REPORT.

During the present year three companies of Infantry have been organized and accepted under the act of Legislature, approved Feb. 23, 1869.

The companies are designated as follows, viz :

The "Jameson Guards," at Bangor, commanded by Captain Daniel White; the

"Belfast City Guards," at Belfast, commanded by Captain Wm. H. Fogler; and the

"Crosby Guards," at Hampden, commanded by Captain Frank G. Flagg.

These companies contained the maximum number allowed by law, and are chiefly composed of men who were in active service during the rebellion.

There are but ten companies of infantry organized in the State, and none of artillery or cavalry. Seven companies are uniformed, armed and equipped. The others are not. Commutation of clothing has been paid during the year to the

"Portland Light Infantry;"

"Portland Mechanic Blues;"

"Auburn Light Infantry;"

"Norway Light Infantry;"

"Skowhegan Light Infantry;"

"Capital Guards" of Augusta; and the

"Jameson Guards" of Bangor.

The number of commissioned company officers is twenty-eight. The whole number of enlisted men is nine hundred and nine.

most, if not all of these tattered ensigns, mementoes of the nation's conflict and a restored Union, will be destroyed. The expense of enclosing them in suitable cases need not be large.

TESTIMONIALS TO HONORABLY DISCHARGED SOLDIERS AND SEAMEN.

The law authorizing the issue of certificates of honorable service rendered during the war of the rebellion, provides that all who served in the army or navy of the United States during the war of 1861, on the quota of Maine, and were honorably discharged therefrom, and the widows or next of kin of such as have deceased, shall be entitled to receive a certificate containing a transcript of the record of the service of the soldier or seamen, on making application therefor. No particular form of application has been prescribed. In all cases where the applicants have been found entitled, the certificates have been forwarded without cost to those who received them.

By a resolve of the Legislature approved March 24, 1870, I was directed to examine certain charges against towns which appeared upon the records of this office "for deficiency under call of Oct. 17, 1863," a transcript of which had been, by request, laid before the State Treasurer on the 7th of January, and ascertain if errors existed in the charges, and if so, to certify the same to the Treasurer of the State. In obedience to said resolve, the accounts have been carefully examined, and where errors were found the proper corrections have been made, and the State Treasurer notified of the facts.

STATE PENSIONS.

By direction of the Governor and Council, at the commencement of the year, all office work relating to State pensions was transferred to this department.

The law authorizing pensions for disabled soldiers and seamen residing in Maine, who served in the army or navy of the United States in the war of 1861, on the quota of Maine, and to the widows, orphan children under twelve years of age, or dependent mother or sister of such soldier or seaman, does not provide that the sum of eight dollars a month shall be paid to such as may be found entitled to a pension, but only so much, not exceeding that sum, as will, with his own resources, including his United States pension and his ability to labor, be necessary for his support.

In all applications made under this law, the municipal officers of cities, towns and plantations, have been required to make a careful investigation into the circumstances of the applicants, and no pension has been granted when it did not appear from their statement under oath, that the applicant would be compelled to resort to public or private charity, without this aid. This mode of obtaining the necessary information was adopted because it could be

obtained in this way with more accuracy and promptness, and with less expense to the persons intended to be benefited, than by the ordinary method of getting this kind of evidence. Under these rules, established by the Governor and Council, such pensions have been allowed as the appropriation for the purpose and the individual wants of the applicants appeared to warrant and require.

In all cases where pensions have been allowed upon the testimony of municipal officers, the sums have been advanced to the pensioners by the treasurers of cities, towns and plantations where the pensioners reside, and the local treasurers reimbursed by the State.

Certificates have been issued during the year for the reimbursement of local treasurers, for advances made by them to pensioners prior to the present year, to the amount of \$12,467.93; and from the records of this office, there still appears to be due them for advances heretofore made, and not yet called for, the sum of \$6,140.49.

The act providing for the payment of State pensions expires December 31st, 1870. It should be continued in force another year.

Quartermaster General's Report.

By a resolve of the Legislature approved March 19, 1870, the title of the State to the site of the Portland Arsenal, was granted to the Maine General Hospital corporation. As possession will be given to the corporation at an early day, provision should be made for another arsenal at some convenient place. The arsenal at Bangor is not now large enough to contain all the military property belonging to the State which is required to be stored, and it will soon be necessary to move that now stored in Portland.

Under the provisions of an act of Congress approved April 23d, 1808, ordnance and ordnance stores, invoiced at \$25,538.87, have been received within the year from the authorities of the United States, and placed in the arsenals at Portland and Bangor.

The sales of military property from the Bangor and Portland arsenals during the year amount to the sum of \$903.55. Much of the property sold was worn and unserviceable, and some of it of a kind not now in use.

General Order, No. 5.

The Governor learns with surprise and pain, that the recent visit of the "Capital Guards" to the "Portland Light Infantry," was made the occasion of unworthy and disorderly behavior on the part of some concerned. The brief space of his official term remaining, forbids the commitment of the matter to the slow process of a regular military tribunal, and compels summary notice from him.

The "Capital Guards," on this visit, appeared in their organized capacity. The occasion was not, indeed, one strictly of duty, but the company wore the arms and uniform of the State, and were in a peculiar manner guardians of her honor and good name. Especially was it the duty of the Captain and Orderly Sergeant so

to bear themselves, and so to control and care for their men, that no breach of discipline and decorum would be committed. This was a responsibility they could not avoid, and the neglect of it was a military and moral offence, which compels the expression of grave censure. Only a portion of the company was at fault, but the good fame of the whole is tarnished; and the innocent members must not take it amiss if along with the disgrace, and as the only available means of recovery, they have to suffer a share of the penalty for the sake of the good thereby to be accomplished.

The "Capital Guards," in accordance with the spirit and intent of General Order No. 3, Series of 1869, are hereby placed on probation, and their continuance in the service will be determined by their future deportment, as observed and reported by the Inspector General.

It appears that the refreshments furnished by the "Light Infantry" to their guests were not altogether of a proper character, which renders that company responsible for a portion of the indecorum under notice, and, in so far, deserving of reproof.

It should be clearly understood by the companies now composing our effective military, that occasions of parade or pastime do not warrant drunkenness and disorder, and that such shames will not be tolerated. These companies should be schools of honor and manliness, and if they are to become instruments to tempt young men to wrong and disgrace, they had better be stricken from the rolls of the service.

It is with sorrow that the Governor makes his last official communication with troops for which he has taken such interest and pride, one of reprimand and warning. This may be more salutary, however, than formal compliment.
