Liabilities of the State of Maine, January 1, 1866.


At the time of the session of the last Legislature, the heary strain upon the finances of the State and Nation still continued. The dark days of the rebellion were still upon us, demanding additional sacrifices and calling for increased expenditures.

Among the questions engaging the attention of the Legislature, none were more pressing than that of finance. The State had already funded a heavy debt. To continue to sell its bonds must, from very weight, endanger the financial integrity. The policy of the past was changed, The resolution was taken to tax the people, not only for all current expenditures and for the debt maturing during the year, but, for a sinking fund, looking to the ultimate extinguishment of the entire war debt. This tax in the aggregate amounted to $\$ 2,449,122$, a heavy burden upon the people, iu addition to the necessary expenditures of towns. And yet, from careful observation, it is safe to conclude, that no legislation for years, has met a more hearty response. Almost the entire community seemed willing, if not anxious to be taxed for results so desirable. It will, undoubtedly, be regarded safe to continue a policy so acceptable to the people and so essential to the integrity of the State. To meet the current wants, until January 1, 1866, when the tax alluded to, is due the State, the Eegislature, by resolve of February 20, 1865, provided for a "temporary loan" of one million of dullars or so much thereof as might be needed.

To what extent the Treasury has availed itself of this provision will be seen by reference to statement in former part of this report.

The largest item in the aggregate to be provided for, in the early part of the year was about $\$ 750,000$ to be paid towns for aid to families of soldiers.
It was early seen that if a loan of anything near a million was placed upon the market it would hazard the credit of the State and largely increase the rate of interest. Again it must be sought abroad, thus ultimatealy carrying whatever of interest must be paid, out of the State. Further than this, the resolve referred to limited the rate of interest to "six per cent." Here was policy and limitation both leaning in the same direction.

An appeal was made to the towns asking them to receive "certificates of indebtedness" for bills of "soldiers' aid," on interest, to January 1st, 1866, and receivable at that date, principal and interest, on State tax.

The towns, in the spirit of generosity, (not however in conflict
with their own interest, as afterward proven,) promptly responded in the affirmative to the amount of some $\$ 500,000$, thus saving the interest at home, and so relieving the Treasury that the necessary balance was very favorably secured. Thus it is a source of satisfaction to every citizen of Maine that her financial relations have suffered no embarrassment during the year.

By a resolve of March 19, 1864, the Treasurer was authorized to issue bonds to the amount of $\$ 3,000,000$. $\$ 2,765,000$ of the same were sold by the Treasurer of last year, as will be seen by his report, leaving $\$ 235,000$ unsold.

The same resolve authorized temporary loans from time to time, in anticipation of sale of bonds.

Under this provision, temporary loans were effected and partially paid, leaving a balance of $\$ 200,000$ to be paid in February of the current year.

For the payment of this $\$ 200,000$, my predecessor says, "The balance of the $\$ 3,000,000$ bonds will be available." Subsequent events intervened and the end was not reached. For obvious reasons, the bonds of this State, as well as all others, suffered a material depreciation during the first two or three months of the year. The sale of these bonds was limited by law, to par. Consequently but $\$ 67,500$ of the $\$ 235,000$ have been sold, leaving a balance of $\$ 167,500$ still in the Treasury.

The $\$ 200,000$ was met by other resources, and as it now seems the policy of the State to fund no more indebtedness, it will be safe to recommend such action upon the part of the Legislature as shall require the balance of said bonds to be cancelled or destroyed.

It will be seen by reference to the estimated expense for 1866 , that a material reduction in the demands upon the Treasury is anticipated. The tax of 1865, due January 1st, 1866, calls for an assessment of fifteen mills per dollar on the valuation of 1860. With rigid economy in all departments of the Government, always in itself an abiding resource--it is confidently believed that the tax of 1866 may be reduced one half from that of 1865 .

I would therefore respectfully recommend the assessment of seven and one-half mills per dollar on the valuation of 1860 , for the tax of 1866.

So signal a reduction in taxation so soon after the rebellion, and that too consistent with the policy of "pay as you go," is a gratifying result.

About one and a quarter millions, absorbed this year by taxation, will thus be left in the hands of the people, to be applied to their own wants or to the development of the resources of the State.

Should the towns, as now believed, consistent with a prompt discharge of their liabilities, be able to remit an equal amount, thus leaving two and one-half millions of the industrial proceeds of the people in the hands of the producer, it can but materially increase the general prosperity.

The "sinking fund," provided for by the last Legislature, being, $\frac{8}{4}$ of a mill on the dollar of the state valuation, amounts to $\$ 123$,775.90 in the aggregate. This continued year by year, and re-invested, is calculated to extinguish the principle of the war debt at maturity.

The law creating the sinking fund, requires the investment of the same in the bonds of our own State or those of the Uuited States. These, the Treasurer, with the advice of the Governor, is to purchase from time to time as the money is received. The con-dition of the Treasury has been such for the past few months, as to permit the purchase of bonds to the amount of $\$ 100,500$ for the above named purpose, in advance. As the bonds of our own State were deemed preferable to any other, the above amount has been invested in Maine bonds, the same being deposited in the vault of the Treasury, stamped "Sinking Fund of the State of Maine," as the law requires.

They have been purchased at the market value, varying from 95 to 96 per cent. The interest and discount saved will be an item of value to the Treasury.

Should our ability and disposition, thus to absorb our own bonds, serve to strengthen them in the market, it will be a source of pride if not of profit to the State.

The receipts from the Land Office for 1865 are twelve thousand five hundred and five dollars and eighty cents, as follows:

Of the above amount $\$ 1,860.00$ were received on account of
lands reserved for public use, $7,738.94$ on permanent school fund and $\$ 2,9.3 .86$ on general account.

The amount heretofore apportioned to the several cities, towns and plantations as "school fund," occasioned by the remitting of Bank tax and the surrender of Bank charters, is reduced to a mere fraction, amounting in 1865 to not more than $\$ 30,07506$. This defficiency was wisely provided for by the Legislature of last year.

As will be seen, the amount received into the Treasury for soldier's allotments, is fast diminishing and will soon cease altogether.

The payment of bounties to soldiers, or the refunding of the same to towns will soon cease to be a draft upon the Treasury.

The resolve of February 18, 1865, authorized the issue of "soldiers' bounty scrip" to soldiers then enlisting. Of this scrip $\$ 355,600$ have been issued and is payable at the office of the Treasury after February 1, 1867, or is receiveable for taxes assessed after 1865 . It is estimated that $\$ 200,000$ may come in for taxes assessed in 1866, and is provided for in the estimate of seven and one half mills as the rate of taxation.

Claims to the amount of $\$ 766,798.22$ have been presented to the Governor and Council, by towns, for aid furnished families of volunteers. The same bave been audited and the sum of $\$ 753$,$485.8 \pm$ allowed. Sce table hereunto annexed.
