REPORT.

LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1869.

To the Governor and Council of Maine:

I have the honor to submit this, as my Annual Report of the transactions of the Land Department during the past year.

SALES OF LAND.

The schedules hereunto annexed, will exhibit the amount of lands conveyed by the State, since the date of my last Annual Report, the consideration for which the same were sold, and the names of the grantees.

By reference to these schedules, it will be seen that there have been conveyed of the public lands, for cash, 598.92 acres, for the sum of \$452.25, as per schedule marked A; under Acts and Resolves, 2,360.96 acres, as per schedule B; to settlers, on the surrender of out-standing Land Certificates, 8,273.76 acres, as per schedule C; to claimants under the Treaty of Washington, 7,970.89 acres, as per schedule D; and by Land Certificates issued to settlers, 11,189.27 acres, for notes payable in road labor, amounting to \$5,650.52, as per schedule E: thus showing that the total amount of lands conveyed by deeds, during the year, is 19,204.53 acres, besides the amount contracted to settlers, as shown by the last named schedule.

SURVEYS OF LAND.

That the State's interest may be protected in certain lots and sections of land, the outlines of which have heretofore been run, but in which fractional parts of such lots had been, from time to time, conveyed, there having been no division lines therein to designate the different ownerships, I employed Albert A. Burleigh, of Oakfield, surveyor, to subdivide the lots thus situated in

the S. W. quarter of township No. 4, R. 6; and to locate roads for the accommodation of settlers, in townships 11, R. 1, and 5, R. 3, in the county of Aroostook, agreeably to statute provision, (chap. 5, sec. 24).

The Rev. E. Knight, of Fort Fairfield, was also employed, as surveyor, to locate a road in township F, Range 1, to connect with a road previously located, and leading from Limestone to Hamlin plantation.

And I have employed Charles V. Barker, of Corinth, as surveyor, to subdivide certain mile sections for purposes of settlement in township No. 9, R. 6, on the Aroostook river; and to make lines of partition between lands owned by the State and those belonging to individuals.

Finding that a conveyance had been made to the Trustees of Monson Academy, Monmouth Academy, Limington Academy, and Corinna Union Academy, under resolve approved Feb. 23, 1861, of "all that part of township No. 11, R. 17, which lies east of a line drawn across the town from north to south, parallel with the east line thereof and six miles westerly therefrom, containing twenty-three thousand and forty acres, more or less," by deed dated Jan. 8, 1864, said land having been owned since that time by purchasers of the rights of said Trustees, thus leaving exposed to trespassers the timber on a strip, or gore, of 6,901 acres on the westerly side of the township, no partition line having been run,—and learning that lumbering operations were to be made upon said proprietors' lands, the present winter, I have given directions to A. J. Chadwick, who is to be employed as scaler of lumber in that vicinity, to run said partition line in accordance with the deed from the State, and to guard the State's interest in the gore west of said line.

On reference to the records of this office, I find that the whole of this township (11, R. 17,) had been "selected, set apart and reserved, in accordance with the requirements of a resolve of the Legislature, approved April 9, 1856, entitled a 'resolve for carrying into effect a resolve for a permanent school fund,' approved August 24, 1850," the said township so reserved, being part of the "twenty-four half townships" which, in 1856, were set apart and reserved for the benefit of "Common Schools," and "*to be held in trust for that purpose only.*"

The small balance, therefore, of 6,901 acres, after deducting therefrom *one thousand acres* for public uses—no reservation for

that purpose having been made in the conveyance—still belongs to the State, in trust, for the said “permanent school fund.”

Mr. S. M. Cary was also employed, as surveyor, to locate the road leading from the Seven Islands on the river St. John, in township No. 13, R. 15, to the Canada line, crossing the Depot stream, a branch of said river, near the boundary line. The Field Notes of this survey have been duly returned to the Land Office, and the expenses attending the same were included and paid out of the appropriations made by the Legislature in aid of said road.

LOCAL AGENTS.

For the past year I have retained the services of the following persons, residing in the vicinity of the lands set apart for settlement, as local agents to superintend the location of settlers, the payment of their road labor, and the performance of their several duties, viz :

*Col. David Page died at his residence in Fort Kent, Nov. 8, 1869, having made his annual returns to the Land Office only a few weeks prior to his death.

EXPENDITURES UPON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The various sums expended upon roads and bridges committed to the charge of this department during the past year, may be seen by reference to the accounts, and trial balance annexed to this report.

I have paid to the selectmen of the town of Lyndon, in aid of building a bridge over the Aroostook river at Caribou village, the abutments and piers of said bridge having first been built in accordance with the resolve, approved Feb. 14, 1868, the sum of \$1,500, being one half of the amount appropriated under said resolve. The superstructure of this bridge is now being built, and will doubtless be in readiness for public travel, the ensuing season.

The appropriation of \$1,200, made under resolve approved March 10, 1869, for building a bridge over Molunkus stream and repairing the Military road through township number two, range three, in the county of Aroostook, was found, on examination, to be insufficient for building a suitable bridge at that place. On examining the present bridge it was thought that, with some slight repairs, it might be rendered safe for public travel, during the present winter. I therefore directed Hugh Reed, Esq., to expend upon it such an amount only as would be necessary for that purpose. The balance of the appropriation remains unexpended, and should be reserved until such additional amount shall be appropriated, as may be sufficient for building a permanent bridge.

The sum of \$1,500 was appropriated under resolve approved March 10, 1869, for repairing the Canada road from the north line of Moscow to Canada line. After making a personal examination of this road, I deemed it best to divide it into three sections, in order to have the work progressing on the different portions of the road at the proper season. On the first section, extending from the north line of Moscow to the Forks of the Kennebec, was applied the sum of \$300, which was expended under the agency of Joseph Clark, Jr., Esq., of Caratunk. On the second section, extending from the Forks to the North line of Bingham's Purchase, the sum of \$800 was expended under the agency of Jonas Colby, Esq., of Moose River; and on the third section, extending from the north line of Bingham's Purchase to the Canada line, the sum of \$400 was expended under the charge of Otis Holden, Esq.

The sum of \$500 was appropriated under resolve approved February 21, 1867, in aid of a road leading from Seven Islands to the

Canada line; and the further sum of \$300 was appropriated for the same purpose, by resolve approved February 15, 1869, which sums have been expended the present year, by Wm. H. Cary, Esq., together with several hundred dollars raised by private contributions.

By resolve approved February 23, 1869, the sum of \$300 was appropriated for repairing the bridge over the Aroostook river at Maysville. These repairs I committed to the charge of Hon. Joel Bean, of Maysville, who has commenced the work, which will soon be completed.

The sum of \$400, appropriated by resolve approved February 23, 1869, for the road and bridge leading from Alva plantation to Bridgewater, in the county of Aroostook, has been expended under the agency of H. O. Perry, Esq., of Alva plantation.

By resolve in aid of roads in the county of Aroostook, approved February 23, 1869, the sum of \$500 was appropriated for repairing the State road leading from Caribou to Van Buren, which was expended under the agency of Michael Farrell, Esq.; and by the same resolve, the further sum of \$500 was appropriated for repairing the State road leading from Portage Lake to Fort Kent, which was expended upon said road by Daniel Randall, Esq., of Island Falls.

The sum of \$500 has been expended upon the road leading from Presque Isle, by Ball's Mills, to Ashland, (now Dalton,) in the county of Aroostook, under the agency of Hon. David Dudley, in accordance with the resolve approved February 26, 1869.

By resolve for an appropriation on the road leading from Limestone to Violette Brook, in the county of Aroostook, approved February 23, 1869, the sum of \$250 was appropriated for the purpose of opening and repairing said road, and the same was expended under the agency of Hon. William Small, of Fort Fairfield, excepting a balance of \$22.20, which is to be expended the ensuing year.

I have paid over to the selectmen of the town of Plymouth, in the county of Penobscot, the sum of \$2,000, as a "final sum to be paid by the State in aid of the completion of a permanent and substantial bridge in place of the old floating bridge"—the work having been completed agreeably to resolve approved March 11, 1869.

By a conditional resolve, approved March 9, 1869, the sum of \$300 was appropriated to aid in building a bridge over the Mada-

waska stream, in township I, in the county of Aroostook, when said bridge shall be completed to the acceptance of the land agent, but no notice has been received of its having been completed.

By resolve in aid of constructing a road through township No 5, R. 3, in the county of Aroostook, approved February 23, 1869, the sum of \$1,500 was appropriated, and the superintendence of the work was committed to Charles T. Bussell, Esq., of Oakfield plantation, who has made due returns of the expenditure of \$1,419-.46 upon said road, there being a few short sections to be finished the ensuing spring. When so completed, the balance of \$80.54 will be paid to the contractors.

By resolve in aid of the road leading from Monson to Greenville, in the county of Piscataquis, approved February 23, 1869, the sum of one thousand dollars was appropriated to aid in constructing a road leading around the Doughty hill, in the town of Monson, to be paid when said road shall have been completed to the satisfaction of the Land Agent, but this condition has not been complied with, and the above amount remains unexpended. An additional sum of \$500 was also appropriated under said resolve, to be expended in repairing the road leading from Monson to Greenville, in the town of Shirley. Of this amount, the sum of \$400 has been faithfully expended under the charge of Joseph Dennen, Esq., of said town of Shirley, agreeably to the resolve, and the balance will be expended the ensuing season.

The sum of \$300 has been expended on the road leading from Kingsbury Mills to Blanchard village, by Hon. Cyrus A. Packard, agreeably to the resolve approved March 9, 1869.

Agreeably to resolve in aid of the road across Indian township, in the county of Washington, approved February 27, 1869, the sum of \$500 has been expended on said road, under the superintendence of James Ripley, Esq.

The appropriation of \$700 for building a bridge over Fish river in Fort Kent, county of Aroostook, under resolve approved March 9, 1869, remains unexpended, the conditions of the resolve not having been complied with.

By resolve of the legislature, approved February 22, 1869, the sum of \$1000 was appropriated to aid in building a bridge over Dead river at Flagstaff, in the county of Somerset. But as the condition of this resolve has not been complied with, no warrant has been drawn for this appropriation and it remains in the treasury unexpended. And the same remark applies to the \$200 appropria-

ted under resolve approved March 9, 1869, for building a bridge over the south branch of Dead river, in the county of Franklin.

Under the resolve last named, entitled "resolve in aid of roads and bridges in the counties of Franklin and Aroostook," the sum of \$100 was appropriated for repairing state roads and bridges in plantation No. 11, R. 1, in the county of Aroostook. Of this amount the sum of \$61.85 has been expended by Rev. George W. Haskell, of Hodgdon.

In this connection, I deem it proper to state that, in transmitting the sums of money expended upon roads and bridges under appropriations committed to the charge of the land agent, I have conformed to the usual practice in such cases, by having the amount to be transmitted carefully and accurately counted and inclosed in a strong envelope, and directed by mail to the person entitled to receive it. In all cases of this kind, the letters have been registered at the post-office from which they were sent; and, with one exception, no money thus sent from the land office has ever, to my knowledge, been miscarried or lost. The exception alluded to is this: The sum of \$600 was enclosed and directed to "Hon. Charles Cobb, Moose River, Maine," as an agent under this department, to make payments for repairs on the Canada road. The letter enclosing the money was duly registered at the post-office in Bangor, September 7, 1869, and received at the post-office at Moose River on the 13th day of the same month. On its arrival at Moose River, the letter contained but \$550, and there were evident indications that the envelope had been broken open, and the balance of the money abstracted from the package. Feeling assured that every thing connected with the transaction was right on the part of Mr. Cobb, and as the road contractors were entitled to their pay, I made up the deficiency from my own funds; although no percentage or other compensation is allowed to the land agent for making these disbursements.

SETTLING LANDS OWNED IN COMMON WITH PROPRIETORS AND CORPORATIONS.

In compliance with the resolve, entitled "Resolve authorizing the land agent to obtain proposals for the purchase of proprietors' lands in the plantations of Madawaska, Dionne, and D'Aigle, for settlement," approved February 22, 1869, I conferred with Messrs. E. S. Coe and J. N. Chandler, of Bangor, and Hon. E. G. Dunn, of Dalton, part owners of land in said townships, and have to

report that while these owners expressed a willingness on their part to convey their interest in these lands to the State, no definite proposals were obtained, for the reason that several of the owners reside in Massachusetts, and elsewhere, and should be consulted before any definite proposals could be made.

In this connection it may be proper to remark, that several other townships in which "the State's interest in the land" has been designated and set apart for settlement, stand in the same category with those named in the resolve. Prior to 1853, when Maine purchased of Massachusetts her entire interest in the wild lands of this State, it seems that several of the townships and tracts thus purchased, had been owned in common and undivided by the commonwealth and individual proprietors; consequently Maine, in making the purchase became a joint owner with these proprietors. Among the townships thus held in common were 18, R. 3; 16, R. 7; 17, R. 7; and 18, R. 7; in the county of Aroostook. As these townships were wanted for settlement, and had already many settlers upon them, "the State's interest" therein was set apart for that purpose under a resolve entitled "resolve designating and locating certain townships for settlement," approved March 17, 1860.

It appears, also, that under the provisions of a resolve entitled "resolve authorizing the land agent to partition or sell the State's interest in certain lands," approved March 14, 1860, the land agent was authorized to cause the State's interest in land in four of the townships thus owned in common—among which were two of the townships above named, to wit: 18, R. 3, and 18, R. 7—"to be divided and set off by metes and bounds, so that such interest belonging to the State may be held in severalty"; or otherwise "to exchange other State lands of equal value for said townships." But I have not been able to find from the records of the land office that any action was ever taken under said resolve in relation to an exchange or purchase of land in 18, R. 7, now Fort Kent. And at this time there are no State lands in the county of Aroostook, except lands set apart and designated for settlement, which could be exchanged for any of the lands mentioned in said resolve.

It is found, however, that an exchange of other State lands was made by the land agent for the proprietors' interest in 18, R. 3, now Grant Isle, which interest was conveyed to the State by deed, dated December 18, 1865. This township had been lotted for settlement, at the expense of the State, in 1864-5, and was

thereafter regarded in the land office as a "settling township." But, as the *interest* in the land, *thus acquired of the proprietors*, seems not to have been *formally* designated and set apart for settlement, the question arises whether this interest in the land may not have been conveyed to the "European and North American Railway Company" in the deed of lands made to that company by the State, in the year 1868. If so, the State again becomes a joint owner in these lands with said railway company. This is a subject that may require legal investigation.

In the year 1839, the south-easterly part of township No. 13, R. 4, in the county of Aroostook, was surveyed for settlement, and about thirty lots run out for that purpose, and a plan returned to the land office—said lots containing, in the aggregate, four thousand four hundred and sixty-three acres. The most of these lots have been taken up by settlers, who hold land certificates of the same, under the law regulating the sale of lands for settlement. Some of these settlers have already performed the conditions entitling them to deeds of the lots so occupied by them. But on examination of the records in this office, and the statutes and resolves of the legislature, it does not appear that any part of said township has ever been set apart and designated for settlement, and, therefore, the certificates were unauthorized. The balance of the township was conveyed to Elbridge G. Dunn, the deed containing a specific exception of the lots so contracted to be conveyed to settlers, thus leaving the title of the lots in the State. Under this statement of facts, the lots in question have passed by the deed of the State to the European and North American Railway Company, subject to the terms of the grant to said company.

As the honor and interest of the State are involved, requiring a title to be secured to the settlers, it is to be hoped that the Legislature will take such action as may be necessary to quiet these settlers in the possession of the lots thus occupied by them respectively.

TREATY AND PREEMPTION LOTS.

Since the date of my last annual report, Hon. Noah Barker, as agent to investigate the claims of settlers upon lots known as treaty lots, or preemption lots, and to ascertain all the facts pertaining to the title of each lot, has made and returned to the land

office a full and accurate report, furnishing all the facts necessary to a proper understanding of each claim.

Since the completion of his report, I have found it necessary to retain Mr. Barker, as my assistant in the land office, during a portion of the year.

FINANCIAL.

The amount of cash paid into the treasury from this department, during the year, is as follows:

LANDS RESERVED FOR PUBLIC USES.

In compliance with the resolve entitled "Resolve authorizing the land agent to designate certain lots as public lots in lieu of other lots," approved February 24, 1869, I have designated and set apart lots numbered 108, 116, 124, 132, and 140, as reserved lots, in Chapman plantation, in the county of Aroostook, in lieu of lots numbered 112, 120, 128, 136, and 144, in said plantation, believing it to be "for the interest of the settlement in said plantation to make such designation and exchange."

By a resolve entitled "Resolve authorizing the land agent to exchange lots numbered eighty-one and eighty-three in township number six, range five, in Aroostook county," approved February 26, 1869, the land agent was authorized to exchange public lots numbered 81 and 83, in township No. 6, R. 5, (Moro plantation,) "for two other equally valuable lots in said township, allowing said public lots to revert to the state for settling purposes." In order to ascertain the value of said public lots, I have caused them to be explored, as well as the remaining State lots in said plantation, and find there are no other two State lots therein which are "equally valuable" with the public lots above named. These being well timbered, and the State lots having been in a great measure stripped of the timber, I find it impossible to make the exchange contemplated by said resolve.

During the past season it was ascertained that persons having deeds of the right to cut timber and grass on the public lots

reserved in several townships, had continued to cut after the townships had been organized into plantations for election or other purposes. By the law authorizing the sale of such timber and grass, the right is limited by the incorporation or organization into plantations.

The matter was submitted to the Governor and Council, and by their approval a seizure of the timber cut on Silver Ridge and Oakfield plantations was made by the land agent as for trespass. Suits of replevin have since been commenced by the parties, and the cases are now pending in the Supreme Judicial Court.

Other cuttings of a similar character have been ascertained, but not until after the timber had been disposed of, and as yet no steps have been taken to enforce the rights of the State.
