To the President of the Senate and

Speaker of the House of Representatives :

THE following statement of the receipts and expenditures of all public money for the year ending December 31, 1863, and an account of the state of the Treasury, is respectfully laid before the two Houses of the Legislature.

The receipts from all sources amounted to the sum of \$2,062,399.78, and the expenditures to the sum of \$1,791,932.84.

At the date of my last Report, the public debt of this State was \$1,472,000, of which \$50,000 has since been paid, and during the year 1863 new loans have been made amounting to \$1,000,000, leaving the present public debt \$2,422,000. Of this debt \$50,000 matures in 1864, and will be paid at maturity.

To provide for an act of the Legislature granting aid to families of volunteers, and also to procure the means for reimbursing certain banks for money advanced to the State for the payment of bounties, the Treasurer was authorized to procure a loan for the purposes aforesaid; and by authority of a resolve approved January 31, 1863, a loan dated March 1, 1863, and reimbursable in twenty years, was negotiated by the sale of bonds for the sum of \$525,000. Bids for a large amount were made, and a premium

received on said loan of \$74,926.88. From the proceeds of the aforesaid loan, there has been paid to the several banks the sum of \$343,324.86, and the Governor and Council have audited and allowed to the several cities, towns and plantations in this State, for aid furnished to families of volunteers in 1862, the sum of \$232,210.01, all of which has been paid, with the exception of \$9,374.66, which is subject to the order of the several town treasurers that have not applied for the amount allowed. A resolve of the Legislature to carry into effect an act paying a bounty to every person mustered into the service of the United States under the Conscription Act, either as principal, substitute or volunteer, authorized the Treasurer of State, with the advice of the Governor, to procure a loan not exceeding \$500,000 for the purpose aforesaid; and according to the tenor of the resolve, a loan of \$475,000 was made on the 15th of August, 1863, reimbursable in seventeen years, and for which a premium of \$28,131.25 was received. This loan was made with the expectation that all the amount realized from it would be called for, but in consequence of a large number who paid the commutation fee, and a still larger number who were exempted for cause, only \$277,565.00 has been paid for bounties, leaving \$222,435.00 to be applied to volunteers mustered into the service of the United States under the call of the President dated October 17, 1863. In addition to the above sum of \$277,565.00, there has been paid for bounties during the year 1863, \$20,625, fifteen thousand dollars of which was charged to an appropriation made for that purpose, and five thousand six hundred and twenty-five dollars was charged to the appropriation for war purposes.

By virtue of an act approved March 26, 1863, remitting a portion of the bank tax, there has been remitted to the several banks in this State, so much of their semi-annual bank tax due October 1,

1863, as amounts to the sum of \$19,839.10, and it appears by vouchers filed in this office, that the banks in this State have paid to the United States, for the six months ending October 1, a tax on their circulation and deposits of \$33,886.15, as will more fully appear from the following exhibit of the amount paid the United States and this State by each bank in Maine :

If it were possible to do so, it would be very desirable that the amount due cities and towns for aid to families of volunteers advanced in 1863, should be paid, when audited and allowed by the Governor and Council, in advance of a loan. The sum that will be called for cannot at this time be definitely ascertained, but from the increase of the State tax for 1863, probably \$100,000 can be appropriated to meet this call upon the treasury, and for the balance, it may be found necessary to use the credit of the State.

The means to meet the ordinary expenses of government for the year 1865, as well as the payment of the interest and principal of the public debt due that year, and refund to cities and towns the amount advanced by them in 1864 for aid to families of volunteers, should be provided for in the next State tax, and I would therefore recommend the assessment of a tax for the year 1864, sufficient for the purposes aforesaid.

It is a little over eighteen months since the first allotment money was received into the State treasury, from volunteers in the field, and since that time there has been received *five hundred fifty-nine thousand six hundred twenty-six dollars and thirty-seven cents*; and during the same period, there has been paid from the treasury and distributed to the persons for whose use it was allotted, the sum of *five hundred nineteen thousand seventy-six dollars and sixty cents*, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$10,549.77. Of this sum, \$36,477.25 is drawing interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and \$4,072.52 is due to, and uncalled for by towns and plantations.

The receipts from the Land Office for the year 1863 amounted to \$40,223.81, and the statute requires that the Treasurer shall state the time when each sum was received of the Land Agent, and the amount of it, which statement is as follows :

Of the above sum, \$3,000.00 was received on account of lands

reserved for public uses, \$7,427.06 on permanent school fund, and \$29,796.75 on general account.

The committee for settlement of the accounts of the Treasurer of State for the year 1862, acting by virtue of a resolve of the Legislature, approved January 24, 1863, destroyed by burning all the old bonds and coupons which had been paid by the State, and preserved in the Treasury Department, from 1842 to 1862, both years inclusive, amounting in the aggregate to *three millions, two hundred and thirty thousand, eight hundred and eight dollars and twenty-six cents* (\$3,230,898.26), and as evidence of such destruction, made a record and report thereof to the Legislature, under date of February 4, 1863.
