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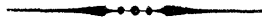

# ADJUTANT GENERAL'S REPORT.

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## STATE PENSIONS FOR 1866.

The following act of the Legislature was approved February 23d, 1866 :

AN ACT authorizing Pensions for Disabled Soldiers and Seamen.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECTION 1. Any person who has served in the army or navy of the United States, in the war of eighteen hundred and sixty-one, on the quota of Maine, and who has been disabled by wounds or other injury received in said service and in the line of duty, shall be entitled to a pension from the State of Maine, not exceeding eight dollars per month.

SECT. 2. The widow during her widowhood, orphan child or children under twelve years of age, of any soldier or seaman deceased from wounds or other injury contracted in the service while in the line of duty, shall be entitled to the same pension as is provided in section first of this act, *provided* that no more than eight dollars per month be paid to one family.

SECT. 3. Any person or persons described in sections first and second, who are not residents of Maine, or who by the pension received from the United States, with their own labor and resources, are able to obtain a livelihood for themselves and those dependent on them, shall not be entitled to the benefits of this act.

SECT. 4. All applications shall be made to the governor and council, who shall regulate the proof required to entitle applicants to the benefits of this act, and issue certificates therefor.

SECT. 5. Upon the issue of said certificate, the treasurer of the city, town or plantation, where the pensioner resides, shall be notified thereof, and the said treasurer shall pay quarterly from the treasury of said city, town or plantation, to the pensioner, the amount specified and for the time specified in said certificate, take vouchers therefor, and the same shall be reimbursed to the said treasurer from the treasury of the State on application.

SECT. 6. The necessary blanks shall be issued by the secretary of State to the clerks of cities, towns and plantations, and the expenses incurred in printing and distribution shall be paid from the treasury of the State.

SECT. 7. This act shall continue and be in force for the term of one year from its approval.

By direction of the Governor, all correspondence with municipal officers, the preparation of claims, and all business connected with

State Pensions, except the adjudication of the Governor and Council provided for in section four of the foregoing act, was entrusted to this office.

Much difficulty was at first encountered in securing, on the part of municipal officers and applicants, compliance with the requirements of the law and the regulations established by the Governor and Council.

These difficulties, however, constantly diminished, and before the close of the year, it was seldom necessary to return applications for compliance with the regulations established.

These figures show the hundreds of streams in which the State's bounty has flowed, and though the sums are in no case large, it cannot be doubted, that they have furnished great relief to the brave soldiers—maimed and wounded—to whom we are all so much indebted. These pensions should not be considered in the light of a charity, but rather as meagre contributions to the payment of a sacred debt. As long as these wounded and disabled veterans remain in our midst, we should consider it our pleasure, as it assuredly is our duty, to keep them at least from absolute want.

## REGIMENTAL COLORS AT THE STATE HOUSE.

The colors of all but two (the 22d and 23d Infantry) of our Maine Regiments, and the colors of all our batteries have been placed in the Rotunda of the State House, arranged by the taste and judgment of J. H. Cochrane, Deputy Secretary of State. They are memorials of the glory and horrors of war, the infinite crime of the Rebellion, and the energy, sacrifices and victory of a free people. The representatives of the people pass to their halls of deliberation, beneath these tattered ensigns, which have been borne on many a bloody field, and which will perpetually remind of the cost and value of free institutions.

Besides these colors there are placed in the Rotunda the swords of two gallant and lamented officers—Lieut. Col. Geo. F. Leppien of the 5th Maine Battery, and Capt. Albert F. Thomas of the 2d Maine Battery—who gave up their lives in the service of their country. The interesting correspondence on the occasion of the presentation of these relics is given in the Appendix.

### CERTIFICATES TO HONORABLY DISCHARGED SOLDIERS.

There was given to each soldier on his muster out of service, a discharge paper signed by his commanding officer and the mustering officer. This paper is the only evidence, which the soldier has with him, of having served in the army. It is liable to be defaced and lost, and cannot be duplicated. It is neither convenient in form nor ornamental in appearance, and must accompany every application to Washington for pension or bounty. Probably not two-thirds of our soldiers who have served honorably are now in possession of their discharge. I respectfully recommend that a certificate, finely engraved, and suitable for framing, be prepared to be signed by the Governor and Adjutant General and presented to each honorably discharged soldier from Maine. This would be a certificate from the Chief Magistrate of his State, that, in the great war of the Rebellion he bore an honorable part, and would be treasured with jealous care, and transmitted to his children with pride.

MILITIA.

Nothing has been done towards organizing the militia of Maine under the act of February 23, 1865, and, except the companies of State Guards hereinafter mentioned, there is no active or volunteer militia in the State. The companies of State Guards were organized in 1863 for active service within the State upon any emergency, and readily responded to such calls as were made upon them. Companies A and B of Bangor, (Lieut. Marshall Dyer and Capt. Josiah S. Ricker,) when invited by the Governor, did escort duty in an admirable manner on occasion of the reception of Maj. Gen. Sheridan at the Capital. Scarcely any of these companies, however, have kept up their organization, and may be regarded as virtually disbanded.

A general enforcement of the militia law of 1865, is, on account of difficulty and expense, deemed impracticable. I respectfully recommend that a limited number of volunteer companies be organized by the Commander-in-Chief to be furnished by the State with arms, equipments and uniforms.

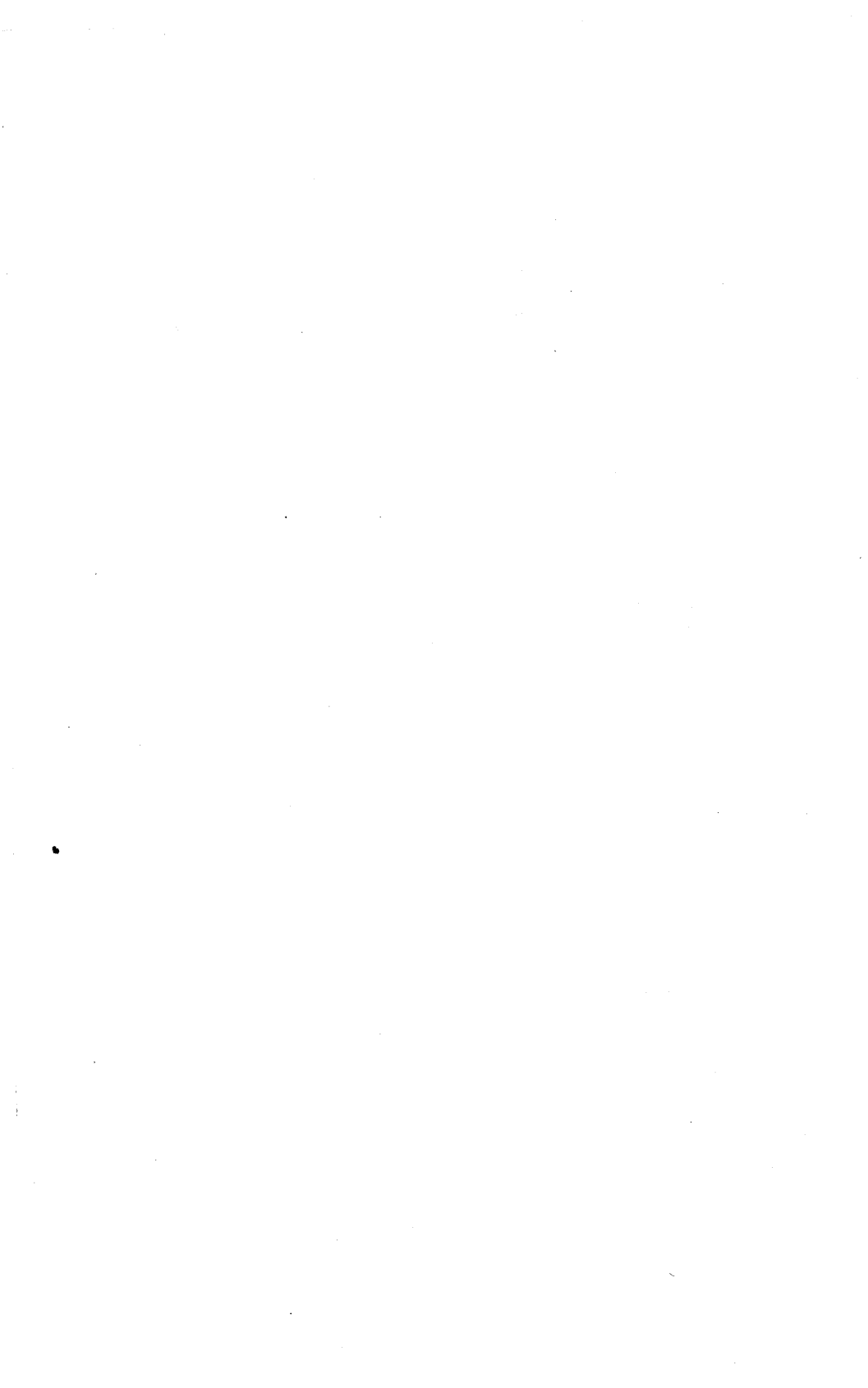

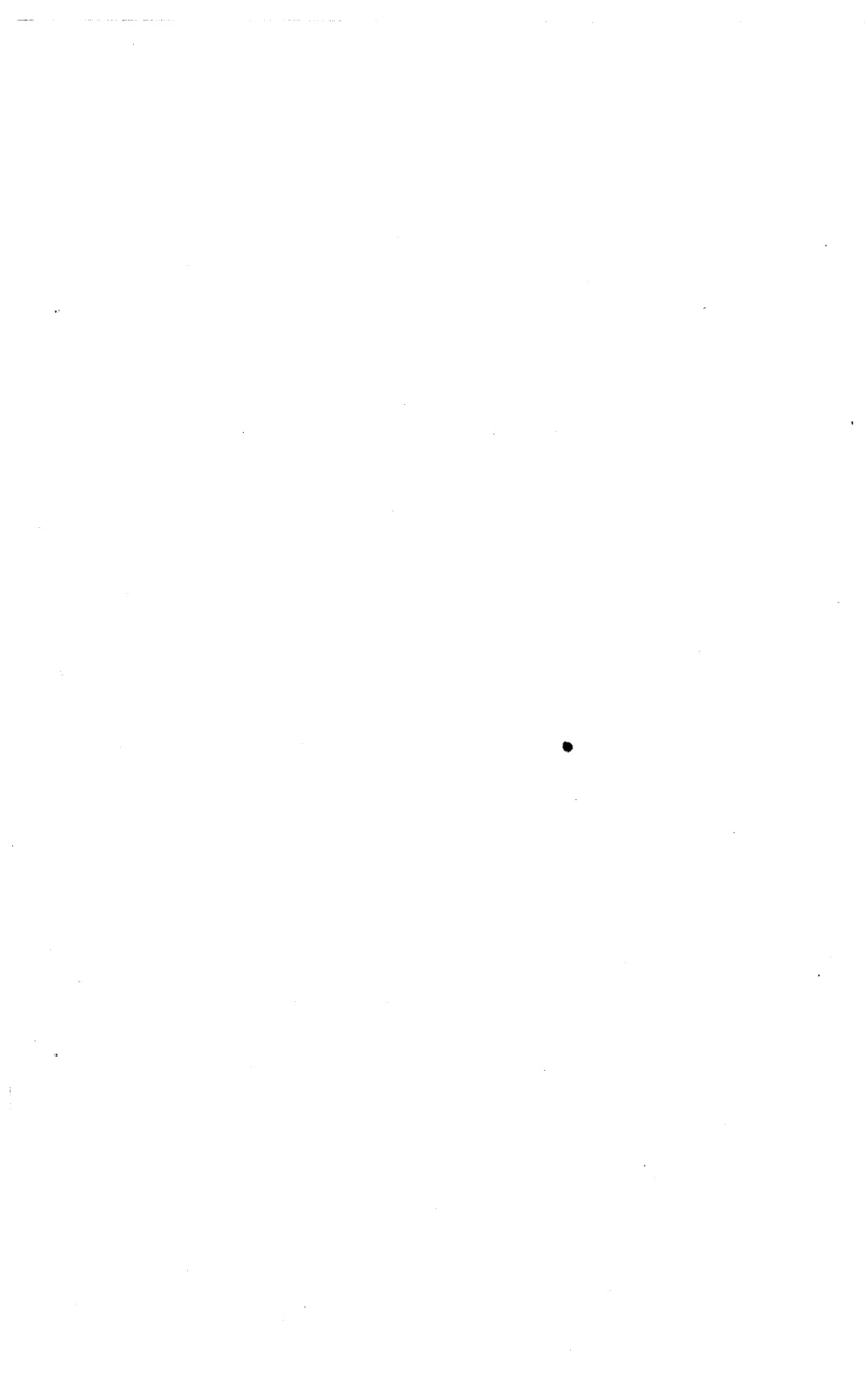

1. The Commander-in-Chief hereby announces the resignation of Brigadier General John L. Hodsdon, Adjutant General of the State. In accepting this resignation it is impossible to refrain from expressing the high appreciation in which Gen. Hodsdon's character and services are held. Called to this position on the eve of terrible and trying times, which demanded energy, tact and labor before unknown to the office, he now retires, having brought this difficult service to a graceful completion, and commanding a respect at home and abroad which may justly be called an honorable fame.

His record is written in that proud portion of our history which his own hand has recorded, but more deeply and enduringly still in the affectionate remembrance of those who have served or suffered in the war.

2. Brevet Major General John C. Caldwell having been duly appointed with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, is hereby announced as Adjutant General of this State, ranking from the 31st instant, and will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

His Excellency Gov. CHAMBERLAIN :

*Hon. and Dear Sir,*—With this I present you, and through you our beloved State, the sword of my departed son, whose life was sacrificed for his country.

It is not the trusty blade which he bore at Antietam, Cross Keyes, Cedar Mountain, Bull Run, or Fredericksburg, where for ten days we supposed him dead on the field; or at Chancellorsville or Gettysburg, where Gen. Reynolds gave him his last command only a few moments before he fell, leaving them to find their way



up the hillside with the sad knowledge of his death palsyng every heart. For three hours they kept the enemy at bay, unsupported, until their guns were disabled, their last charge of ammunition expended, with fearful loss; or at Petersburg, or any of the eighteen battles in which the 2d Maine Battery was engaged. That sword is a still more sacred relic.

This is a sword given him by those faithful hearted men, who volunteered in every sense of the word, without the bribe of bounty or reward, as a memento of their kind remembrance to their youthful companion in arms. It was as dear to him as it was unexpected.

He has left no heir, for he was the last of a family of five sons.

I commit the sacred trust, through you, to the guardianship of the State he so well loved and served.
