## REPORT.

#### MILITARY FORCE.

The military organizations of the State remain in essentially the same condition, so far as relates to strength of numbers, as when the last annual report from this office was made.

But two of the existing companies date their organization before the year 1869, and in all, the enlistments of men have been for the term of six years; but the frequent discharges from the service and the new enlistments which have been continually made, have kept the average strength substantially the same each year.

The number of companies recognized by the State has not been increased or diminished since the first of January last, and is now as follows, viz:

Ten companies of infantry composing the First Regiment; two companies of unattached infantry; and one battery of Light Artillery.

#### DISCIPLINE AND INSTRUCTION.

The discipline and instruction of the troops are reported to be as good as the opportunities for drill will allow.

The arms used by the infantry have been much improved since the close of the war, breech-loading having taken the place of muzzle-loading rifles, so that much of the instruction obtained by those who were in service during the rebellion is no longer useful.

The tactics adopted for use of the army and militia have been revised and altered, and the drill now differs in many particulars from what it was a few years ago. Some further opportunity for instruction than company drill affords, is necessary for proficiency in the soldierly duties pertaining to the organized militia of a State.

#### LAW.

The law governing the Militia, with the exception of a few amendments, was enacted in 1865; and for some reason not now necessary to explain, was left out of the recent edition of the Revised Statutes.

The printed copies of the act having all been distributed, it should either be re-printed or re-enacted with the amendments properly made, so that it may be possible for those who are expected to obey, to know the provisions the law contains.

#### CENTENNIAL.

The Centennial Exhibition which is to take place at Philadelphia next year, is already attracting the notice of the Militia of the State.

A National Exhibition, such as is contemplated, has been rendered possible only by the patient services and sacrifices of the Volunteer soldier; and a small appropriation by the Legislature would enable the Militia of Maine to be represented there at such time as may be designated for martial display. Some correspondence with the Centennial Committee having such matters in charge, has already taken place.

#### CLERKS.

I cannot close this report without expressing my thanks to Capt. A. L. Smith, chief clerk of this office, and to S. J. Gallagher, clerk, for the faithful manner in which they have performed their duties.

Capt. Smith has, by his long acquaintance with the business of the department and his intimate knowledge of all matters relating to the organization of companies and regiments in the State during the rebellion, the payments of bounties to the same, and the rules of the office governing at the time, as well as by his promptness and accuracy, rendered his services invaluable.

Of those to whom pensions have been allowed during the year twelve have died and one remarried.

The municipal officers of cities and towns can hardly be too careful in the examination of cases when the aid of the State is invoked.

It is often found impossible to determine whether a pension should be granted or not, or if granted, what sum should be allowed, in consequence of the want of care in making a clear and plain statement of the pecuniary condition of the person applying.

As the rule of the office must be to withhold the pension until the case is clearly established, or in doubtful cases to decide in favor of the State, deserving persons may sometimes suffer for the reason that the facts are not clearly and plainly stated in the papers sent here as evidence.

No increase of appropriation will be required for the year to come, and perhaps a small reduction may safely be made.

### REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL.

Skownegan, December 31, 1875.

To His Excellency, Nelson Dingley, Jr.,

Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

Sir,—In the performance of my duties as Inspector General, I have visited the State Arsenals at Bangor and Portland, and also most of the armories used by the military organizations of the State, and submit the following report:

#### BANGOR ARSENAL.

The arsenal at Bangor I found in excellent condition in all respects, and the military stores well taken care of. The buildings and contents giving evidence of the prudence, care and fidelity of the keeper, Mr. Maxwell.

#### PORTLAND ARSENAL.

The arsenal at Portland is of wood, small and inconvenient, and is not a safe or in any respect a suitable place for the deposit of military property of value.

#### BIDDEFORD LIGHT INFANTRY.

The armory of the Biddeford Light Infantry is in good condition, and in all respects satisfactory. The arms and equipments in use by the company showed that the officers in charge have been careful and attentive in the performance of their duties.

#### PORTLAND LIGHT INFANTRY.

The armory of this company was not in the clean and neat condition which I expected to find it. That carelessness, disorder and want of discipline have prevailed there, is too evident, and unless there is improvement the company should be disbanded.

But under the care of its new commander, better things are expected of it, and I am not without hope that it will recover its former reputation for discipline and proficiency in all its duties.

#### PORTLAND MECHANIC BLUES.

The armory of this company was such as might have been expected from the well earned reputation of the company. Neatness and order were apparent in everything relating to the armory, and to company property and affairs which came under my notice.

#### PORTLAND MONTGOMERY GUARDS.

The armory is not in good condition. It needs repairs and should be cleaned. The arms and equipments are well taken care of.

#### NORWAY LIGHT INFANTRY.

I did not visit the Norway Company, but from the reports which I have received concerning it, I am satisfied that its armory, as well as the arms and equipments, are all in good condition.

#### AUBURN LIGHT INFANTRY.

This company has a good armory, nicely kept, and the military property stored there has been well taken care of and in no way neglected.

#### CAPITAL GUARDS.

The Capital Guards of Augusta have a large and well arranged armory, safe and convenient, and no pains have been spared to make it what a company armory is designed to be. The arms and equipments are in excellent condition.

#### SKOWHEGAN LIGHT INFANTRY.

This company has a small armory, which is kept in good condition. It is not large enough for the company drill, but is a safe place for the deposit of the military property. The arms and equipments are well cared for.

#### JAMESON GUARDS.

This company has one of the finest armories in the State, and much attention is paid to keeping it clean and in order, rendering it a pleasant and agreeable place for company meetings. The arms and equipments are in excellent condition.

#### HERSEY LIGHT INFANTRY.

The armory used by this company is hardly suitable for the purpose. A better one should be provided. The arms and equipments are clean and in good order.

#### CROSBY GUARDS.

This company was not visited, but from the reports which I have received, I am satisfied it has a good and convenient armory, and one in which the public property may be safely kept.

#### BELFAST CITY GUARDS.

This company is reported to have a safe and convenient armory, and its arms and equipments are represented in good condition. I regret that in consequence of limitation of time, I was not able to personally inspect the armory or the arms and equipments of the company.

#### Androscoggin Light Artillery.

The armory of this company is an old building, but it is in decent repair at the present time. It is not sufficiently provided with locks and bolts, and is therefore too much exposed to the public. A building used for this purpose should not be opened by every one who may have the curiosity to examine its contents. I was assured that better care would be taken of the armory in the future.

The swords used by the company were very rusty, and the uniforms were dirty and neglected. I am convinced that the property will never be taken care of as it should be under the present arrangements.

If the battery could be divided, and a portion of it be placed under the command of a lieutenant in another locality, within a reasonable distance, so that all could be brought easily together when the occasion might require it, more interest in the company and better management would, I have no doubt, result from the change.

I have to renew my suggestion made in a former report, concerning the necessity of occasionally calling the troops together for drill and exercise in regimental and brigade movements, as well as in the other duties of field service. The militia cannot be well instructed or efficient without this practice.

### QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S REPORT.

No clothing has been issued during the present year to the troops, but by a special act of the Legislature, approved February 22d, 1875, the sum of \$1,130.92 has been paid in commutation of clothing to the Biddeford Light Infantry, this company having been provided with uniforms at private expense some two years ago.

By the provisions of the law seven companies of infantry and one company of light artillery will be entitled to clothing in 1876, and an appropriation should be made for its purchase by the next Legislature. If this is not done, the law should be so modified as to give the Governor authority to direct clothing to be issued or commutation of it to be paid whenever in his opinion the public good may require it.

#### CAMP AND GARRISON EQUIPAGE.

The amount of camp and garrison equipage owned by the State is small, and but very little of it is suitable for service. Tents were hired for use of the troops when they were called into camp in 1873 and 1874, and the same course would necessarily be pursued again if the command, or any portion of it should be called out. I think the State should own such camp equipage and military property as may be required for use of the limited force now organized.

#### ARSENALS.

The arsenal building at Portland has been removed from the Maine General Hospital grounds to a position near the Maine Central Railroad, and not far from its former position. It has been repaired and painted and will answer the immediate purpose of a small store house, but being of wood it cannot be regarded as a safe place of deposit for the more valuable stores belonging to the State.

The Bangor arsenal is in very good repair, and contains the most important part of the military property now on hand. Both have been recently inspected by General Dyer, Inspector General.

#### ARMORIES.

An act was passed by the Legislature two years ago providing that cities and towns may be reimbursed for certain expenses on account of armories furnished for company uses. Several bills for rent have been received at this office and laid before the Governor and Council. An appropriation of \$2,500 is required to pay existing claims of this kind, and the sum of \$1,300 will be required annually for this purpose if the law in this particular remains unchanged.

Inspector General Dyer, as will appear by his report, has visited the different company armories, with a few exceptions, and found them generally in fair condition.

#### EXPENSES

The appropriation for military purposes for the year 1875 was \$6,500.00.

#### ORDNANCE.

Ordnance and ordnance stores have been received from the chief of ordnance of the United States army during the year to the value of \$3 360.70, and there is now due the State on the same account the sum of \$617.44.

The College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts has been supplied with one hundred Springfield breech-loading rifles and equipments during the year, which cost \$2,078. The balance of the arms and equipments received have been placed in the arsenals.

GENERAL ORDER No. 1.

The following act of the Legislature is published for the information of all concerned:

An Act additional to chapter twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, concerning the militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. The volunteer company known as the Biddeford Light Infantry, is hereby made subject to all the duties, and granted all the privileges provided for volunteer companies of militia, by chapter twenty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

- I. The Volunteer Militia will parade for inspection, company drill and manœuvre, on the first Wednesday of May next, at their respective company quarters.
- II. Company Commanders will make the inspection, and will forward to these Headquarters rolls showing the discipline, proficiency in drill, soldierly appearance of the companies, and the condition of uniforms, arms and equipments on the day of inspection.
