REPORT.

But one company of infantry has been organized in the State during the present year. That is at Oldtown, and is designated as the "Hersey Light Infantry." It has the full number of men allowed by law,—has been handsomely uniformed at private expense, and compares well with the older organizations. There are now ten companies of infantry uniformed and equipped, one not uniformed, and none of artillery or cavalry.

The opening of the European and North American Railway in October last, and the visit of the President of the United States to Maine on that occasion, afforded the first and only opportunity the military companies, as now organized, have had of meeting together for drill, inspection or review. All the uniformed companies of the State were present. Their soldierly appearance was highly satisfactory. Their movements were admirably executed and their deportment manly.

I respectfully suggest whether it would not be well for this small force, now so well organized, and commanded by officers of experience and reputation, some of whom held high rank in the army and were entrusted with commands of great importance during the war, to be called together once a year by the commander-in-chief for the purpose of inspection and manœuvre. It would do much towards maintaining that *esprit de corps* so necessary in all military organizations, and without which they are of little value. These companies, with the exception of the "Hersey Light Infantry," were accepted upon the theory that they were to be independent corps, responsible only to the commander-in-chief, and capable of being expanded into regiments at very short notice, whenever the exigencies of the public service might require it. And it would seem that some opportunity should be afforded for field exercise and battalion or regimental manœuvre. The number being now so small, not exceeding a single regiment,

the expense would not be large, and the advantages to be derived from it would, I doubt not, be sufficient to justify the cost.

Careful inspections have been made by General James A. Hall, Inspector General, of the several companies during the year. His returns to this office show that, with one or two exceptions, the company affairs, as well as discipline, condition of arms, equipments, clothing, and all other matters relating to these organizations are in a satisfactory condition.

Commutation of clothing has been paid during the year to the
"Crosby Guards" of Hampden, and to the
"Belfast City Guards" of Belfast.

The number of commissioned company officers is twenty-nine. The whole number of enlisted men is nine hundred and thirty-one.

PORTLAND LIGHT INFANTRY.

This is the oldest military organization in the State, having been chartered by the General Court of Massachusetts on the 6th day of June, 1803.

At the commencement of the rebellion, this was one of the first companies to volunteer, and was made Company "A" of the First Regiment of Maine Volunteer Infantry, and was commanded by Capt. George W. Tukey. The company was mustered into the service of the United States on the 30th day of May, A. D. 1861, for the period of three months.

On the 27th day of May, 1868, it was recognized under its original charter, by General Order No. 3, and retained as a volunteer company in the Militia of the State under the provisions of the law of 1865. On the 18th day of September, 1869, it was accepted as one of the ten companies authorized by the act of Legislature, approved February 23d, 1869.

The company is now armed with breech-loading Springfield rifle muskets, has blue overcoats and grey uniforms. The condi-

tion of the company, when inspected by Gen. James A. Hall, Inspector General, on the 6th of June last, was as follows, viz :

The discipline, instruction and military appearance of the company were reported as very good ; and its arms, accoutrements and uniforms in fine condition.

PORTLAND MECHANIC BLUES.

On the 23d day of January, 1807, a petition was presented to the General Court of Massachusetts, signed by a number of the inhabitants of the town of Portland, for permission to organize a company of Light Infantry in that town ; and on the 13th day of February, an order was issued from the Adjutant General's Office for an election of officers, which order was duly obeyed, and an organization effected by choice of officers on the 30th day of April, 1807. Shortly after, owing to some misunderstanding as to a lawful form of enlistment, it became necessary to petition the Legislature that the company might be organized according to law. A new petition was presented to the Legislature of Massachusetts, and on the 8th of March, 1808, a charter was granted to said company, and the organization was named the Portland Mechanic Blues. From such records as can be found, the official roster of company officers appears as follows :

1821 to 1822—Captain, Thomas Todd ; Lieutenant, Silas Smith ; Ensign, John B. Scott.

1822 to 1824—Captain, Silas Smith ; Lieutenant, John B. Scott ; Ensign, David Brewer.

1824 to 1825—Captain, John B. Scott ; Lieutenant, David Brewer ; Ensign, James S. Pierce.

1825—Captain, Daniel Gilbert, Jr.

The company records from June, 1825, to 1861, were destroyed

by fire in Portland in 1866; but other sources of information show that the following are the names and order of rank of the commanding officers during that period:

Captains—Eli Hamblen, Leonard Stodder, Charles F. March, James Sweetsir, William P. Stodder, Wendall P. Smith, William P. Stodder, Thomas A. Roberts.

Captain Roberts commanded the company from 1854 to 1861, and the commissioned officers serving under him in that time were: Lieutenants—Benjamin F. Pratt, Ephraim Gammon, Elbridge G. Bolton, (afterwards Capt. 12th Me. Vols.) George G. Bailey, Charles D. Thomes, Charles Walker, John F. Rand.

In the war of 1812-14, the company performed military duty in the defences of Portland; and in the summer of 1814, was three times subjected to draft, once to fill up the company of sixty days' men under command of Capt. Abel W. Atherton, next to fill up the company of sixty days' men of Capt. Ebenezer Andrews, and the third time to help fill a company of ninety days of Capt. Watson Rand. The following is the roll of the company on duty at that time, exclusive of the drafted men:

Smith; Lieutenant, Friend Loring; Ensign, Francis Douglass; Sergeants, John Ricker, Eliphalet Wharf, Nathan Hubbard; Musician, Henry Green; Corporals, Josiah Pennell, James Seavey, Joseph Berry; Privates, Jeremiah Alexander, David Belford, David Clough, Benjamin Carey, Charles Farley, James Horn, Ichabod Hamblen, George Loring, John Moody, James Mitchell, Enoch Merrill, Stephen H. Niles, Jr., Willard Richards, Job Runnels, Moses Smith, Benjamin Smith, Thomas Todd.

A draft was also made from the company during the Madawaska war in 1839.

The company was under arms during the riot in Portland on the 2d of June, 1855, but their services were not brought into requisition. In the spring of 1861, Capt. Roberts resigned his commission, and Lieut. George G. Bailey was elected Captain.

At the breaking out of the rebellion, the Portland Mechanic Blues was the second company in the State to offer its services to the Government; and on the 27th of April, 1861, was enlisted into service of the State for two years as company "B" of the First Maine Regiment. Upon the election of field officers, Capt. George G. Bailey was promoted to Major, and a new elec-

tion of company officers resulted as follows: Captain, Charles Walker; 1st Lieut., Charles J. Pennell, (afterwards Adjutant 11th Me. Vols.); 2d Lieut., James M. Black; 3d Lieut., James T. Brown; 4th Lieut., Henry A. Gray, (afterwards Lieut. 9th Me. Vols.) On the 3d of May, the company was mustered into the United States' service for three months, with the exception of the 3d and 4th Lieutenants, their rank not being recognized in the United States army. The history of the company during that time is identical with that of the First Me. Regiment, which did good service in the defences of Washington, until ordered back to Maine at the expiration of its term of muster, for the purpose of recruiting to serve the remainder of the two years' enlistment. The company was mustered out of the United States' service Aug. 5th, 1861.

After a short respite, the companies of the 1st Maine were again ordered into camp at Portland, and a new regimental organization effected, and the regimental number changed to the 10th Maine. Captain Walker was promoted to Major, and the company elected the following officers: Captain, James M. Black; 1st Lieut., Charles W. Roberts; 2d Lieut., Alfred L. Turner. The company was mustered into service Oct. 4th, 1861, and started immediately for Washington.

During the following winter, the regiment was stationed on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, the company doing guard and provost duty at the Relay House and Hood's Mills in Maryland, and in the Spring of 1862 at Martinsburg, Virginia. In May, the regiment was assigned to the army of Major General Banks, then operating in the Shenandoah valley, "the Blues" joining the regiment at Winchester on the 25th of May, just as the army of Gen. Banks was retiring from that town in full retreat, which compelled the company to retrace their steps through Martinsburg to Williamsport, having marched fifty-seven miles in twenty-four hours, and losing eleven men taken prisoners during the retreat. In August following, 2d Lieut. Alfred L. Turner was promoted to 1st Lieutenant, *vice* Lieut. Roberts commissioned as Adjutant of the 17th Maine, (a new regiment then being organized and commanded by Col. T. A. Roberts, formerly Capt. of the "Blues,") and Sergt. Charles H. Colley was promoted to be 2d Lieut. The company participated in the battle of Cedar Mountain, Aug. 9th, and suffered severely, losing two men killed and twelve wounded; among the latter was Lieut. Colley, who died of his wounds on the 20th

of Sept. Sergt. Reuben Alexander was promoted to 2d Lieut., to fill this vacancy. At Antietam, Sept. 12, the company was again under fire, having thirteen men wounded, five of them mortally. Early in the winter, vacancies occurred by the resignation of Capt. Black and Lieut. Alexander, and were filled as follows: Capt., Alfred L. Turner; 1st Lieut., Benj. F. Whitney; 2d Lieut., Marcus Delano. During the winter of 1862 and until the expiration of its term of service, the company remained in camp at Stafford Court House, Virginia; and in April, 1863, returned to Maine, and were discharged on the 7th day of May at Portland.

On the 7th day of February, 1868, General Order No. 2 was issued from the Adjutant General's Office at Augusta, "recognizing the company under its original charter," and an election of officers was ordered, which took place Feb. 19, 1868, and the following gentlemen were elected: Captain, George W. Parker; 1st Lieut., Charles J. Pennell; 2d Lieut., James T. Brown, and were duly commissioned by the Governor.

On the 18th day of September, 1869, it was accepted as one of the ten companies authorized by the act of Legislature, approved February 23, 1869.

The company is now armed with Springfield breech-loading rifle muskets, has blue overcoats and blue uniforms. The condition of the company when inspected by Gen. J. A. Hall, Inspector General, on the 9th of May, 1871, was as follows:

Its discipline, instruction and military appearance were reported very good; and arms, accoutrements and uniforms in good condition.

AUBURN LIGHT INFANTRY.

This company was organized and accepted on the 18th day of September, 1869, as one of the ten companies authorized by the act of Legislature approved February 23d, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield breech-loading rifle muskets, has grey uniforms, but is not at present provided with overcoats. The condition of the company, when inspected by Gen. Hall, on the 8th day of June last, was as follows:

Its discipline was reported good; and the arms, accoutrements and uniforms in good condition.

NORWAY LIGHT INFANTRY.

This company was organized and accepted on the 18th day of September, 1869, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Feb. 23, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield breech-loading rifle muskets, and has grey uniforms, but without overcoats. The condition of the company, when inspected by Gen. Hall, on the 7th day of June, 1871, was as follows :

Its discipline, instruction and military appearance are reported very good ; and its arms, accoutrements and uniforms in good order.

SKOWHEGAN LIGHT INFANTRY.

This company was organized and accepted Sept. 18, 1869, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Feb. 23, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield breech-loading rifle muskets, and has grey uniforms, but no overcoats. The condition of the company when inspected by Gen. Hall on 30th day of June, 1871, was as follows :

Its discipline was good, and its arms, accoutrements and uniforms in good order.

CAPITAL GUARDS, AUGUSTA.

This company was organized and accepted on the 1st day of November, 1869, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Feb. 23, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield rifle muskets, has blue uniforms, but is without overcoats. The company was inspected by Gen. Hall on the 5th day of June, 1871.

No inspection rolls were prepared for this inspection, but the discipline and appearance of the men and condition of the uniforms were reported good.

JAMESON GUARDS, BANGOR.

This company was organized and accepted May 26, 1870, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Legislature approved Feb. 23, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield rifle muskets, and has blue uniforms, but is not at present provided with overcoats. The condition of the company when inspected by Gen. Hall, on the 13th day of June, 1871, was as follows :

Number of enlisted men present and absent..... 88

Its discipline was reported excellent; its instruction and military appearance superior, and its arms, accoutrements and uniforms in very good condition.

BELFAST CITY GUARDS.

This company was organized and accepted Jan. 4, 1871, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Legislature, approved Feb. 23, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield muskets. The condition of the company when inspected by Gen. Hall on the 12th day of September, 1871, was as follows :

The number of enlisted men present and absent..... 98

At the time of this inspection the company was not uniformed. Its arms and accoutrements were reported in good order.

NOTE.—This company has since been provided with blue uniforms, but no overcoats.

CROSBY GUARDS, HAMPDEN.

This company was organized and accepted Jan. 4, 1871, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Legislature approved Feb. 23, 1869.

It is armed with Springfield muskets, and has blue uniforms, but no overcoats. The condition of the company when inspected by Gen. Hall on the 3d day of August, 1871, was as follows :

The number of commissioned officers..... 3

The number of enlisted men present and absent..... 98

Its instruction was reported good for the time it had been in service, and its arms and accoutrements in good order.

HERSEY LIGHT INFANTRY, OLDTOWN.

This company was accepted under the law of 1865, and armed by the State.

It has blue uniforms, furnished at the expense of the company. They have the maximum number of men on their rolls.

CALAIS COMPANY.

This company was organized and accepted Sept. 18, 1869, as one of the ten companies authorized by act of Legislature, approved Feb. 23, 1869.

The company has not yet been mustered.

CLAIM AGAINST THE UNITED STATES.

The suspended claim of the State against the United States for expenses incurred in raising troops during the war of 1861, has been carefully reëxamined during the year. This claim, which was suspended by the Treasury Department for further evidence as to some of the items, and because some of the charges were inadmissible under the rules of that department, amounted at the commencement of the year, exclusive of interest, to the sum of \$287,251.99. By carefully examining the records of this office, and obtaining affidavits from parties having personal knowledge of some portions of the account, the necessary proof was obtained to establish the claim of the State to reimbursement for some of the items charged, and with the personal attendance of His Excellency, Governor Perham, at the Treasury Department at Washington, the amount of three thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight dollars and ninety-three cents was allowed, and paid to the State on the fifth day of July last.

Further legislation by Congress will be required before the balance of the claim, or any part of it, can be allowed.

The amount now claimed of the United States is \$283,313.06.

STATE PENSIONS.

The act approved February 3, 1871, granting State pensions, was intended to apply only to the following classes of persons, viz :

1st. Disabled soldiers and seamen, residents of this State, who served upon the quota of Maine in the war of 1861.

2d. Widows of such deceased soldiers or seamen.

3d. Orphan children under twelve years of age of such deceased soldiers or seamen.

4th. Dependent mothers of such deceased soldiers or seamen.

5th. Dependent sisters of such deceased soldiers or seamen, and only such individuals of these classes as would, without aid from the State, be dependent upon public or private charity for support.

The amount appropriated for pensions for the year ending December 31, was thirty thousand dollars, being ten thousand dollars less than the appropriation for 1870.

The number of applications, and the amount allowed, shows

some increase over the previous year. This is in part accounted for by the fact that, in 1870, the act authorizing pensions took effect from the 23d of February instead of the first of January, as in 1871, making but ten months and seven days for which they were allowed in 1870, while in 1871 they have been allowed for the full year.

Certificates have been issued since the commencement of the year for the reimbursement of local treasurers for advances made by them to pensioners prior to the present year, to the amount of \$20,009.27; and there still appears from the records of this office to be due them the sum of \$3,150.96.

The act authorizing pensions for the year 1871 expires on the 31st day of December. It should be continued in force another year.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S REPORT.

GUN HOUSE AT MILO.

By a resolve of the Legislature approved February 24, 1871, I was authorized to sell the gun house and lot on which the same is situated in Milo, in the county of Piscataquis, to the inhabitants of that town.

A careful examination of the property was made by an officer of the staff and an estimate made of its value. The sum of three hundred and fifty dollars was offered for it by the agents of the town of Milo, and at the same time two other propositions were received from responsible men of that town, one offering four hundred and the other four hundred and ten dollars.

I did not, under the circumstances, feel authorized to sell for the sum offered by the town, and as it was clearly the purpose of the resolve to authorize the sale "to the inhabitants" of Milo only, no sale has yet been made.

PORTLAND ARSENAL.

The transfer to the Maine General Hospital of the grounds upon which the arsenal at Portland was situated, made some disposal of the buildings thereon necessary in the early part of the summer. Accordingly three were sold to the corporation and one was removed to an unoccupied corner of the lot where it now remains by permission of the trustees. Into this building has been crowded the military stores of the arsenal. The property cannot be regarded as safe while it remains in its present situation.

The improvements now being made by the corporation will soon, undoubtedly, require the further removal of this building from their grounds.

MILITARY PROPERTY.

Under the provisions of an act of Congress approved Feb. 23d, 1808, ordnance and ordnance stores, invoiced at \$3,465.60, have been received from the War Department during the year.

The sale of military property, including three buildings at Portland, since the first of January last, amounts to the sum of \$902.49.

The following tables show the amount of military property in the hands of municipal officers and individuals; also the amount in the possession of the military companies of the State, in the arsenals at Portland and Bangor, and at this office, and the number and kind of articles which have been sold:

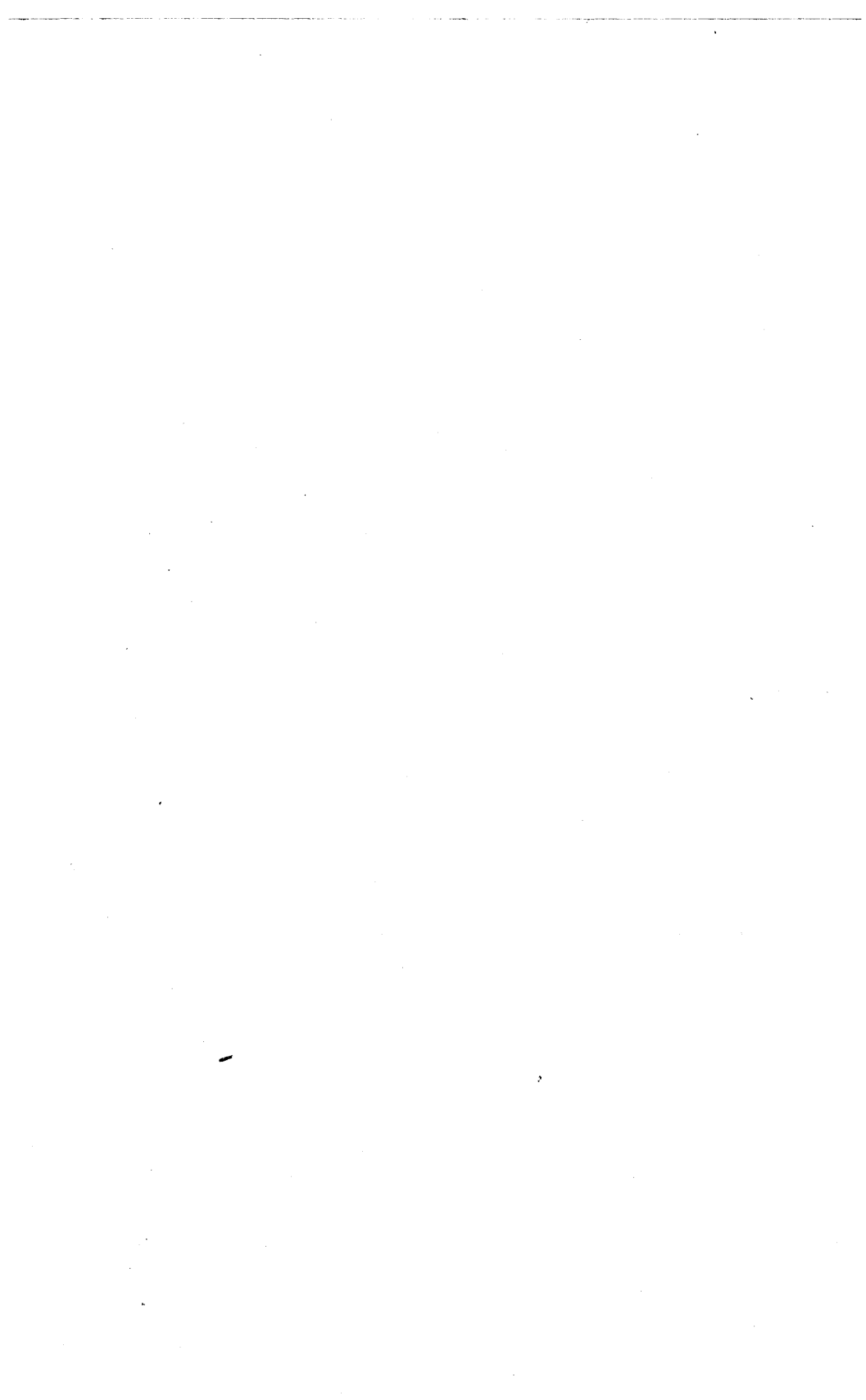
