REPORT.

PRESENT CONDITION.

The condition of the military force of the State has changed but little since the date of the last annual report from this office. No companies have been organized and none disbanded within the year. The number of men enlisted has been small and but few have been discharged.

There are now ten companies composing the First Regiment; and two unattached companies of Infantry, and one Battery of Light Artillery. The number of enlisted men of Infantry is 772, and of Artillery 146, making the total of enlisted men 918. The number of commissioned officers, including Division and Regimental staff, is 55.

INCREASE.

The number of applications which have been received asking for permission to organize new companies, shows that it would be very easy indeed to have several regiments of infantry instead of one. There is a large class of young men who, though not old enough to enter either the army or navy during the war, are now anxious to know something of military drill and manœuvre, and desire permission to organize into companies under authority of law, and to be furnished with arms and equipments by the State. These companies would provide the regulation uniforms at private expense, and would, of course, be in readiness to perform any duty which might be required by the State. The cost in money of maintaining a company of this kind would be but trifling, and a small increase in numbers would undoubtedly result in a livelier sympathy with the whole, and render the militia more useful and effective if its services should ever be required. But until the companies already organized shall be properly supplied with what they require, I cannot say that I think it advisable to encourage the formation of new ones. The purpose has been to have a small force well organized and equipped, and to keep it within proportions which might not be burdensome.

APPROPRIATION.

The last Legislature appropriated for military purposes the sum of \$15,600.00, but only \$12,600.00 have been available. This has been used for paying the troops, for clothing, for transportation, for subsistence, for repairs of ordnance, for salary of arsenal keeper, and other usual and customary purposes.

ENCAMPMENT.

The annual encampment took place at Bangor by order of Major General Joshua L. Chamberlain, on the 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th days of September. A detailed account of it will be found in the report of the Inspector General, which is herewith submitted.

INSPECTION.

But one inspection has been made by the Inspector General during the year. That was at the time of the encampment at Bangor. His report will show the condition in which he then found the command.

I think the Inspector General should hereafter visit the different companies at their armories, and there ascertain the exact condition of the company property and accounts, as well as the general management and conduct of affairs of each organization, as often, at least, as the law requires. It is not the fault of the Inspector that it has not been done heretofore. He should also be able to report fully upon the condition of the different armories, especially upon their suitability and safety as places of deposit for public property. This is more important in consequence of the recent legislation upon this subject.

NOTE.—Massachusetts appropriated for military purposes for 1874, including house for arsenal keeper and fence for camp ground, \$403,000 00. In Connecticut the amount available for military purposes for 1874 was about \$70,000.00. In Rhode Island the expense has averaged per year, during the last six years, about \$33,000.00.

The repeal of the law, by the Legislature of 1874, under which the "Board of Guardians of Indigent Orphans" have granted aid to the orphan children of deceased soldiers and seamen of the late war, has resulted in some additional claims upon this office for assistance, but not to the extent which might have been anticipated.

The customary appropriation for use of the Board was discontinued when the law establishing the Board was repealed, but the appropriation for pensions was ample, and no increase will be required for the year to come.

The change in the law relating to pensions, approved February 28, 1874, would seem to render it unnecessary for new applications to be made in 1875 in cases where pensions have been granted the present year; but evidence showing a continuance of the necessity for aid in meritorious cases would, of course, be required. A modification of the rules governing the administration of the law, in this particular, might save some expense and inconvenience to deserving persons and result in no injury to the State.

Section four of the act above referred to contains what appears to have been a clerical error, affecting the rights of soldiers who receive aid from the State. I think it was not the intention of the Legislature to impair, but to protect the rights of such as

might receive assistance in consequence of disabilities incurred by honorable service. This section should be so amended as to secure the results evidently intended by the Legislature.

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S REPORT.

SKOWHEGAN, ME., Sept. 30, 1874.

To His Excellency, NELSON DINGLEY, JR.,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR,—In obedience to General Orders No. 9, dated Adjutant General's Office, August 27, 1874, I attended the encampment of the First Division of the Militia of Maine, holden at Bangor, September 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th, and witnessed the various exercises of the troops on that occasion, and submit the following report:

On the arrival of the special train at Bangor on the morning of the 1st inst., a line was formed, by Col. C. P. Mattocks, consisting of nine companies of the First Regiment, and the troops moved at once to the place of encampment, about one and a half miles from the city. The other company belonging to the First Regiment, in consequence of some delay in transportation, did not arrive until later in the day, when it joined its proper command.

The unattached companies of infantry were promptly on the ground, occupying their appropriate place.

The movement of the Battery of Light Artillery from the depot to the place of encampment was not of a character to elicit commendation.

The place of encampment, known as "French's Field," was well selected, being large, smooth and dry, near enough to the city and convenient to the arsenal.

It would have been better if the subject of a sufficient supply of good water had received earlier attention, and so have saved the expense and inconvenience of hauling from a long distance.

The distribution of rations, forage and fuel appeared to have been attended to with commendable promptness, and the troops at an early hour had the appearance of comfort, neatness and good order.

The First Regiment was under command of Col. C. P. Mattocks. The unassigned companies were under command of the senior

officer, Capt. A. J. McMahon of the Montgomery Guards, and the Androscoggin Light Artillery was commanded by Capt. A. S. Perham.

Guard mounting was well executed on the morning of Sept. 2d, and drills by company and battalion were the order of the day. The guard duty was well performed, and the drills showed accuracy and thoroughness of instruction, with the exception of the battery.

The order and discipline of the encampment were good, and but little of an objectionable character was noticed.

Some of the company quarters were particularly noticed for neatness, and the whole gave evidence of much care in the general police arrangements. The exercises of the other days were similar to those described, with improvements from day to day.

The general inspection of arms and accoutrements was somewhat hurried, owing to the want of sufficient time for that purpose on the day designated, but I was satisfied, however, from careful observation, not only on that occasion but at other times, that good care had been taken of the arms, equipments and uniforms, and much credit is due to all the companies for their general good appearance.

I have to suggest that hereafter some day other than that designated for the review by the Commander-in-Chief be selected for inspection, and that the inspection by division and other officers be made at the same time, so that there may be less interruption of battalion and brigade movements.

The Battery of Light Artillery, although composed of excellent material, hardly fulfils a reasonable expectation. The discipline cannot be reported as good and the instruction was poor.

The review by the Commander-in-Chief, on the third day of the encampment, was the occasion of a lively interest among the troops, and gave evidence of a good degree of efficiency on the part of most of the command.

It is an erroneous idea that the expenditure annually made for military instruction is thrown away. If the volunteer troops of the Federal army had been acquainted with military discipline and tactics in the beginning of the war of 1861, unquestionably much of life would have been saved and much of disaster avoided.

To be prepared for every emergency should be considered the part of wisdom, and so long as the liability exists of disturbances

of the public peace greater than the civil *possee* can control, it may be regarded as a duty to have a well organized and instructed citizen-soldiery, for our chief reliance in the future must continue to be upon this rather than upon the strength of a standing army.

I am under obligations to Major General Chamberlain and his staff for favors shown, for which they have my most grateful thanks.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S REPORT.

CLOTHING.

Clothing has been furnished during the year for the "Hersey Light Infantry" of Oldtown, for the "Crosby Guards" of Hampden, and for the "Belfast City Guards" of Belfast.

The uniforms of the First Regiment of Infantry and the Androscoggin Light Artillery are now complete, with the exception of overcoats.

The amount paid for clothing during the year is \$3,795.00.

The First Regiment of Infantry and the Battery of Light Artillery should be furnished with overcoats, and an appropriation ought to be made for that purpose.

CAMP AND GARRISON EQUIPAGE.

The encampment rendered it necessary to hire tents again, the State having none suitable for the purpose, and the requisite number were obtained of Mr. R. M. Yale of Boston. Although the price paid for their use may be regarded as reasonable, yet it does not seem that this is the proper course to pursue in the future. If the encampments are to continue, all the camp and garrison equipage required by the troops while in the field should be owned by the State. The cost of a sufficient number of tents for use of the troops already organized would be about \$3,000.00.

PORTLAND ARSENAL.

I have heretofore called attention to the condition of the old arsenal building at Portland. The building sits upon land belonging to the Maine General Hospital corporation, and its removal will soon be required. It can hardly be called a safe place for the deposit of so much property as is sometimes stored there by the State, nor is it convenient in size or shape. If another place is not provided it will probably become necessary to transfer the stores to the arsenal at Bangor.

GUN HOUSE AT EAST MACHIAS.

By a resolve of the Legislature, approved March 3, 1874, the Adjutant General was authorized to sell the gun house at East Machias and apply the proceeds thereof, together with two hundred dollars additional, to the construction of a gun house at Eastport. It has not yet been deemed advisable to sell the property at East Machias, nor has a suitable lot yet been selected at Eastport. The money appropriated by the resolve is unexpended.

ORDNANCE.

The amount of ordnance and ordnance stores received from the United States during the year is \$4,316.36, and there remains due the State from the general government, at the close of the year, the sum of \$619.14.

All the troops have now been supplied with Springfield breech-loading rifles and the new pattern of equipments recently adopted for use of the United States army.

I have reason to suspect that a portion of the ordnance now in use, as well as some of the stores in the arsenals, can no longer be regarded as serviceable. I think a careful inspection should be made, and such as are found defective, if any, or from any cause unfit for use, should be condemned and sold.

MILITARY PROPERTY.

An Act concerning the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECTION 1. A company of infantry shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, four sergeants, eight corporals, two musicians, one wagoner, not less than forty nor more than sixty-four privates.

SECTION 2. General, field and line officers shall be commissioned for the term of six years.

SECTION 3. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 9.

I. Major General Joshua L. Chamberlain, commanding the First Division of Militia of Maine, having ordered an encampment of the troops under his command, to commence at Bangor on the first day of September next, the Inspector General is directed to attend the encampment, and carefully observe the instruction, drill and manœuvres practiced and make written detailed report thereon. He will report the amount and kind of duty performed by the troops each day, the manner of its performance, the condition of each regiment, batallion, and company, the degree of order maintained, and the general police of the encampment; he will also make such suggestions as he may deem important upon the working and efficiency of the system of instruction, drill and discipline prescribed, and of the necessity of further regulation and legislation in order to perfect the military system of the State.

He will transmit his report to the Commander-in-Chief within thirty days from the breaking up of the encampment.

II. At the conclusion of the encampment, commanders of companies will make correct duplicate returns of their several com-

panies for each day of the encampment, upon which the commander of the regiment or batallion to which the company belongs shall certify whether each company, on each of the days of the encampment, well and faithfully performed the duties required, and the number of officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates therein reported as present and doing duty each day is correct.

He will deliver one of such returns to the Division Inspector, and transmit the other, within ten days after the encampment, to the Adjutant General, at Augusta.

III. Within ten days after the encampment, each company commander will make correct alphabetical pay-rolls of his company, containing the names of the members who appeared armed, uniformed and equipped, and performed all the duties required during the encampment, and showing the duty done by each member, and transmit the same, certified under his oath to be correct and true, to the Adjutant General.

IV. During the encampment the Major General commanding the Division will forward each day to the Adjutant General, a Morning Report, showing the condition of the command.
