# FORTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE.

#### SENATE.

# STATE OF MAINE.

Resolved, That it is the duty of congress, by such 2 means as will not jeopard the rights and safety of the 3 loyal people of the south, to provide for the confisca-4 tion and liberation of every slave, belonging to any 5 person who shall continue in arms against the authority 6 of the United States, or who shall, in any manner, aid 7 and abet in the present wicked and unjustifiable re-8 bellion.

Resolved, That congress has the constitutional right 2 "to raise and support armies," and to call upon all 3 able-bodied men, of every color or condition, in this 4 perilous crisis of our country, to take up arms for its 5 defence, and if the men who have been held by rebels 6 as slaves, are found capable of bearing arms, and per-7 forming efficient military service, it is the duty of the 8 government to arm and equip them, and to employ

9 their services against the rebels, under proper military10 regulations, discipline and command.

Resolved, That congress should grant to all such men 2 who may enlist in the army, the pay, clothing and 3 subsistence of a soldier, and take steps for colonizing 4 them at the end of their service, and also for colonizing 5 others who may be confiscated, so far as it may be 6 practicable, in some place or places of the Union, 7 where the climate is congenial to them.

Resolved, That all vacant and unoccupied lands, held 2 by states which have entered into an unconstitutional 3 confederation, for the purpose of making war upon the 4 Union, should by act of congress, be immediately con-5 fiscated to the United States, to be appropriated ac-6 cording to the discretion of congress, for the benefit of 7 manumitted slave soldiers, and others of African de-8 scent who should be protected, wherever lands are set 9 apart for them by a system of government appropriate 10 to their condition.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to 2 the senators and representatives in congress from this 3 state, and that they be respectfully requested to use 4 all honorable means to secure the passage of acts em-5 bodying their spirit and substance.
