### REPORT.

TREASURER'S OFFICE, Augusta, December 31, 1861.

To the President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Representatives:

Amount of ordinary receipts for civil purposes,

Chapter 2, Section 41 of the Revised Statutes, requires the Treasurer, on the first Monday after the meeting of the Legislature, to lay before the two houses thereof, a printed detailed account of the state of the Treasury. By authority of a resolve of the Legislature, approved February 5, 1861, that portion (\$30,000) of the public debt, which matured March 1, 1861, was renewed. The bids amounted to \$442,000, and the loan was awarded to parties who paid a premium of \$1,907.50, being within a fraction of  $6\frac{1}{3}$  per cent.

To carry into effect an act of the Legislature, approved April 25, 1861, authorizing the enrolling and mustering into the service of the State ten regiments of volunteers, the sum of \$1,000,000 was appropriated to defray the expenditures—and a resolve of the Legislature, approved April 25, 1861, authorized the Treasurer, with the advice of the governor, to procure on the faith of the State, a loan or loans, reimbursable at such times as in their opinion would be most advantageous to the State.

In accordance with said resolve, the Treasurer negotiated three loans, amounting to the sum of \$800,000, viz:

\$250,000, May 10, 1861. 300,000, July 1, 1861. 250,000, August 1, 1861.

Each loan payable in ten years from date, with 6 per cent. interest, payable semi-annually. In response to the advertisements for the loans, bids were received amounting in the aggregate to \$1,883,000, and a premium received of \$3,087.50, being  $\frac{1}{3}$  of one per cent.

The larger portion of the loan was taken by citizens of this State, who promptly offered to take much more than was required. It may be noticed that the premium received was small, compared with that received on the March loan,—but it will not be forgotten that many States from necessity were in the market at the same time negotiating loans for large amounts,—yet it will be found that our loan was taken upon terms as favorable at least, as that of other New England States.

The United States having refunded \$200,000 on account of expenses incurred in raising the ten regiments, it was only necessary to raise by loan \$800,000 to attain the maximum of expenditures authorized by the act of April 25.

By an act of Congress, approved August 5, 1861, a direct tax of \$20,000,000 is levied upon all the States, payable June 30, 1862. The proportion of the State of Maine is \$420,826. The act provides that any State may assume its portion of the tax, and assess, collect and pay into the Treasury of the United States its quota of the direct tax in its own way and manner by and through its own officers, with a deduction of 15 per cent., if assumed and paid on or before the last day of June, 1862. It further provides that any State may be allowed the amount of any liquidated and determined claim against the United States in payment of the direct tax, and be allowed the same deduction, as would be allowed if paid in money.

If the Legislature should determine to assume the direct tax levied by the United States and to set off so much of their claims for uniforming, arming, equipping and transporting troops, as may be allowed in payment of the same, and thereby postpone assessing the amount immediately upon the people under the existing depression of business, it seems to me that it would be sound

policy to provide for the payment of our former debt as it matures, as well as the interest on the war loan, by an increase of the State tax, so that we should be in a condition to provide for the war loan at maturity, having essentially lessened our former debt and interest.

A State tax of \$300,000 will be required the coming year to pay the interest on the public debt, that portion (\$50,000) of the principal falling due March 1, 1863, and defray the ordinary expenses of government now required by existing laws, and not including any extra appropriations that may be made by the Legislature at its present session.

Should the Legislature consider that a greater necessity now exists than ever before for withholding the bank tax (\$75,000) and interest on the permanent school fund (\$9,000), or a part thereof, say \$48,000, equal in amount to the interest on the war loan, then the State tax might be diminished by the amount thus withheld.

\$30,000 of the public debt will be due March 1, 1862, and it is desirable that it should be paid at maturity without renewing, but should the Legislature determine to renew, that sum would be added to the receipts for 1862.

The receipts from the Land Office during the past year amounted to the sum of \$26,308.17, viz:—On general account, \$21,743.23, on permanent school fund, \$3,576.36, and on lands reserved for public uses, \$988.58.
