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## STATE OF MAINE.

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ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE, }  
December 1, 1877. }

*To the Governor and Council:*

I herewith submit my report of the business of this office for the preceding year.

### REVENUE CASES.

In my report for 1876, I stated that several Railroad Companies claimed exemption from the act of 1874, known as the "Railroad Tax Act." This exemption was claimed on the ground that their original charters stipulated for a different mode of taxation, and such stipulation was a contract which the State could not impair under the Constitution of the United States. I also stated that suit had been brought against the Maine Central Railroad Company in the Supreme Judicial Court of the State, to recover the tax of 1875, and that the case had been duly argued.

Since my last report, the Court in a full, able and elaborate opinion by the Chief Justice, has decided the cause in favor of the State. The opinion, which also contains a full statement of the facts, is reported in vol. 66 of the Maine Reports, page 488, to which I respectfully refer you for complete information about the case and the principles involved.

The Maine Central Company did not acquiesce in this decision, and have carried the cause on a writ of error into the Supreme Court of the United States, as they had a right to do under the constitution and laws of the United States, the

State Court having decided that in this case the Act of 1874 was not in conflict with any provision of the United States constitution. The writ of error was entered at the present term of the Supreme Court at Washington, where I also entered an appearance for the State.

The case cannot be reached in regular turn on the docket of the Supreme Court under two years, such is the crowded state of that docket. A State, however, under section 949 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, may have its case advanced upon showing sufficient cause. I have entered and argued a motion to advance this case on the docket, and have urged upon the Court to fix an early day for the hearing of the cause. Mr. Drummond, counsel for the company, kindly signified to the Court his willingness to have the case advanced. The Court has not yet passed upon my motion, and hence I cannot yet inform you whether the case will be advanced or not.

Upon referring to the opinion of our State Court, it will be seen that the decision only applies to this particular company, the Maine Central, and does not conclude the other companies from setting up a claim for exemption under their charters. Hence new actions would be necessary to determine the question of their exemption and enforce the collection of the taxes upon them. Accordingly, under the direction of the State Treasurer and Governor and Council, I have commenced in the Supreme Judicial Court of the State, actions against the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Railroad Company, and the Dexter and Newport Railroad, for the recovery of all the arrearages of taxes assessed upon them. Hon Josiah Crosby, counsel for the Dexter and Newport, kindly assures me that he will co-operate in the effort to procure a speedy and inexpensive adjudication. I presume a similar arrangement can be made with the counsel for the Atlantic and St. Lawrence, and that both causes can be argued and determined at the next Law term of the Court. I do not know that anything more can be done to further the collection of these taxes.

## MURDER CASES.

The year has been quite prolific in murder trials compared with the preceding year, but in every case of conviction, the offence had been committed in the year before. At the March term of the Supreme Judicial Court at Paris, in Oxford County, I was called to assist in the trial before Judge Barrows of Miss Ianche Morgan and Mrs. Sophronia J. Libby, sisters, indicted for the murder of the infant child of Ianche Morgan—the October previous. George D. Bisbee, Esq., County Attorney for Oxford County, prepared the case for the State and conducted the trial with me, while David R. Hastings, Esq., conducted the defence. It was a very distressing case. The poor women had killed the child in desperation arising from poverty and shame. Mr. Hastings plead powerfully for them, but the fact of the killing was proved, and the jury could do no less than render the verdict they did, "guilty of murder in the second degree." Both the women were sentenced to imprisonment for life.

From Paris I was almost immediately called to Bath to assist in the trial before Judge Danforth of Isaac N. Cox, a boy of fourteen years, indicted for the murder of his father a few days before, by shooting him. Wm. T. Hall, Esq., County Attorney, also appeared for the State, and Joseph W. Spaulding, Esq., for the defence. The only question was that of the existence of malice. The State's counsel contended that the shooting was done purposely, and that the verdict should be guilty of murder. The jury however only found the prisoner guilty of manslaughter. The prisoner was sentenced to six years imprisonment. This was also a very distressing case. The anguish of the widow of the deceased and the mother of the prisoner, joined with the sympathy of friends for the family, made it very trying for the officers.

Within a few weeks after the Cox trial, was begun the trial before Judge Peters at Ellsworth, of Edward M. Smith, indicted for the murder of Mellisa T. Thayer at Bucksport the October previous, under circumstances of great atrocity.

George P. Dutton, Esq., County Attorney, also appeared for the State, and Harvey D. Hadlock, Esq., for the defence. The trial was very protracted, consuming fourteen days; but the evidence was so strong and conclusive against the prisoner, that the jury agreed upon a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree within thirty minutes after the case was committed to them. Mr. Hadlock filed several exceptions to the ruling of the presiding judge, and also moved in arrest of judgment. These exceptions and motion were argued at the June Law term at Bangor. No decision has yet been announced. The evidence in this case of Smith was worked up by officers specially detailed by me under authority of the law of 1877, and the work was most thoroughly done. I am satisfied of the wisdom of that law.

In all these three cases the County Attorneys superintended the preparation of the cases for trial, and are entitled to credit for their faithfulness and efficiency. The Sheriffs and other officers were efficient and zealous. The prisoners in each case were ably defended, and all their legal rights fully protected by watchful and competent counsel.

I have no notice of any other indictments for murder, and think there are none. Several homicides have been committed during the year, but none of them amounted to murder, except the case of wife killing at Belgrade. In this case the prisoner was committed to await the action of the Grand Jury.

I do not know that there is expected of me any expression as to the effect of the abolition of the death penalty for murder. Two years time is hardly long enough to fairly test it. In that time there has been only one conviction, that of Smith at Ellsworth, where the prisoner would have been sentenced to death under the former law. The other convictions were for less offences than murder in the first degree. While I doubt if much can fairly be argued either way from statistics of crime, I should say the statistics in this State so far were, if anything, favorable to the abolition of the death penalty. The experience of another year however may reverse it. I



hardly think the presence or absence of the death penalty has had any direct influence on the number of murders. Its absence may tend to a refining influence upon society, and so indirectly lessen all crime. It is impossible thus far to know what the effect has been in this State.

#### LAW COURT.

I have personally attended the three sessions of the Law Court during the year at Augusta, Bangor and Portland. Nearly, if not quite all, the State's cases were of the ordinary character, not involving any very new or grave questions. Tables A and B appended, show the cases in the Law Courts and the disposition of them. Many of them, especially the liquor cases, were taken to the Law Court merely for delay, and there were no arguments upon them. In many counties the County Attorneys have followed their cases to the Law Court, and been diligent and efficient in presenting them there. I would repeat my former recommendation that the County Attorneys be encouraged by legislative action to present or assist in presenting their cases to the Law Court. In some Counties the Attorneys apparently lose all interest in a case as soon as it is marked "Law" on the County Docket.

#### BUSINESS IN THE COUNTIES.

From the reports of the County Attorneys, I have prepared tables, which will show the amounts and kinds of business done in the several Counties, and the present state of the business. These tables are appended. It will be noticed that no report has been received from one County, hence I can give no report of the business of that County. I seasonably informed the Governor and Council, which is the extent of my power in the matter.

A very large proportion of all the prosecutions are for violations of the liquor law. If that law is not well enforced, it is not for want of abundant prosecutions.

I am glad to say that the State has, as a whole, an excellent corps of prosecuting Attorneys in the Counties. The

office of County Attorney is of great importance and power. Unless restrained by the Attorney General who can rarely be present, the County Attorney can prosecute or not prosecute any indictment or complaint. He is limited in liquor cases, in his power to *nol pros.*, but even here the Court naturally inquires of the Attorney. There is no other officer who has such unlimited discretion in such vital matters. In no other office can an unprincipled man do such infinite mischief. In no other office are integrity, ability and discretion so absolutely necessary. The people cannot exercise too much care in the selection of their County Attorneys.

#### CRIMINAL COSTS.

I append also a table made up from the reports of the County Treasurers.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

The experience of the past year has pressed two desirable changes upon my mind.

I doubt if coroner's inquests upon dead bodies are of sufficient use to justify the expense, and inquests are often very expensive. These inquests determine nothing. The suspected party is always apprehended by the officers before the jury render a verdict. The verdict is of no use to any body. It does not acquit nor convict. It is not a single step toward acquittal or conviction. The testimony taken, is only useful to the respondent, as it has to be filed in Court, and thus the respondent can learn minutely the evidence and make up a defence to fit it. The officers engaged upon the case always look up evidence, independent of the inquest.

I think the State can safely abolish the whole antiquated machinery, and in place of it, simply authorize the State's Attorneys and Sheriffs to take the depositions of witnesses. The testimony could be thus collected with celerity, secrecy, and comparative little cost. The Attorney could determine whether it was of use to prosecute.

Some legislation should be had upon the matter of "expert testimony" in criminal trials. The present system is enormously expensive, and is also unsatisfactory. It is especially so to the State in those cases where it has to pay both sides. This was illustrated in the Smith murder case at Ellsworth last May, in which the examination of the stains and the testimony upon them by "experts" cost \$2400. The gentlemen called by the government were of high standing and reputation in their profession, and were not over-paid. The gentlemen called by the defence, though not so well known to me, were also entitled to compensation commensurate with their professional standing and sacrifice of time. The defence called two, and the prosecution having the burden of proof upon them, felt justified in calling enough to meet that burden.

But worse than the expense, is the tendency of the present system to develop partizanship in "expert" witnesses. Unless they are very high-minded, the conflict of professional opinion will rouse in them an eagerness for victory, as indicated by the verdict, almost as keen as that felt by the counsel in the case. This will be much more intense where the same "experts" are opposed in successive trials. I am bound to say that the "experts" I have come into official intercourse with, were in the main candid and single minded, but they would admit the strong tendency I have spoken of.

I think both these evils might be lessened by legislation providing that whenever the prosecution or defence shall consider that any matter should be investigated and explained by an expert, application shall be made to the Court or Judge for the appointment of a disinterested expert. The Judge shall notify the other side, and after hearing, shall appoint such person as he finds to be suitable. The investigations made by such expert should be open to both sides during their entire progress. If it be a recondite matter the Judge might appoint more than one expert. The gentleman so appointed, would not be *employed* by either side, and would have no *employer* to serve. Their investigations and opin-

ions could be vigorously tested in cross examination and the final result would be more satisfactory to the Court and jury.

I earnestly urge some legislation upon these matters.

The other business of this office in the way of advising the different departments in matters of law, will appear upon the records and files of those departments.

I am glad to report that I have not been called upon during the year to file any informations, nor to obtain any injunctions, nor begin proceedings of *quo warranto* against any officer or corporation.
