REPORT.

There has been no increase of the military force of the State during the past year.

The failure of the Legislature to elect a Major General practically abolished the division organization of the militia, and to conform to the necessities of the case General Order No. 2, dated March 4, 1878, was issued, whereby paragraph 1 of General Order No. 9, dated June 30, 1873, establishing First Division Militia of Maine, was revoked.

• To further perfect and consolidate the organization, the Montgomery Guards, Biddeford Light Infantry and Richards' Light Infantry were assigned temporarily to Col. Mattocks' command, and their reports directed to be made through his head-quarters.

While thirteen companies are an awkward number for a regiment, no difficulties have attended the arrangement in matters of reports and returns; and at encampment the objection to the number of companies was successfully avoided by detailing an entire company for guard duty each day.

This aggregate differs from last year in showing a loss of one in the total.

CADETS.

The force of High School Cadets has been diminished by loss of one company. Co. C, Connor Cadets, by a large portion of its officers leaving to enter college, became reduced

in numbers, and the arms issued to it were called in. One reason that prevented the permanent success in this company was the effort of the Cadets to maintain an armory outside the high school building, the rental of which was a burden too large for the Cadets.

It is strongly urged that all cadet companies have armories in their high school building, and thus save the rental of a hall and avoid the evils that so often cluster around an armory that may be used as a club-room or an idle loafing place.

The experience of another year has confirmed the opinion expressed in two previous reports, and I am fully persuaded that cadet companies in the high schools of the State have tended to promote good order and discipline in such schools.

UNIFORMS.

The neglect of the Legislature to comply with the public laws of the State, requiring the troops to be provided with a new uniform this year, has discouraged and caused great inconvenience to the militia. They are not only held to observe the full requirements of the law, but to yield a ready obedience to any call of the commander-in-chief to maintain public order or avert public danger. Is not the State of Maine bound by her own laws as securely as the soldier wearing her uniform? Does not public polity and fair dealing go hand in hand with private polity and fair dealing?

It is to the credit of the militia of the State to say that the neglect of the State Legislature to comply with its own laws has caused no remission of duties on their part.

ENCAMPMENT.

They cheerfully consented to serve the six days of the encampment without pay; and the Maine Central Railroad, with like emulation of aiding the State, transported the troops and their baggage without expense.

Grounds for the encampment, well adapted for the purpose, were selected in the town of Winslow, on the opposite side of the river from Waterville.

The weather was propitious, and the six days of the encampment were devoted to battalion manœuvres. The troops daily improved in steadiness and in the power of executing battalion drill under the efficient command of Col. C. P. Mattocks.

In no other way can troops be so thoroughly drilled and taught as in encampments; and to keep a regiment ready for active duty it should be assembled together yearly for instruction and discipline.

On Friday, the fifth day of the encampment, the troops were reviewed by the Commander-in-Chief, Gov. Connor. The marching of the men was excellent, and their steadiness in line and in column was particularly noticeable, and received the commendation of the Governor and the officers of the regular army who were present at the time.

PRIZES.

To turn the attention of the men from the condition of their long worn uniform, and to compensate in part for the gift of their services to the State, prizes were offered for the two best company teams in target practice, and for the best drilled companies, and for the best drilled soldiers. The emulation excited by these contests proved beneficial to the entire command, and confirms the wisdom of offering prizes.

The State prize of \$50, for the company team of ten men making the best score in target firing, and \$25 for team making the second best score, was competed for by eleven teams. The first prize was won by Company G, (Jameson Guards) 1st Regiment, of Bangor. The second prize by Company C, (Auburn Light Infantry) 1st Regiment, of Auburn.

Prizes were offered by the citizens of Waterville for the best drilled companies, viz. \$30 for the best and \$20 for the second best.

The first prize was won by Company G, (Jameson Guards) of Bangor. The second prize by the Montgomery Guards of Portland.

The State medals offered for the best drilled soldiers were won by the following named soldiers :

1st medal, by Sergeant Tower of Company G.

2d medal, by Private Hathorn of Company G.

The referees in the two last contests were officers from the regular army, who generously consented to act in this capacity.

It is hoped that some system of prizes may be adopted as a permanent feature in the training of the militia.

TARGET PRACTICE.

The improved breech-loading gun now in use, by its length of range and rapidity of firing, give especial importance to accuracy of aim and skill in shooting.

A general interest, arising largely from the necessity of the case, has been aroused in the United States in regard to target practice, and it has become an important part of military instruction.

Two thousand rounds have been issued to each company, which has been expended to the manifest advantage of each company.

In addition to the prizes offered at the encampment, additional prizes were offered by the State to encourage target practice, viz. one prize of \$50 and one of \$25 for the best and second best scores made by company teams. These teams were made large, consisting of twenty men from each company, in order to encourage target practice among the militia generally, instead of a contest between a few distinguished marksmen.

These prizes were contended for in November, and were superintended by officers detailed for that purpose, who generously gave their services for the occasion. The first prize was won by the Biddeford Light Infantry, and the second by Company F, 1st Regiment M. V. M., (Capital Guards.)

A dispute having arisen, whether all the members composing the several company teams were duly enlisted as members of the Volunteer Militia, the final determination of question of prizes has been delayed till the point raised is duly settled.

The special prominence given to target practice during the last year is in conformity with the practice in other States, and in accordance with the tendency of the times, and it is believed should be continued another year.

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA OF THE WAR OF 1861.

The resolve approved February 23, 1876, was specially designed to encourage the writing of regimental histories of

Maine soldiers who served in the war of the rebellion, and authorizes this office "to collect diaries or obtain copies of them, letters, personal accounts and incidents of the battle field, camp and hospital, or any other interesting and valuable material for army history, and to arrange and index all such matter and data under the name of the regiment to which it may appertain."

To meet the object of the above resolve, which must commend itself to every soldier of this State, they are requested to forward to this office by express at the expense of the State, or as they prefer, all such diaries, letters or material that may aid regimental histories, or preserve the facts and incidents of the rebellion.

These papers, after being copied in books prepared especially for the purpose, will be returned without expense to their owners.

ROLLS OF THE WAR OF 1812.

The purchase by the State of the rolls of her militia and regular service in the war of 1812, last year, has proved of great value to the surviving soldiers of that war and their widows.

Through the assistance of the member of Congress from the Fifth District, Hon. Eugene Hale, these rolls were compared with the originals and some fifteen hundred names added, and the service each man performed carefully noted, so that Maine can now boast of as accurate and full record of her 1812 service as she has of the war of 1861. The names, numbering some 30,000, have been rewritten and arranged in an alphabetical index, rendering the information therein contained accessible and easily found.

LAW.

The law governing the militia, with the exception of a few amendments, was enacted in 1865; and for some reason not now necessary to explain, was left out of the recent edition of the revised statutes. The printed copies of the act have all

been distributed. It should be re-enacted and made applicable to the present condition of the militia. Much of the law is now a dead letter. It should conform, as far as practicable, with the United States' rules.

Massachusetts and New Hampshire have, by a commission of skilled officers, secured a simple and practicable code, and I would renew the recommendation of last year, that a commission be appointed by the Governor to digest and submit a similar system to the Legislature for their action.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S REPORT.

The act approved February 23, 1867, provides that "The State shall supply a coat, cap, overcoat and pantaloons to each soldier" of the ten companies authorized by said act, and that "the above enumerated articles of clothing, or commutation in lieu thereof, shall be furnished once in three years."

By act approved February 22, 1876, this act was amended so as to read, "the above enumerated articles of clothing, or commutation in lieu thereof, shall be supplied once in five years, reckoning from April 1, 1873."

The object of designating a definite year for supplying clothing, was to secure uniformity in the appearance of the men through the entire command. In justice to the militia, it should be stated that they have not received overcoats from the State, but only caps, coats and pantatoons; that they have now worn the uniform nearly two years longer than originally intended by the law.

The uniforms now in the hands of the troops are the property of the State, and possess some value—perhaps enough to supply overcoats to the command, or a fair proportion of overcoats to each company. The militia during their last three years' encampments have been fortunately favored by the weather, but the medical officers of the troops represent that for guard duty at night, and for the protection of the men in rainy days, overcoats are absolutely necessary.

Under the act of February 22, 1876, eleven companies of infantry and one of artillery are entitled to clothing. In estimating the cost of the same, I have omitted the overcoats allowed by law, and have taken the lowest contract price

obtained last year, that of Wheelwright, Clark & Co., of Bangor.

Under existing orders, sixty uniforms are allowed to each company of infantry, and forty to the artillery company.

Total uniforms 700

The cost at \$21 each, which supplies cap, coat and pantaloons, will be \$14,700. An appropriation for this amount I recommend.

ARSENALS.

Under authority of the resolve approved February 15, 1876, the arsenal building at Portland was sold at public auction, July 9, 1878. The Mayor of Portland was the highest bidder, and obtained the building for the use of the city, for the sum of fifty dollars.

The arsenal at Bangor has been repaired this year, and is now in good condition. The transfer of the ordnance and ordnance stores from the Portland Arsenal has filled its capacity, and I have been unable to call in and store the cannon now in the possession of towns and individuals, because of lack of room at the arsenal.

ARMORIES.

By act of March 4, 1874, an appropriation of \$1,400 will be required to reimburse the towns for rent of armories furnished the companies in their towns.

The armories were thoroughly inspected by General Tilden in 1876 and 1877, and in compliance with the recommendations of last year, new armories, large and fully fitted for their purpose, were provided in Norway and Skowhegan by the municipal authorities. On the ground of economy they were not inspected this year. Such economy is not commendable and its continuance is unwise.

ORDNANCE.

Arms and ordnance stores have been received from the Chief of Ordnance of United States during the year, to the value of \$2,006.70, and there is now due the State on this account the sum of \$8,463.39.

By direction of the Governor and Council the arms and military property in the hands of the citizens have been called in for sale or storage, as may be deemed best. A large proportion of this property has been properly forwarded to the arsenal, which with the property from the Portland arsenal, has filled it to nearly its full capacity.

To encourage the knowledge of military drill, and to meet the desire of a portion of the veterans of the war of 1861, authority was given this office by the Governor and Council to sell organizations of veterans, and to other companies who would use them for purposes of drill and military manoeuvre, the muzzle-loading Springfield and Enfield rifles, with bayonet and a full set of accoutrements, for the low price of one dollar and a half. Seventeen companies have been supplied with arms at this price. In these transactions the State has been the double gainer. It has received a fair price for its guns and has, without expense or responsibility on its part, promoted knowledge in the manual of arms and in tactics, among these seventeen companies.

EXPENSES.

The appropriation for military purposes was \$2,000, to which should be added the amount received from sale of arms and ordnance stores, as follows :

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S REPORT.

CASTINE, Sept. 24, 1878.

GENERAL J. P. CILLEY,

Adjutant General of Maine:

SIR:—In accordance with General Orders No. 5, Adjutant General's Office, August 5th, 1878, I have to state that I attended the encampment of the Militia of Maine, holden at Waterville, commencing the nineteenth and terminating the twenty-fourth day of August, and respectfully submit the following report.

Arriving at the grounds selected for the encampment, I found Col. Mattocks and Quartermaster Gallagher present, who had made all necessary arrangements for the troops going into camp immediately on their arrival at Waterville.

The grounds selected were well located for the health and comfort of the command, well adapted and of sufficient area for all evolutions of the line.

During the first day, all of the companies of the First Regiment, together with the unattached companies of Montgomery Guards of Portland, Richards Light Infantry of Gardiner, and a detachment of the Biddeford Light Infantry, numbering in all four hundred and forty-six rank and file, reported for duty, and were assigned to their several positions in line.

The strength of the command was increased on the third day by the arrival of the Androscoggin Light Artillery, numbering thirty-five men, under command of Lieut. Thomas B. Mennealy, making the entire strength, during the last four days of the encampment, four hundred and eighty.

No appropriation having been made by the last Legislature to defray the expense of an annual muster, the several com-

panies represented, volunteered to attend an encampment for six days, without expense to the State other than the rationing of the troops while in camp, and were accordingly ordered into camp as per General Order No. 4, dated Regimental Head-quarters, Portland, July 16, 1878.

The object of this encampment being to familiarize the different companies in movements in larger masses, the routine of duty was changed somewhat from that of former musters, by dispensing with company drills and devoting all the time assigned for drill to instruction in battalion movements. The entire command seemed interested and determined upon acquiring all the knowledge possible in this direction, as in all the duties connected with a camp of military instruction, in the limited time for which they were assembled.

The amount of work performed was large, and a very decided improvement made in all the evolutions of the line each day of the encampment, so that at the breaking of camp the command had acquired that proficiency in many of the evolutions that would do credit to troops of longer service.

During the afternoon of the fifth day, the entire command was reviewed by the Commander-in-Chief, and presented a creditable appearance, in the steadiness of their marching and the promptness with which each command was executed. Immediately following the review by the Commander-in-Chief, a competitive individual drill, without commands, was had for medals offered by the State of Maine, as first and second prizes; also competitive company drills for a first prize of thirty dollars and a second prize of twenty dollars, contributed by the liberality of the citizens of Waterville.

One member from Company B, and two members of Company G, entered as contestants for the medals, which were both awarded by the judges to the members of Company G.

The Montgomery Guards of Portland and Company G, (Jameson Guards,) of Bangor, were the only companies that entered for the company drills, resulting in the first prize being awarded to the Jameson Guards, and the second prize to the Montgomery Guards.

Thursday, the fourth day of the encampment, company teams of ten men each competed for prizes of fifty and twenty-five dollars, offered by the State of Maine. The shooting was conducted in accordance with Wingate's Manual, at a distance of two hundred yards, at arms' length, with the arms issued by the State. A record of the shots made was furnished you at the time of shooting.

In my former report I referred to the importance of giving more attention to instruction in guard duty. The course pursued at this encampment, having this duty performed by companies, detailing one company each day for day guard and one company for night guard, was instrumental in having a more efficient camp guard, and giving the entire command an opportunity for a better knowledge of this duty.

At my inspection the last day of the encampment, I found, with some few exceptions, the arms and equipments in good condition. The uniforms of two of the companies were in very good condition, while those of others, who have had them six years, were poor, and not fit to be worn, and should be condemned. Twelve companies were entitled to new uniforms the present year, according to the change made in the law in 1876, but no appropriation was made by the last Legislature to provide for them.

The police of the camp was looked after closely, and the grounds and company quarters were at all times clean and orderly.

The order and discipline of the camp were good; very little disturbance occurred in camp. In connection with this, I am pleased to state that, upon making inquiries in town, in regard to reports that some of the command were making considerable disturbance out of camp, I found these charges were without foundation.

Much credit is due to Col. Mattocks and all the officers and men of the command, for their efforts to keep together the small military organization of our State, coming together as the different companies have, the present year, solely for the purpose of instruction, and at their own expense. It would

seem to be the duty of the State to make some appropriation for the care and support of our small militia force, to the extent of the requirements of the present militia laws, and it is to be hoped that the coming Legislature will make some provision for the uniforming of the companies now entitled to new uniforms.

I am under great obligations to Col. Mattocks and Staff and the officers of the different companies, for the courtesy extended me.

General Orders No. 1.

The Military Board, convened by General Orders No. 14, A. G. O., 1877, find that 1st Lieut. Thomas H. Gately of the Portland Montgomery Guards, in regard to his "capacity," "qualifications" and "efficiency," "is qualified to hold the position he now occupies in the militia, both from his general efficiency in his education as a military man, and also his general reputation as a citizen;" but they further find in their opinion "Lieut. Gately has been guilty of impropriety of conduct, in allying himself with a fraction of the company hostile to the commanding officer, and openly opposing his methods of discipline, thus fostering a spirit of discontent, and impairing his own efficiency."

This finding of the Board is enough to authorize the Commander-in-Chief to vacate the commission of Lieut. Gately; for however qualified by "military knowledge," "industry" or "ability," the fact of his incipient insubordination, and a disposition to foster a spirit of discontent, is subversive of correct discipline, and tends to fatally injure the militia organization.

The Commander-in-Chief wishes strongly to discountenance and condemn such impropriety of conduct, especially in the case of this company, where he has every reason to approve the methods of discipline of the commanding officer, and is

only prevented from executing the substantial finding of the Board by their report as to the qualifications of Lieut. Gately, and their suggestion that his conduct did not proceed from a wrong intent.

At the conclusion of the encampment, commanders of companies will make duplicate returns of their several companies for each day of the encampment, upon which the commander of the regiment or battalion to which the company belongs shall certify whether each company on each of the days of the encampment, well and faithfully performed the duties required, and the number of officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates therein reported as present and doing duty each day is correct.

He will deliver one of such returns to the Inspector General, and transmit the other, within ten days after the encampment, to the Adjutant General at Augusta.

III. During the encampment, the colonel commanding will forward each day to the Adjutant General, a morning report, showing the condition of the command.
