the Act of March 13, 1861, a catalogue of all books, maps, charts and works was ordered to be made under the direction of the Governor and Council.

The work was begun by my predecessor in the latter part of July, but was not completed when it passed out of his charge, about the middle of December, 1861.

Since that time the arrangement and classification of the books in the different alcoves and upon the shelves of the Library have been completed.

Much improvement in the appearance of the room, and increased facility in turning to any volume sought, have resulted from this.

The Catalogue not being completed as early as was expected and arranged for by the Governor and Council, I am unable to present many interesting statistical facts which its completion would have enabled me to make.

.Many volumes are wanting to complete sets of important public documents, published by authority of Congress. Measures will be taken to procure them as soon as practicable. It is not to be doubted that members of Congress from this State will aid, as they have heretofore done, in filling the sets with the missing volumes.

The books added to the Library by purchase the past year are of a high standard character. The State is indebted to the kind labors of His Excellency, Governor Washburn, for their judicious selection and very moderate cost.

The number of books received by exchange with the States has been limited, by reason of the distracted condition of the country, and the same cause has doubtless prevented the frequency of exchanges, which would have taken place but for this in other directions. I hope to see the current of exchanges flowing freely again at an early day.

Donations have been fewer than usual, as will be seen by reference to the list.

There are many suggestions occurring to me, in relation to the improvement of the arrangement and the furnishing of additional books, but all involve the outlay of sums which are likely to exceed the appropriation for the coming year, and in the present and prospective financial condition of the State, I do not feel authorized to urge the adoption of any measures for an increase of the Library beyond the appropriation required by the Act of March 13th, 1861.

While the interests of the whole people require a liberal support to this institution, and the evidences of its prosperity are seen in the wide diffusion of general intelligence, and generous aid which the State has heretofore afforded, and while much remains to be done before we can claim to rank with similar institutions of some sister States, yet enough has already been accomplished to prove the determination of Maine to provide as fully and speedily for the wants of her population, in this direction, as a prudent zeal will permit.

And therefore, at a time like the present, when so many imperative claims, entirely foreign to our ordinary financial condition, are being made on our population, it seems but just that public institutions shall yield somewhat of their usual claims, and thus keep pace with the cheerful sacrifices made by all classes of patriotic citizens.

By cheerful concession, when the public mind is, of necessity, occupied with more stirring scenes than the pleasant quiet of a well filled library affords, it is to be hoped that the same public will come to its aid with renewed and increased supplies when the present troubles shall have overpassed, and the scenes of war shall have yielded to the happier influences of honorable peace.
