## REPORT.

The Legislature at its last session passed the following act, viz:

An act additional to "an act concerning the militia."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

- Sect. 1. There shall be organized, under the direction of the governor of this State, a number of companies not exceeding ten, of uniformed volunteer militia, of the organization prescribed in section twenty-five of an act entitled "an act concerning the militia," approved February twenty-third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, the same to be under the government of the present laws and regulations concerning the militia.
- Sect. 2. These companies shall be selected from the volunteer companies making application for organization under this act, which shall have conformed to the requirements under existing military laws, and shall be selected from such locations as in the judgment of the governor of this state are most in need of military companies for safety and order, and best calculated for the support and maintenance of military organizations.
- Sect. 3. These companies shall be armed, uniformed and equipped at the expense of the state, according to the existing regulations of the United States army, under which clothing is issued to the enlisted men of the United States army, with the following modifications: "The state shall supply a coat, cap, overcoat and pantaloons to each soldier, but each company shall have liberty to choose and provide its own uniform, with the consent and approval of the governor, and in such case the price of the United States army uniform, not issued, shall be commuted to the soldier in money, such commutation to be paid by the paymaster general and received for upon the company rolls." The above enumerated articles of clothing, or commutation in lieu thereof, shall be suppled once in three years.

Sect. 4. There shall be not less than four annual inspections of said companies, such inspections to be preceded by a review and such drill in the tactics as may be directed by the inspecting officer.

Sect. 5. This act shall take effect when approved.

[Approved February 23, 1869.]

Under this law there have been organized and accepted seven companies of Infantry. By reason of the fact that no appropriation has been made for the purpose, uniforms have not been supplied or commutation in lieu thereof paid to the soldiers.

In accepting these organizations, it was found necessary to take them from localities where they might not only be useful to aid the civil authorities in case of disturbance of the public peace, but where there was sufficient population to give satisfactory evidence that they would be well sustained and kept near the maximum number allowed by law.

The officers have been selected from among those who were tried by the test of active service. The men have been enlisted with great care, regard being had not only to their mental and physical qualifications, but also to their moral standing. A careful inspection and examination of each company was made by Gen. John Marshall Brown, of Portland, Assistant Inspector General, and by Colonel Eugene F. Sanger of Bangor, Assistant Surgeon General, before being finally accepted. And it is confidently believed that these organizations will be an ornament and an honor to the State.

# TESTIMONIALS TO HONORABLY DISCHARGED SOLDIERS · AND SEAMEN.

The Legislature at its last session passed the following amendment, viz:

An act to amend an act approved February twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred sixtyeight, relating to soldiers' testimonials of honor.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sect. 1. So much of an act approved February twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred sixty-eight, as refers to soldiers' testimonials, is hereby amended, so that the same shall read, "to all honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines who served in the war of eighteen hundred sixty-one, and were credited on the quota of Maine."

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

#### Approved February 12, 1869.

In compliance with the provisions of the law, testimonials have been issued in all cases where the applicants were found entitled to receive them.

The number issued during the year is	5,115
Whole number issued is	15,385

#### WORK OF THE OFFICE.

The labor of the office during the past year has been somewhat increased. The commissioners upon equalization of municipal war debts have been furnished by this office with five hundred and forty-five transcripts from the records, being one for each city, town and plantation in the State, the whole containing forty-one thousand nine hundred and forty-one names of men who were credited upon the quotas of the cities, towns and plantations, after July 2d, 1862. The transcripts were also required to show the date of muster, term of service, company and regiment, or branch of service of each man. Indices have been prepared containing the names of men who were forwarded by the different Provost Marshals in the State during the war to the general draft rendezvous, and also from the different draft rendezvous to the field. There is now a constant demand for certificates of service by those whose discharges have been lost, and by the parents and heirs of

those who died in service or were reported as missing in action,
to be used for the purpose of facilitating the settlement of claims.

General Order No. 3.

In order to secure the end contemplated by the Legislature in authorizing the equipment, at the expense of the State, of ten companies of Infantry, the following regulations will be observed:

The companies are to be a separate corps, independent of each other, and must consist of not less than fifty men each, who must conform to the standard prescribed for the United States Army, and no person will be accepted or retained in the service who is notorious for intemperance or other immoral habits. In general it is expected that especial efforts will be made to secure men of character and standing in their several communities, so that this force, though small, can be made a body of soldiers which will adorn as well as defend the State; that the companies may be considered schools for officers, each capable of being expanded into a regiment when necessity requires.

It is the intention of the Commander-in-Chief that these companies shall be an honor to themselves and the State, and anything tending to impair their efficiency will be scrupulously guarded against.

All applications from organizations desiring to be accepted under the Act referred to, will be carefully considered, and the selection will be based on the character of the applicants and the localities which they represent.

The successful applicants will be notified as soon as a decision is reached, and will at once forward to the Adjutant General's Office a Descriptive List showing the organization as perfected. The Quartermaster General will then issue the necessary arms and equipments, together with the uniform prescribed for the United States Army, or commutation in lieu thereof. As soon as possible after the equipment of the companies, they will be carefully inspected by the Assistant Inspector General and the Assistant Surgeon General, and only such men mustered into the service of the State who are found to conform to all the requirements above specified.

If at any of the subsequent inspections a company is found inexcusably deficient in discipline, deportment, or drill, it shall be

placed on probation, and unless there is marked improvement at the inspection next following, the company will be mustered out of service.
