# REPORT.

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LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1871.

*To the Governor and Council of Maine:*

In compliance with the provisions of law, the Land Agent has the honor to submit this, his Annual Report, for the year ending November 30, 1871.

## SALES OF LAND DURING THE YEAR.

There have been conveyed, of the public lands, during the past year, for cash and cash securities, 11,856.36 acres, for \$9,071.80; under resolves of the Legislature, mostly to actual settlers, 2,542.62 acres; under the Treaty of Washington, 11,191.59 acres; to actual settlers on the surrender of outstanding Land Certificates, 12,466.07 acres. There have also been contracted to actual settlers by Land Certificates, for road labor notes, 33,472.60 acres, amounting to \$16,384.50; and 10,100 acres have been contracted to be conveyed to Swedish immigrants, under the provisions of chapter 210 of the public laws of 1871.

In pursuance of the provisions of a resolve, entitled "resolve in favor of Maine Wesleyan Seminary and Female College," approved March 22, 1864, and a resolve entitled "resolve for the purpose of carrying into effect chapter three hundred and thirty of the resolves of one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in favor of the Maine Wesleyan Seminary and Female College," approved Feb. 5, 1870, and order of Council of April 8, 1870, the "timber and lumber" upon the north-west and south-east quarters of township number eight in the fourth range, west from the east line of the State, was sold by sealed proposals, on the twenty-sixth day of December, 1870, to Samuel H. Blake, for the term of ten years from Oct. 21, 1870, for the sum of three thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven dollars; one fourth part of this sum was paid in cash, and for the balance, three notes of hand were given for the sum of nine hundred sixty-four dollars and twenty-five cents each, payable in one, two and three years, with interest annually. On the thirty-first day of December, 1871, these notes were de-

livered to the State Treasurer, from whom they were received by the Trustees of said Seminary in part payment of the amount due this institution under the resolve of February 5, 1870.

The south half of township number two, range four, west of Bingham's Kennebec Purchase, in the county of Franklin, was offered for sale at auction at a minimum price of forty-five cents per acre, on the twenty-sixth day of December, 1870, under the provisions of a resolve entitled "Resolve making an appropriation in aid of the construction of the Milford and Princeton Turnpike," approved February 15, 1866, and order of Council of August 31, 1870, and sold to George B. Leavitt and Elisha W. Shaw, at the rate of seventy-five cents per acre, amounting to the sum of eight thousand two hundred and sixty-five dollars; one-fourth part of the purchase money was paid down, and the balance secured by three notes of hand for the sum of two thousand sixty-six dollars and twenty-five cents each, payable in one, two and three years, with interest annually. The proceeds of this sale have been passed to the credit of the "Granger Turnpike Fund."

Pursuant to the provisions of a resolve authorizing the Land Agent to sell for cash "all lands the fee of which remained in the State, lying in township number three, range one, north of Bingham's Kennebec Purchase, in the County of Somerset," lot number one hundred thirty-three, containing five hundred eighty-two acres, being the only land in said township owned by the State, was sold by sealed proposals, on the twenty-ninth day of December, 1870, to C. & J. M. Fogg for the sum of six hundred sixty-nine dollars and thirty cents.

#### SURVEYS OF LAND.

During the past year, the surveys of land for settlement in township number three, range five, west from the east line of the State, have been completed by Ivory B. Gerry, Esq., of Sherman. He was also employed to locate roads in the east half of township number two, range five; to divide sections of land in townships number four, ranges four and five, and also to survey into lots for settlement, a portion of the public lands in township number thirteen, range six, lying west of Portage Lake; also, to explore the public lands in township number eight, range five, with a view of having the best portion of said lands lotted for settlement.

Hon. Noah Barker, surveyor, was employed to divide several sections of land for settlement, situated in townships letter F,

range two; Eaton Grant, and numbers eleven, twelve and thirteen, range three; and also to run lines and locate roads in township letter D, range one, and townships numbers eleven, twelve and thirteen, range three, for the accommodation of settlers.

And Rev. Elbridge Knight of Fort Fairfield, was employed to sub-divide several sections of land in township letter E, range one, into lots for settlement.

The remainder of township number fifteen, range three, in the county of Aroostook, known as "New Sweden," containing about nineteen thousand three hundred acres, has been surveyed into lots for settlement, the past year, by Albert A. Burleigh, Esq., who has also made additional surveys for the same purpose in townships number fourteen, ranges three and four. In the prosecution of this work, the roads were first located, taking great care to avoid hills and other natural obstructions, so that the roads might be of an easy grade. Each lot was then located so as to front on some one of these roads, and it is believed that the work has been done faithfully and in the best possible manner. The soil in these townships is admirably adapted to the purposes of agriculture, and it is believed that all of the lots suitable for settlement will very soon be occupied by a thriving population of valuable citizens.

#### CLAIM OF THE EUROPEAN AND NORTH AMERICAN RAILWAY COMPANY.

As questions of very grave importance have arisen under the acts of the Legislature, granting aid to the European and North American Railway Company, involving the rights of the State and settlers to lands set apart for settlement, and as such are placed under the care and custody of the Land Agent, he has deemed it his duty to call attention to the subject.

By act of 1850, chapter 206, the Land Agent was required to locate and designate certain townships of land belonging to the State, not exceeding ten in number, annually, for settlement, of which selection he was required to give notice. Under this provision the Land Agent of that year, and also the Land Agent of 1856, set apart and designated certain townships and parts of townships for that purpose. Besides these, the Legislature of different years has from time to time, by special acts or resolves, set apart and designated certain other lands for the same use. The whole number of townships and parts of townships thus set apart and appropriated for settlement is forty-four, of which twenty-eight have been by special resolves or acts of the Legislature. Many

of these have since been incorporated into towns, and others are extensively settled upon, embracing a large part of the northern settled portion of Aroostook county.

By the act of 1864, chapter 401, "to provide means for the defence of the Northeastern frontier," by "aiding the construction of the European and North American Railway," upon certain conditions, it was made "lawful for the Governor, State Treasurer and Land Agent to transfer to said company all the public lands lying on the waters of the Penobscot and St. John rivers, for the uses and purposes set forth in the act;" "*provided, however, that there shall be excepted from said conveyance and from the operations of this act \* \* \* \* \* all lands set apart and designated for settlement under existing laws.*" The act contains, also, another provision, that the proceeds of the sale of timber on ten townships of the public lands of this State, to be designated by the Governor, State Treasurer and Land Agent, shall be paid into the treasury of the State for the use of said company, on certain contingencies.

During the same session, the Legislature by resolve, chapter 326, "relating to an appropriation for common schools," directed the Land Agent, under instructions from the Governor and Council, to sell the timber and lumber on ten townships for the permanent school fund, "the purchasers to have ten years in which to take it off."

By subsequent act of 1868, chapter 604, the preliminary conditions of the first act above cited, were repealed, and "the Governor of the State was thereby authorized and empowered to transfer and convey to the European and North American Railway Company, all the timber and lands belonging to the State situated upon the waters of the Penobscot and St. John rivers, to be used by the Company to aid in the construction of its line of railway as contemplated and provided for in the foregoing act \* \* \* subject to all the reservations contained in the obligations imposed by said act, *provided however, that the State or purchaser shall have until eighteen hundred eighty-four to remove the timber on the ten townships of land reserved for the common school fund by the resolve of 1864, chapter 326.*" Under the authority of this act, the Governor made a deed to the Corporation on the thirteenth day of May, eighteen hundred sixty-eight, the effect of which depends upon the construction of the act authorizing it.

Under and by force of these several acts, resolves and deed, the railroad company now make claim to all the timber on all the



lands which belonged to the State at the time, situated on the Penobscot and St. John waters, including those set apart as aforesaid for settlement; and also claim, that as to most if not all the lands so set apart, certain irregularities or deficiencies exist in the proceedings, whereby the exception of "all lands set apart and designated for settlement under existing laws," is rendered unavailing, and that, therefore, the grant conveyed to the company all the settling lands not already conveyed to settlers. No particular specification of the lands thus claimed has been submitted, though requested, but the result would seem to be as now stated.

In pursuance of this claim, the company have put in a defence, and therefore resist the proceedings commenced under resolve of 1870, chapter 168, for the partition of townships numbers seventeen and eighteen, range seven, being Fort Kent and Wallagrass townships, which proceedings have, for this cause, been arrested; and have also granted permits to cut timber on townships number eleven, range three, number eighteen, range three and number eight range five, west from the east line of the State; all which townships are among the number set apart as aforesaid for settlement. The parties permitted on townships number eleven, range three, and number eight, range five, having commenced operations under their permits, the Land Agent at once laid the matter before the Governor and Council, and notice has since been given to the parties, that they will be regarded as trespassers and treated accordingly if they persist in their operations as it is understood they are doing.

#### EXPENDITURES ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The following expenditures have been made during the past year, on roads and bridges, under resolves of the Legislature.

The sum of \$300 appropriated by a resolve, approved March 9, 1869, to aid in building a bridge across the Madawaska stream in township I, now part of the town of Lyndon, has been paid over to the Selectmen of said town, said bridge having been built in a substantial manner, agreeably with the terms of said resolve.

By resolve approved February 25, 1871, the sum of \$400 was appropriated for the repair of the Military road in the south half of township number two, range three, which sum has been expended under the direction of Col. Peter Moulton.

The sum of \$600 appropriated by resolve approved February 22, 1870, to aid in opening a road through township F, range one,

Arcostook county, has been expended under the superintendence of Hon. William Small, whose accounts have been closed.

W. H. Bates, Esq., of Princeton, was appointed to superintend the expenditure of \$500, appropriated by resolve approved February 25, 1871, for repairing the road across Indian township, in the county of Washington. Under his supervision the road has been put in good repair.

The Legislature at its last session authorized the Land Agent to expend the sum of five hundred dollars in aid of rebuilding and completing the bridge from Princeton to Indian township in the county of Washington; "provided the town of Princeton raise an equal amount and rebuild said bridge to the acceptance of the Land Agent;" and satisfactory evidence having been furnished that said sum had been raised and expended, and the bridge rebuilt agreeably to the terms of the resolve, the sum thus authorized was paid over to the Selectmen of said town.

By a resolve approved February 25, 1871, the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars was appropriated to aid in building bridges in the town of Phillips, in the county of Franklin, to be expended under the direction of the Land Agent; provided said town should raise and expend an equal amount for like purposes; but through some misapprehension on the part of the authorities of said town, as to the terms of the resolve, the Land Agent was not notified that the conditions of the resolve had been complied with, and for that reason the appropriation remains unexpended.

The bridge over the Molunkus stream on the Military road, is in a very dilapidated condition, and is made safe for public travel only by frequent repairs. The abutments of this bridge are of granite, but the superstructure is so much decayed that it should be replaced the ensuing year by a good substantial covered bridge. The Legislature, by a resolve approved March 15, 1870, appropriated \$600 to aid in rebuilding this bridge; but by an oversight, the sum of \$1200, appropriated the preceding year, was not re-appropriated, and in consequence of this omission the bridge was not rebuilt. Since these appropriations were made, the sum of \$182.19 has been expended in procuring granite and making repairs, leaving a balance of \$417.81 unexpended.

#### LOCAL AGENTS FOR SETTLING LANDS.

The following persons, residing in the vicinity of lands set apart and designated for settlement, were appointed, agreeably to sec-

tion twenty-eight, chapter five, of the Revised Statutes, "to superintend the location of settlers, the payment of their road labor, and the performance of their several duties."

SETTLEMENT OF THE PUBLIC LANDS.

During the past year the settlement of the public lands of the State has progressed in a degree never before equalled, except in one or two previous years, since the organization of our present State government. Within the year, as already stated, 12,466 acres of land have been conveyed to one hundred settlers on certificates previously granted; 11,191 acres have been conveyed to one hundred and thirteen others under the Treaty of Washington, and new certificates for 43,572 acres have been granted to two hundred and fourteen persons who have taken up lots for settlement and actually begun to make improvements thereon. Besides these, a large number of entries have been made on other lots by actual

settlers, to whom as yet no certificates have been issued. These lots, thus sold or taken up, are in addition to the large number selected from lands of proprietors in our great forest domain, the number of which this department has no means of ascertaining. At the present time there are 165,000 acres contracted for and not conveyed, and the whole number of acres still remaining undisposed of, belonging to the State, which have been set apart for settlement is 190,000.

The cause of this increased influx of settlement is supposed to be the better understanding which the public are beginning to acquire, both respecting the value of the lands and the easy terms on which homesteads can be obtained upon any part of our public domain. With reference to the first, the remark is believed to be fully justified, that the lands set apart by the State for settlement have generally a depth and richness of soil scarcely excelled or equalled in any other part of New England, proof of which fact is to be found in the abundant crops produced without the aid even or presence of any artificial or extraneous fertilizers.

In reference to the terms of obtaining homesteads upon the public lands of the State, it is here repeated, that by our present settlement acts any person may possess himself of a lot of 160 acres for a homestead, at the nominal price of fifty cents per acre, to be paid in road labor in his own neighborhood, ample time being granted for working it out. The party, however, must actually settle on the lot, and within four years erect a comfortable dwelling house and clear fifteen acres. Upon the performance of these easy terms, a deed is given conveying a good title, a certificate in the mean time being issued expressive of the agreement. A good home thus easily acquired, it would seem holds out inducements for a rapid settlement of our public lands whenever a knowledge of the facts is spread abroad.

A new motive is now added to those formerly existing for a residence, such as has never been spoken of, in the increased facilities of access to the markets of this and other States. The completion of the railroad from Bangor to St. John substantially reduces the distance from market at least one half, thus very largely increasing not only the conveniences of life, but adding greatly to the value of all farm products, a ready sale for which is ever found in the places named. The contemplated railway connecting with that already finished, and extending to the Aroostook river, the completion of which is believed to be in the near future,

will about annihilate, practically, the distance remaining, as this road will pass directly through some of the settling townships and to the near neighborhood of very many others.

It may be of service, in this connection, to say that the State yet owns the fee of 165,000 acres of settling lands contracted for but not conveyed; 190,000 acres of other settling lands unsold, and 140,907 acres of timber lands; besides the "timber and lumber" on 242,366 acres, having till 1884 to dispose of the same for the benefit of the Common School Fund; thus making an aggregate of 738,273 acres in which the State still holds an interest.

#### SCANDINAVIAN IMMIGRATION.

The statement already made respecting the progress of settlement on the public lands of the State, embraces the lots selected by immigrants under the acts passed to promote foreign immigration, by the last two Legislatures. In order to carry into effect the provisions of said acts, so far as devolved on the Land Agent, he has caused surveys and lottings to be made of the whole of the township of New Sweden and parts of other townships in the same neighborhood, as already stated in the previous parts of this Report. Of the lots thus laid out for Swedish immigrants, thirty-four lots of one hundred acres each, were assigned to that number of persons during the year 1870. Since that time other certificates have been issued to new comers of the same nationality, to the number of 101, containing in all 10,100 acres, and in addition to these, many other lots have been taken up and settled upon by immigrants, the exact number of which is not known. All these, have thus far, come to make their homes with us, and very large additions to the present number are expected to be made during the coming year. For these, preparations have in a degree been already perfected and will be continued by having the proper lots laid out and roads located.

For this new impulse in the great pioneer work of settlement, the State is principally indebted to the skill and untiring efforts of the Commissioner of Immigration, WM. W. THOMAS, JR., Esq., who has on both sides of the Atlantic, devoted himself to the cause in a manner worthy the thanks of the State. The success which has thus far crowned his efforts, is a fitting testimony to his faithfulness and ability in the conduct of the enterprise.

So far as this department has had duties devolved upon it in connection with this work, the Land Agent has done everything

in his power to promote its progress within the limits of his authority, believing as he has believed, that the best interests of the State were involved in its success. He earnestly recommends a continuance of the same favorable policy which the last two Legislatures have inaugurated and which has established and carried forward the enterprise thus far under such flattering auspices.

The following tabular statement of lands sold and contracted to settlers and others by this Department for the last four years, is here given to show the business of this office so far as it embraces the actual disposition of the public lands of the State during those years.
