# **REPORT.**

LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1868.

To the Governor and Council of Maine:

In compliance with the requisitions of law, I have the honor to submit this, my Annual Report of the operations of the Land Department during the past year.

#### STATEMENT IN REGARD TO PERSONAL SERVICES.

In entering upon the duties pertaining to this department, it was found that there were numerous unsettled and conflicting claims to settlers' lots in most of the townships which had been set apart and lotted for settlement; and, that the best, and indeed, the only way in which the merits of these claims could be properly understood and equitably adjusted, was to make a personal examination of each case, on the ground, and in the presence of the parties interested. Accordingly I have devoted in all, during the past season, about two months time outside of the office, in attending to the settlement of these claims, and in examining the condition of roads and bridges, and the repairs authorized and required to be made upon them,---in conferring with local agents, and attending generally to the settling interests of the State. On this, and other business legitimately connected with the Land Department, I have made three journeys to Aroostook county during the season, and have given my personal attention to all these matters in the following townships: No. Eleven and Alva plantations, Easton, Fort Fairfield, (including Plymouth Grant), Limestone, Letter F, and Hamlin plantations,-Letter L, range two, Van Buren, Forestville, Lyndon, Woodland and Perham plantations,-Maysville, Presque Isle, Mapleton and Castle-hill plantations,-Oakfield, Island Falls, and Crystal plantations,-Sherman, and Silver Ridge plantation; besides attending to matters for the State in Calais, in connection with the sale of timber and grass on the Indian township.

For these services rendered outside of the office, I have made no extra charge.

As the Land Office is required to be kept open in Bangor at all times when the Legislature is not in session, I have retained the services of the Hon. Isaac R. Clark, my immediate predecessor in office, to whose charge the Land Office has been committed during my absence, as well as the keeping and closing up of its accounts during the entire year, a large portion of which accounts accrued previously to my entering upon the duties of the office.

#### SITUATION OF THE FRENCH SETTLEMENTS.

Finding it utterly impossible, from want of time, to attend *personally* to the duties required under the resolve entitled "Resolve authorizing the Land Agent to examine into the situation of the French settlements in the plantations of D'Aigle, Dion and Madawaska," approved February 28th, 1868, I appointed Col. David Page, of Fort Kent, to make the examination therein required, "for the purpose of determining any additional measures to be recommended for confirming them in their possessions upon lands occupied in townships eighteen range six, eighteen range five, and eighteen range four, W. E. L. S.," and to report the same to this office. It appears by Col. Page's Report as returned to the Land Office, that,—

In D'Aigle plantation, (No. 18, R. 6,) are ninety families—forty of which are occupying Treaty and Preëmption lots, amounting to about five thousand acres; and fifty families are residing upon lands owned by individual proprietors, amounting to some six thousand acres. The vacant land upon this township is of more than an average quality, with the exception of about eight hundred acres in the south-west corner.

In Dion plantation, (No. 18, R. 5,) are two hundred and thirtyfour families, about one hundred of which are residents upon Treaty or Preëmption lots, amounting to some twelve thousand acres. Forty-nine families are located upon that portion of the township owned by individual proprietors; the residue of these families occupying the part of the township belonging to the State. The unoccupied land in this township is not considered to be of an average quality for settlement, a considerable part of it being low and swampy. That occupied by the settlers is of fair quality.

In Madawaska plantation, (No. 18, R. 4,) are about one hundred and fifty families; eighty of which occupy Treaty and Preëmption lots, amounting to about nine thousand acres. Seventy of these families occupy lands owned by proprietors; about one-half of them

occupying lands situated in the S. W. corner of the township, and lying on the east and west borders of Long Lake. These seventy families occupy about eight thousand acres of land.

The foregoing statement of facts in regard to the situation of these settlers, is deemed sufficient to answer the objects contemplated by the resolve; and, if any further measures are to be taken for confirming them in their possessions on lands owned by proprietors, it must be done by an exchange of lands, or by purchase, either of which would require additional legislation.

#### QUIETING CLAIMS OF SETTLERS UNDER THE TREATY.

Under the Order of Council approved August 18, 1868, directing the Land Agent to execute, as soon as may be, such releases of title of the State, as will quiet in their possession, all persons, their heirs, or legal representatives, who were reported as entitled to be quieted by either of the commissions instituted under resolves of February 21, 1843, or the commission instituted under the resolves of April 12, 1854, who have not already been so quieted,-I appointed Hon. Noah Barker, of Corinth, a special agent under this department, with power to appoint such assistants as might be found necessary to a prompt execution of the trust imposed in him, to make the necessary preparations, and proceed to Aroostook county and ascertain the names of the present occupants, and all other persons interested as owners or otherwise. of the several lots known as Treaty lots, or Preëmption lots, who are entitled to be quieted by either of the commissions instituted as aforesaid; and to make report to this office of his doings therein, giving the facts pertaining to the title of each lot, to the end that it might be known who are entitled to deeds under said commissions, and late act of Congress relative thereto.

Interspersed as these lots are over a territory of nearly forty townships, and including the French settlements of Madawaska, in which many of the persons to be quieted in their possessions under the treaty, are still unable to understand, and to converse in the English language, the adjustment of these claims—complicated as many of them have become during the lapse of a quarter of a century—required no small amount of labor, and patient investigation.

Mr. Barker's Report, which is now in progress of completion, will furnish all the facts necessary to a right understanding of these claims, and I shall proceed to execute the deeds at the earliest date possible, in compliance with the Order of the Council.

#### SALE OF TIMBER AND GRASS.

I have closed a sale of timber and grass on Indian township of the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians, agreeably to the resolve of the Legislature, of February 29, 1868, and the Report of Council thereon, as made and approved June 19, 1868.

The conveyance was made by deed dated September 1, 1868, in conformity with the Resolve and Report of Council aforesaid, to Putnam Rolf, William Stewart, and Charles Waite, of Princeton, in the county of Washington; they being the highest and only bidders therefor. The minimum price fixed in the advertisement of said sale was five thousand dollars. The price received was five thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars. This is believed to be a good sale; and, with the reservations made in the deed, in pursuance of the resolve, for the benefit of the Indians, they will doubtless realize much more from it than they would have done from the usual method of granting annual permits for cutting the timber.

For the amount received for timber and grass sold the past year on lots reserved for public uses, reference may be had to Schedule E.

TOWNSHIPS SELECTED AND SET APART FOR COMMON SCHOOLS.

On the 19th day of August last, I selected and set apart under instructions of the Governor and Council of that date, in pursuance of a resolve entitled "Resolve relating to timber and lumber reserved for common schools," approved March 4, 1868, ten townships of land situated in the county of Somerset, and have made a record of such selections, as required by the resolve. The following is a list of the townships selected :

I have not, as yet, granted permits to cut the timber on any of these selected townships. I am offered, however, by responsible parties who are cutting pine and spruce on one of these townships, (No. 5, R. 17,) the present season, under an unexpired permit, the rate of three dollars per thousand feet for juniper, and two dollars per thousand for cedar timber, to be cut and scaled in connection with their present operation. As this offer may be as much as would be realized from a separate operation, it may be thought advisable to accept it

#### SURVEYS OF PUBLIC LANDS.

In the early part of the season, I employed Noah Barker, surveyor, to survey and establish the lines and boundaries around three fractional townships of land lying on the Canada boundary, viz. : No. 4, R. 4,—No. 5, R. 4,—and No. 4, R. 5, north of Bingham's Kennebec purchase.

This survey was deemed quite necessary, as one of these townships had been sold by the State at a fixed price per acre, the quantity being unknown at the time of sale; and the other townships were being lumbered on, under contracts at different rates of stumpage, thus making it important that the lines be established so that the lumber to be cut upon each township shall be scaled separately.

Mr. Barker was also employed later in the season, to survey a portion of township Letter B, range 10, (W. E. L. S.,) Piscataquis county, for the purpose of locating the balance of the land appropriated to the Maine Female Seminary, by an act of the Legislature, approved August 20, 1850, and which remains, as yet, to be conveyed. The Field Notes and plans of these surveys have been made and returned to the Land Office.

I also employed Albert A. Burleigh, surveyor, to renew and establish the lines of certain lots in township No. 11, R. 1, near the Monument, in order to prevent trespassing on lands of the State; and also to subdivide certain sections of land in the same township for purposes of settlement.

The same surveyor was also employed to make the survey of a parcel of land situate on the east side of Eagle Lake, in township No. sixteen, range seven, W. E. L. S., in compliance with the resolve entitled "Resolve authorizing the Land Agent to complete the contract made for selling a parcel of land," approved March 3, 1868. This survey was commenced quite late in the season, and

is not as yet completed. Hence, the Field Notes and plans of these surveys have not been returned.

#### SALES OF LAND DURING THE YEAR.

In the schedules annexed to this Report and marked A, B, C and D, the amount of lands conveyed during the year, also the names and residences of the purchasers, and the consideration for which the conveyances were made, are distinctly stated in detail.

A synopsis of these schedules will show that, during the past year, 10,514.16 acres have been conveyed on the surrender of outstanding Land Certificates for lots previously taken up for settlement; and that 3,853.13 acres have been conveyed under the provision of legislative enactments.

It will appear, also, that 24,294.52 acres have been conveyed for cash, and cash securities, under the provisions of law, amounting to nine thousand two hundred and three dollars and thirtyseven cents, (\$9,203.37); and that 11,167.32 acres have been contracted, by Land Certificates, for road-labor notes amounting to six thousand one hundred and eighty-nine dollars and two cents, (\$6,189.02);—thus showing that the total amount of lands passed by unconditional deeds, during the year, is 38,662.31 acres; besides the amount contracted to settlers by Land Certificates, as shown by Schedule D.

#### THE SETTLING LANDS OF THE STATE.

As the acts of the Legislature of March 24, 1864, and of March 3, 1868, granting certain lands to aid in the construction of the European and North American Railway, seem to have excited a degree of alarm among the settlers who had contracted for lands for settlement, as well as those who were intending to emigrate to Aroostook, it may be proper to allude briefly to that subject.

For the information, therefore, of such as may wish to make homes for themselves upon the unsettled lands of the State, it will be sufficient to call their attention to the following provisions, or reservations which were very wisely incorporated into the act authorizing the grant:

"Provided, however, that there shall be excepted from said conveyance and from the operations of this act, all lands heretofore reserved or set apart for public schools, and all lands set apart and designated for settlement under existing laws; and all the lands set apart for the purposes of settlement, shall be sold to settlers, upon the same terms and conditions by the Land Agent, as is now authorized by law:

And it is further provided, that all lands conveyed to said company under this act, which are in the opinion of the Governor. State Treasurer and Land Agent, suitable for settlement, shall be surveyed into lots by said company, of suitable sizes for the purposes of settlement, not exceeding one hundred and sixty acres to any one lot, which lands shall be open to settlers at a price not exceeding one dollar per acre, on condition of a continued residence thereon for five years, and performance of such settling duties as are now required by the State. And said company is charged with the duty of encouraging immigration into the State, and shall be required to appoint a suitable emigrant agent, and annually publish such plans, statements and other information, as shall give to the public a better knowledge of the extent, value and situation of the public lands of Maine, now open for settlement, and cause this information to be printed in our own and other languages, and distributed into other States in this Union, and into foreign lands. And the Legislature of this State shall have the right at all times to inquire into the manner in which these trusts are executed, and to pass any laws that may be necessary, and to impose fines and penalties to secure a compliance with the provisions, liabilities and duties hereinbefore set forth and enjoined."

Hence, it will be seen that, whatever views may be entertained in regard to donating any portion of the public domain in aid of this, or any other railroad enterprise, the framers of this law seemed to regard the settling interest of the State as paramount to every other; and the pioneer settler has still the right to expect the fostering protection of the State, as heretofore. The following is a list of townships which have heretofore been set apart and designated for settlement, and in which the vacant lots are still in the market at fifty cents per acre, payable in road labor, as usual, with the performance of the settling duties required by law: No. 11, B, C, D, east half of Plymouth grant, E, F and G, in the first range; F, G, H, Eaton grant, I, L and M, in the second range; south half of No. 2, No. 5, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 18, in the third range; No. 4, southwest quarter of 6, No. 12, and 14, in the fourth range; east half of No. 2, No. 3, 4, 6, 8, 10, 11 and 18, in the *fifth* range; No. 5, 9, 11, 13, north half of 17, and No. 18, in the sixth range; No. 16, 17 and 18, in the seventh range, west from the east

line of the State, and in the county of Aroostook. Several of the townships named in the foregoing list, have already been incorporated and are now more generally known by their corporate names.

As local agents to superintend the location of settlers, the payment of their road labor, and the performance of their several duties, as required by law, I have appointed, for the present year, the following persons:

Within the last few months, numerous letters of inquiry from abroad, respecting the settling lands, their price, situation, &c., have been received at this office, all of which have been duly an-

swered. These letters give indications that many of the vacant lots in these townships will be required, at an early day, for settlement.

#### EXPENDITURES UPON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The amount expended on the various roads and bridges committed to the charge of this department during the past year, may be seen by reference to the accounts, and trial balance annexed to this report.

By a resolve approved February 18, 1867, the Land Agent was authorized to pay the sum of fifteen hundred dollars when all necessary abutments and piers required in the erection of a bridge across the Aroostook river at Fort Fairfield were completed, and one thousand dollars more upon the completion of the bridge. These abutments and piers have all been completed during the past season, in a faithful and workmanlike manner; but owing to an omission to insert the above amount in the "appropriation bill," passed by the last Legislature, no part of this appropriation has, as yet, been paid. The bridge is essentially needed, and the accidental omission referred to, will doubtless be supplied by the next Legislature.

Under the provisions of the Resolve of February 21, 1867, an appropriation, not exceeding four thousand dollars, was granted in aid of the road leading from Brighton to Greenville, upon that portion between Kingsbury Mills and Blanchard Mills. The labor upon this road was commenced in the autumn of 1867, and closed the present season under the agency of Messrs. Martin L. Durgin and John Elliot, whose accounts of this expenditure have been returned to the Land Office, and settled.

An appropriation of one thousand dollars was made by a resolve approved February 24, 1868,, to aid in the construction of a permanent and substantial bridge, to be erected in place of the present floating bridge in the town of Plymouth. This amount has been faithfully expended under the agency of George B. Leavitt, Esq.

The appropriation of five hundred dollars for repairing the road leading over Indian township, in the county of Washington, was expended under the direction of Ziba Haley, Esq. of Topsfield, whose accounts are closed.

The Legislature at its last session, appropriated three thousand dollars in aid of building a good and substantial bridge over the

Aroostook river at Caribou village, provided the balance sufficient for its completion should be raised by the inhabitants. The estimated cost of building the bridge was six thousand dollars; but, as only about twelve hundred dollars have been subscribed, the work is not commenced, so that the appropriation remains unexpended. This bridge is very much needed for facilitating public travel.

The sum of eight hundred dollars, appropriated under the resolve of February 24, 1868, for repairing the Fish river road, and for reconstructing or repairing the bridge over Wallagrass stream, has been expended under the agency of Daniel Randall, Esq., of Island Falls, in accordance with the provisions of the resolve.

The sum of three hundred dollars appropriated by resolve approved February 24, 1868, to be expended on the road in Van Buren plantation, and letter L, and K, has been laid out on said road under the agency of Judah D. Teague, Esq., of Lyndon.

Under resolve approved February 29, 1868, the sum of three hundred dollars has been expended upon the road leading from Caribou Village to the Fish river road, under the agency of William E. Morse of Perham plantation.

For continuing the road and bridges from Ball's Mill, in Mapleton plantation to the town of Ashland, the sum of one thousand dollars has been expended under the agency of Hon. David Dudley, of Presque Isle, and in accordance with the resolve of February 29, 1868.

Under the resolve in aid of roads in the counties of Aroostook, Franklin, Somerset and Piscataquis, approved March 3, 1868, the following sums have been expended, viz.:

Three hundred dollars for rebuilding the bridge over the Toussant stream in Hamlin plantation, under the agency of William C. Hammond, of Van Buren ; one hundred dollars for repairing the road and bridge in No. eleven, range one, at the monument, under the agency of George W. Haskell, of Hodgdon ; three hundred dollars for building a bridge over Fish stream in Crystal plantation, under the agency of William D. Orr, of Island Falls plantation ; five hundred dollars for repairing the road leading from Lexington to Dead river, under the agency of Abraham C. Richardson, of New Portland ; one thousand dollars for making an alteration in the road leading from Kingfield to Eustis plantation, under the agency of Edward W. Hinds, of Kingfield, excepting a balance of \$285.53 remaining in his hands unexpended ; seven hundred and fifty dollars for repairing the Canada road from the Forks of Kennebec river to the Canada line, under the agency of Jonah Hilton of Sandy-bay plantation; and five hundred dollars for turnpiking and completing the State road east of Russell mountain from Kingsbury mills to Blanchard village, under the agency of Cyrus A. Packard of Blanchard. The balance appropriated under said resolve was conditional that three hundred dollars be paid for rebuilding the bridge on Fish river, at the mills near its mouth, when said bridge shall be completed to the acceptance of the Land Agent. This not having been done, the appropriation remains unexpended.

By a resolve entitled "Resolve in aid of roads and bridges in the county of Aroostook," approved February 21, 1867, the sum of fifteen hundred dollars was appropriated for building a bridge over the Mattawamkeag in township No. five, range three. Of this amount, the sum of \$1,276.33 was expended on said bridge in 1867, and of the balance unexpended in that year, the sum of \$210.73has been laid out the present year in repairing said bridge, and the road and bridges connected therewith, under the agency of A. A. and E. C. Burleigh, whose accounts have been closed.

By the same resolve, the sum of five hundred dollars was appropriated in aid of the bridge over the St. Croix at Masardis. This bridge was built during the year 1867, by the town of Masardis; but the returns were not made to this office in season to be reported by this department in that year. The bridge having been completed in a substantial manner, I have paid to the town the amount of the appropriation.

From a personal inspection of a number of the roads and bridges upon which these expenditures have been made, and from reliable information respecting the others, I am satisfied that the money has been faithfully expended, and for the specific purposes contemplated in the passage of the resolves. Wherever bridges have been built under these appropriations in the county of Aroostook, they were covered with cedar timber well hewn and fitted, and built upon firm and durable foundations. And I have no doubt that those in the other counties were constructed in a like permanent manner.

I can speak from personal knowledge, in high commendation of the bridge recently built at Plymouth, Penobscot county, under the charge of Mr. Leavitt; and in like manner of the road and bridges built on the route from Mapleton by Ball's mills to Ashland, under the charge of Mr. Dudley.

#### FINANCIAL.

The amount of securities in the Land Office in notes, bonds, executions &c., is exhibited in the Trial Balance annexed. It will be seen by the table of receipts and disbursements of the Land Office during the year, that the amount paid into the Treasury from this department is \$40,116.87, as follows:

Under the Report of Council approved August 19, 1868, I have paid the sum of \$439.18, as a reimbursement of cash heretofore paid into the Treasury, by individuals, for taxes on townships fourteen, range four, and fifteen, range five, (Aroostook County,) since and including 1860, and have, by deed dated November 23, 1868, secured a re-conveyance of said townships to the State.
