REPORT.

LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1872.

To the Governor and Council of Maine:

In compliance with the provisions of law, the Land Agent has the honor to submit this, his Annual Report, for the year ending November 30, 1872.

SALES OF LAND.

There have been conveyed, of the public lands, during the past year, for cash and cash securities, 817.20 acres for \$484.42; under resolves of the Legislature, 6,517.12 acres; under the Treaty of Washington, 133.35 acres; to actual settlers on the surrender of outstanding Land Certificates, 12,307.02 acres. There have also been contracted to actual settlers by Land Certificates, for road labor notes, 15,436.64 acres, amounting to \$7,837.36; and 3,300 acres have been contracted to be conveyed to Swedish immigrants, under the provisions of chapter 15 of the public laws of 1872.

SURVEYS OF LAND.

Additional surveys of lots for settlement, have been made during the past year, in townships numbered fourteen in the third and fourth ranges west from the east line of the State, adjoining New Sweden, and roads located in all of said townships for the accommodation of settlers. The soil in these townships is of a superior quality for agricultural purposes, and it is believed that the lots will be rapidly taken up by Swedish immigrants and others during the ensuing year.

Several sections of land in township numbered eight, range five, west from the east line of the State, have also been surveyed into lots for settlement.

CLAIM OF THE EUROPEAN AND NORTH AMERICAN RAILWAY COMPANY.

In the last Annual Report of this Department, the claim made by the European and North American Railway Company, under their deed from the State, to the unsold lands set apart for settlement, was particularly described, and the action of the Land Agent with reference thereto reported. Since making that report, the following proceedings have taken place :

1. In the petition for partition of townships number seventeen and eighteen, in range seven, known as Fort Kent and Wallagrass townships, pending in the Supreme Judicial Court under the provisions of the resolve chapter 168 of the year 1870, the railway company withdrew their appearance and opposition, and Commissioners have been appointed to make partition in accordance with the instructions of the Legislature. Partition has not yet been made, but will be completed during the coming season, according to the order of the court and in obedience to said resolve.

2. Under the claim made by said railway company, as before mentioned, the company, in September, 1871, granted permits to E. G. Dunn to cut timber for the then ensuing logging season, on township number eleven in range three, one of the townships set apart for settlement by legislative resolve. As the lands are by law placed under the care and custody of the Land Agent, he notified the party to whom the permit was granted, that all persons who should undertake to cut timber under the railway company's claim, would be treated as trespassers, and proceeded against as such according to the requirements of law, by a seizure of the logs, teams and supplies. This course, however, was not adopted until he had first consulted the Governor and Council and received their instructions to that effect. The party persisting in cutting the timber thus permitted him, the Land Agent, on the eighth day of January, deputed the sheriff of Aroostook county to make such seizure, who on the eleventh day of same January proceeded to the premises, and there found lumbering operations carried on upon different portions of the township under said company's permit and authority, and according to his instructions, seized all the teams and supplies, and also the logs, and carried the former to Presque Isle for keeping. Some of these were receipted for by responsible parties, and the others were sold at public auction, under the act of 1872, February 16, chapter 9, and the proceeds, after deducting expenses, paid into the

State Treasury, and an account thereof rendered to the Governor and Council, according to the directions of the statute.

Actions were at once commenced against the Land Agent and sheriff in the Supreme Judicial Court, Aroostook county, in favor of said Dunn and Robert Scott, respectively, and another in the Circuit Court of United States in favor of one Kennedy, the last two being operators under Dunn. The Dunn and Scott cases came on for trial at the September term at Houlton, and were continued on law for argument before the next law term in June, at Bangor. The Kennedy case stands continued to await the decision of the other suits.

The logs seized, were sold conditionally, and driven by the purchaser down the river to Fredericton boom, where they were claimed by the trespass claimants, and the boom corporation delivered the same to them. Nothing further has yet been done, it being thought advisable to let the matter await the decision of the title by the court, the boom corporation being holden in case of wrong delivery, and the necessary steps having been taken to secure their liability.

On a subsequent page of this Report will be found a list of the several townships and parts of townships which have from time to time been set apart and designated for settlement under existing laws, all of which, it is contended, are excepted from the State deed to the railway corporation, but which, so far as unsold, the company claim as embraced within their grant. As the grounds of these respective claims were fully stated in the last Annual Report of this Department, it is regarded unnecessary to repeat them here.

3. A third claim is made by the same railway company to the timber on the northwest and southeast quarters of township number eight in range four west from the east line of the State, under the same deed to them from the State. The facts are briefly these:—By "Resolve in favor of the Maine Wesleyan Seminary and Female College," approved March 22, 1864, the timber on a half township of land was voted to be sold by the Land Agent and the proceeds thereof not exceeding \$10,000, paid over on certain conditions to that institution. The conditions were complied with and the timber on the premises above described, appropriated for the purpose, and sale was made according to the statute. The agent of the institution, acting for it, was declared the purchaser, and record made thereof, but no conveyance. The Legislature of

1870, passed another resolve, directing the Land Agent to sell the timber set apart under the former resolve and pay the proceeds to the same institution. Under this resolve, the Land Agent again sold the timber, and a deed was made to the purchaser, who permitted E. G. Dunn to cut it, and he made payment to the purchaser. The railway company make claim to the timber and have sued Dunn for it. The action came on for trial at the last April term of the Supreme Court at Bangor, and the case made law, and was argued before the Law Court at its June session, and is now held for advisement. On the part of the State it is claimed that the timber in question comes within the exception of their deed, which saves from its effect "all timber and lumber and lands granted or voted by the present or any preceding Legislature," the resolve in favor of the Seminary being two days earlier in date than that under which the company claim. Previous to the last sale, the purchaser at the first sale, to obviate any objection arising therefrom, released to the State all claims to the premises so as to enable the State to give a good title to the new purchaser.

EXPENDITURES ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The following expenditures have been made during the past year on roads and bridges under resolves of the Legislature.

The sum of \$1,500 appropriated by resolve approved February 25, 1871, to aid in building bridges in the town of Phillips, has been paid over to said town, the conditions of said resolve having been substantially complied with, and said town having expended more than "an equal sum for like purpose."

The sum of \$500 appropriated by resolve approved February 27, 1872, has been expended under the direction of Abel D. Russell, Esq., of Weld.

Under the resolve entitled "resolve in aid of building a bridge in Fort Kent," approved February 27, 1872, the sum of \$1,000 has been paid to the treasurer of said town, a good substantial bridge having been built across Fish river agreeably to the terms of said resolve.

The Legislature at its last session, appropriated "a sum not exceeding \$2,000" in aid of building a road across Silver Ridge plantation in the county of Aroostook, provided the amount appropriated should be derived solely from stumpage that should be received by the Land Agent "for operations on the land belonging to the State in townships of Sherman, Island Falls and Silver

Ridge," and said sum having been received from the operations named in said resolve, the same has been expended under the supervision of Daniel Randall, Esq., of Island Falls.

By resolve approved February 29, 1872, the sum of \$1,000 was appropriated in aid of building a bridge across Dead river at Flagstaff, in the county of Somerset, "provided said bridge shall be completed to the satisfaction of the Land Agent before said sum shall be paid by the State," and said bridge having been completed agreeably to said resolve, the sum appropriated has been paid to the treasurer of said county.

By a resolve entitled "Resolve in aid of a road in Kingsbury," the sum of \$500 was appropriated to be expended under the direction of the Land Agent, upon the New England road, so called, in the town of Kingsbury, between Kingsbury mills and Thorn Brook bridge; "provided that the town of Kingsbury shall raise and expend an equal sum upon said road, under the supervision and to the acceptance of the Land Agent." But as said town failed to comply with the provisions of said resolve, no warrant has been drawn for this appropriation, and it remains in the treasury unexpended.

The sum of \$1,000, authorized by resolve approved Feb. 29, 1872, to be expended in aid of building a road in Oakfield plantation in Aroostook county, has been faithfully expended under the superintendence of Benjamin F. Higgins, Esq., of Oakfield plantation.

By resolve entitled "Resolve in aid of building bridges in Chapman plantation," approved February 28, 1872, a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars was appropriated to aid in building two bridges in Chapman plantation, "when said bridges shall be built to the acceptance of the Land Agent; provided the same is received from stumpage on said lands on the township where the bridges are." But no stumpage having been received from said lands, nothing has been paid under said resolve.

From the unexpended balance of the appropriation of \$300, made by Resolve approved March 17, 1870, to be expended in repairing the bridge over the Mattawamkeag river in the town of Mattawamkeag, the sum of \$150 has been expended towards defraying the expenses of building "head piers" to protect the granite piers of said bridge. The whole expense of building these piers was \$416.43, of which the Mattawamkeag Log Driving Company paid \$266.43.

Although the past season has been unusually wet and unfavora-

ble for the building of roads, it is believed that the appropriations made by the last Legislature for this purpose, have been faithfully expended.

The bridge built by the State over the Molunkus stream on the Military road is in a very dilapidated condition, and has been rendered safe for public travel for the last three years, only by frequent repairs. The superstructure of this bridge rests on firm granite abutments, but it is in such a state of decay that it cannot be made safe without extensive repairs, and even if it should withstand the freshet of the coming spring, which is very doubtful, it will be indispensably necessary that it should be rebuilt the ensuing year.

Ascertaining that the bridge built by the State over the Mattawamkeag river at Haynesville, was so much injured by logs driven down the river during the freshet of last spring, as to endanger the safety of the bridge, Joseph Libbey, Esq., of Molunkus, was, by advice of the Governor and Council, employed to make such repairs only as might be necessary to prevent the bridge from being carried away by the next spring's freshet, but on account of the long continued wet weather which kept the river at an unusual height, he was unable to finish the work, which should be completed the present winter.

RESOLVE IN FAVOR OF DEODAT BRASTOW.

In accordance with the "Resolve in favor of Deodat Brastow in relation to certain lands in the town of Lincoln," approved February 23, 1872, the Land Agent has investigated the title to the lands described in the resolve, having fully heard the party in reference thereto. After a full investigation of all the facts and records pertaining to the claim, he is fully of the opinion that said Brastow is not entitled to any relief sought by him under said resolve. He is, therefore, satisfied that it is neither "prudent nor expedient," in the language of the resolve, for the State to procure any release, such as is provided for, and he has, therefore, taken no steps towards negotiating for one.

SWEDISH IMMIGRATION.

In the last annual report of this department, a particular statement was made of the progress of Scandinavian immigration into this State, under the provisions of the recent statutes to promote it. In addition to the township of New Sweden, being No. 15,

Range 3, W. E. L. S., other surveys have been made of lands in townships No. 14, in Ranges 3 and 4, for the accommodation of immigrants, and many lots assigned accordingly. In 1870, certificates were issued for thirty-four lots of this class; in 1871, one hundred and one lots, and during the present year, thirty-three—making 168 in all and containing 16,800 acres. In addition to these, many other lots have been taken up by immigrants who have not yet applied for certificates, the exact number of which is not now known. About 20,000 acres in all are estimated to have been taken. Of the lands thus taken up, about two thousand acres have been felled and wholly or partially cleared, seven hundred acres being actually in crop. The wet season has prevented the remainder from being completely fitted for cultivation. Some thirty miles of road have been partially completed, of which three miles are turnpiked, leading towards Caribou village. One hundred dwelling-houses are erected, one water-power saw-mill and two steam shingle mills.

About thirteen hundred Swedish colonists have thus far been added to our population within the short time already elapsed, six hundred of whom have made themselves homes on the lands assigned them as already described. Many of the others are regarded as belonging to the colony, though temporarily engaged in various occupations elsewhere in the State. A school of seventy-seven scholars is in successful operation in the central part of New Sweden, in which the English language is exclusively taught, and great proficiency is made by them in mastering the difficulties of substituting this for their native tongue.

The colonists are a very valuable class of citizens,—industrious, temperate, intelligent, and well affected towards our government, its laws and institutions. In overcoming the hardships and privations necessary to the establishment of a new home in our wilderness, they steadily exhibit a courage and determination worthy of all praise. By their untiring industry and perseverance, that wilderness has already come to assume all the features of an older and well settled community, and no discouragement seems to find a place within their lines. Under the constant and prudent oversight of our able and faithful Commissioner of Immigration, who initiated the work and has followed it with his especial care and guardianship, the enterprise may be well regarded as a success, worthy the fullest confidence and patronage of the State.

The past season has in some respects been an unfortunate one

to the colony, on account of the unusual amount of rain which has to a considerable extent interfered with the clearing of their lands and the successful gathering of their rich and abundant crops. On this account they may need to some extent the fostering aid of the State. Such aid the State can well afford to give in exchange for the hardships which the immigrants have thus successfully triumphed over, and it is confidently hoped it will not be withheld.

LOCAL AGENTS FOR SETTLING LANDS.

The following persons, residing in the vicinity of lands set apart and designated for settlement, were appointed, agreeably to section twenty-eight, chapter five, of the Revised Statutes, "to superintend the location of settlers, the payment of their road labor, and the performance of their several duties:"
