STATE OF MAINE.

Attorney General's Office, December 1, 1878.

To the Governor and Council:

I herewith submit my report of the business of this office for the preceding year.

REVENUE CASES.

My report for 1877 left the test case of the State against the Maine Central Railroad Company pending in the Supreme Court of the United States on a writ of error to reverse the judgment of the Supreme Judicial Court of the State in favor of the State. I had filed and argued a motion under section 949 of the Revised Statutes of the United States for the advancement of the cause on the Docket. The Supreme Court in February last, granted the motion to advance, and the cause came on for hearing the first of April. hearing, the cause was fully argued by Hon. J. H. Drummond for the Maine Central Railroad Company, and by myself for Late in April the Court rendered a decision, all the State. the judges but Justice Strong concurring, affirming the judgment of the State Court. The opinion of the Court may be found in vol. 96 of the U.S. Supreme Court Reports, and completely covers all the taxes assessed under the act of 1874 against the Maine Central Railroad Company. This decision of the highest tribunal in the nation settles finally that the Maine Central Railroad Company is liable to taxation under such reasonable laws as the State may establish.

Pending this suit, the Legislature, by chapter 42 of Public Laws of 1878, authorized the railroad companies to apply to the Governor and Council for abatement of any prior taxes. Under this act, the Maine Central Railroad Company made application for abatement early in May, and the matter was continued from session to session until this time. Hence I have not taken out execution, nor taken any steps to enforce the judgment, it being expected that the company would promptly pay as soon as a decision on the matter of abatement was reached. Execution will issue to the Treasurer whenever he may ask for it, and also he can issue his warrant of distress for summary collection.

The decision, however, of the U.S. Supreme Court, does not necessarily determine the liability of the other delinquent companies, as their charters differ in some respects from that of the Maine Central. The charter of the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Railroad Company contains a provision in sec. 16, that "no other tax, than herein provided, shall ever be levied or assessed on said corporation, or any of their privileges or franchises." In sec. 18, is the stipulation that "this charter shall not be revoked, annulled, altered, limited or restrained, without the consent of the corporation, except by due process of law." The ground of the decision in the Maine Central case was, that by the consolidation of the various companies composing it, a new corporation was formed, and the original exemption from taxation, if any, possessed by the constituent companies, was surrendered.

The decision of the U. S. Supreme Court not being known prior to the April term of the Court in Cumberland county, where the suit against the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Company is pending, I thought it best not to press the case until that decision could be known. That case, therefore, is still pending, and will naturally be brought to a hearing the coming year.

The charter of the Dexter and Newport Railroad Company, in section 15, contains an exemption from taxation similar to that in the 16th section of the charter of the Atlantic and St.

Lawrence Company. In section 17, it is stipulated that the Legislature shall "not impose any other, or further duties, liabilities or obligations." A case was made up through the kind courtesy of Hon. Josiah Crosby, counsel for the company, and argued before the Law Court at Bangor in June last, by Mr. Crosby, very ably for the company, and by myself for the State. In addition to the statutes above cited, the company invoked chapter 395 of the Special Laws of 1867. In behalf of the State, I cited section 17 of chapter 46 of the Revised Statutes.

No decision has yet been rendered by the Court.

The Waterville Savings Bank declined to pay its State tax for the year 1876, on the ground that it was not doing business during the time for which it was assessed. It also claimed that the new Savings Bank Law of 1877, repealed the law under which the tax was claimed. Suit was brought against the bank under chapter 115 of the laws of 1876. The case was made up by County Attorney Webb of Kennebec, and the officers of the bank, and was argued at Portland in July before the Law Court, by Hon. J. H. Drummond for the bank, and by myself for the State. Judgment has just been rendered in favor of the State.

MURDER TRIALS.

Since the abolition of capital punishment, all crimes here-tofore included in the capital class, have been reduced to the grade of felony. Hence, strictly, the Attorney General has not been obliged to attend murder trials, as murder is technically a felony, and the statute requirement is only for capital cases. During my incumbency of this office, however, I have usually attended murder trials, and indeed in every instance where the testimony was circumstantial only.

During the present year there have been in this State three trials for murder, besides several for manslaughter. The first was at Portland, where Charles E. Prescott was tried in September, in the Superior Court, before Judge Symonds, for the murder of . The fact of the killing

was admitted, and the question was as to the degree of the homicide or its justifiableness. Charles F. Libby, Esq., County Attorney of Cumberland county, conducted the prosecution alone, having kindly consented to do so, and cared for the interests of the State with his usual good discretion and efficiency. Prescott was convicted of murder in the first degree. Prisoner's counsel filed motion for new trial, which is still pending.

I regret that Mr. Libby has found it necessary to resign his office. The county of Cumberland and the State have lost a most vigilant, efficient and faithful officer. Mr. Libby's career and record as a prosecuting officer is one of which the State may be proud.

Jason Scribner, in Kennebec county, in a drunken fury, killed two of his own children, and for this atrocious crime was brought to trial at the October term of the Supreme Judicial Court, in Augusta, before Judge Libby. The defence set up was insanity, and that was the only issue. Hon. E. F. Webb, County Attorney of Kennebec county, kindly assumed charge of the prosecution, and presented the State's case with fairness, clearness and ability. The defence of insanity was not made out, and the jury found Scribner guilty of murder in the first degree. Mr. Webb is entitled to much credit for his skillful management of the difficult problem of insanity.

A motion in arrest of judgment was filed by the prisoner's counsel, and is still pending.

Last February the people of Tennant's Harbor, in St. George, were horrified to learn that Mrs. Sarah Meservey had been murdered by strangulation, and that the body had been lying for five weeks in her house in their midst undiscovered. The whole affair was involved in much mystery, and for sometime even suspicion was at fault. Circumstances however came to light that pointed strongly to Nathan F. Hart, a neighbor of the murdered woman, and he was at length arrested, indicted and brought to trial before Chief Justice Appleton, at September term, in Rockland.

L. M. Staples, Esq., County Attorney of Knox county, and myself, conducted the prosecution, while the prisoner was defended by J. H. Montgomery and R. F. Dunton, Esqs. Mr. Staples had prepared the State's case in an excellent manner. The verdict was guilty of murder in the first degree, and the prisoner was sentenced at the same term, and is now in the State Prison.

This case has attracted much attention by reason of communications in the newspapers since the trial by an expert in hand writing, called by the defence, and also by the review of the trial by Boston reporters. While not assuming infallibility, I can assure the public that the evidence at the trial was ample, pointed and convincing. Upon that testimony there could be no reasonable doubt of the guilt of the prisoner. The verdict met with general approval from all who heard the evidence. The prosecution was conducted with careful fairness, and even with tenderness and liberality toward the prisoner. The trial was adjourned from March to September, in the hope that new evidence might be discovered to establish the innocence of the prisoner.

Last February the whole State was shocked to learn that Mr. Barron, the Treasurer of the Dexter Savings Bank, was murdered with such attending circumstances as showed that he lost his life in defence of the interests intrusted to his care. It was evident that he had been tortured and killed for refusing to reveal the combination of the safe lock. In the investigation which followed, it became evident to the authorities that the murderers were professional bank robbers, and that the ordinary appliances would not discover them. pert professional detective was detailed under chapter 167 of the laws of 1877, and the investigation has been carried on by him and by the authorities generally. Valuable results have been obtained which cannot be made public, but which I can communicate to my successor. A large expenditure has been necessarily and properly incurred, and an appropriation will be needed from the Legislature for that account. The State of Maine should spare no expense, and its officers

no efforts to detect and punish the fiends who so deliberately destroyed one of its best citizens. The protection of society demands the punishment of this crime at any cost. I believe the murderers will yet be brought to justice.

In contemplating three murder trials in one year, and a fourth terrible murder yet waiting for vindication, the people will naturally consider whether the present penalty of imprisonment for life is adequate. Capital punishment has now been three years abolished in this State, and undoubtedly many desire its restoration. The accumulation of horrors in this one year will tend to create a demand for the death penalty. The natural sentiment is that the perpetrators of such awful crimes ought to be hung. It is difficult to resist this desire for vengeance, but it must be laid aside in considering the amount of punishment. Equally the opposite sentiment that society has no right to take life in self defence must be laid aside. The question simply is, whether the death penalty is best for society—whether it furnishes better protection.

It is an axiom that the certainty of punishment, rather than its severity, is what deters from the commission of crimes. I believe it is the nearly unanimous opinion of judges and prosecuting officers, that convictions are more certain where there is no death penalty—that the presence of the death penalty always increases the chances of acquittal. This reason alone should be sufficient for the abolition of the death penalty, unless there be over-powering arguments in favor of such a penalty.

On the other hand, there is a modicum of infirmity in all human tribunals, and cases of erroneous convictions and executions are recorded in the books. I believe they happen with extreme rarity, but that they do happen is well authenticated, and it is dreadful to contemplate the possibility of an innocent man being hung by the very State that was bound to protect him in his life and liberty. The State should not put it out of its power to repair a possible wrong.

For these reasons, I think there is no occasion for the

restoration of the death penalty, unless it be a matter of clear proof that its abolition tends to increase crime. I regard statistics gathered from a limited field, as of little value, and proving but little. So many other circumstances affect the result that but little light is obtained by comparison of different years.

During the three years since the abolition of the death penalty, there have been five convictions in cases heretofore capital—viz., Smith, Day, Prescott, Scribner and Hart, and one other case, that of Barron—making six in all.

During the three years, 1873, 4 and 5, just prior to the abolition, there were four such convictions—Wagner, Gordon, Lowell and Benner; and also the cases of Lucy Ann Mank and Charles F. Robbins. In 1867, under the death penalty, there were six capital trials, and three convictions and death sentences—Keenan, Jones and Harris. Thus, it will be seen, that nothing satisfactory can be argued either way from statistics, unless a long range of years and a wide field of action can be taken into the account.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Legislature, last winter, constituted a commission composed of Justices Peters, Virgin and Libbey, to examine and report upon the claims of some nineteen towns for reimbursements of money alleged to have been wrongfully demanded of them by the Governor and Adjutant General for payment of bounties in 1864. These claims have been before the Legislature for many years, and the design was to have a thorough investigation and final report. At the request of the Governor and Council, Hon. John P. Swasey and myself, met the commissioners, and assisted in the investigation, and submitted what seemed to us perfect reasons why nothing should be paid the towns, they having done no more than the large majority of towns had. I am not aware of any decision yet by the Commissioners.

I have prepared and sent to the proper Courts, seweral informations against parties holding lands of the State for breach of conditions of the holdings. The County Attorneys of the counties in which they are filed will call the attention of my successor to them.

There is pending in the Supreme Court of the United States, a writ of error to reverse the judgment of the State Court, in favor of the State against the Portland and Oxford Canal. I am informed that the object of the original prosecution is substantially accomplished. Be that as it may, the cause cannot be reached for some time on the docket of the U. S. Court.

Business in the Counties.

I append tables giving statistics of the State's matters in the Courts in the various counties, as collated from the reports of the County Attorneys. I also append a table collated from the reports of the County Treasurers.

I have attended the terms of the Law Courts, and append a table showing the business in those Courts. I have received very efficient help from the County Attorneys, in the presentation of their cases to the Law Courts. They have manifested a strong interest to see the cases through to the end. I am glad to commend them for, and to congratulate the State upon their zeal and efficiency.

SUGGESTIONS.

Suggestions having for their object the increasing the efficiency of administration, are apt to be ignored, especially if they involve additional expense. Suggestions of greater economy ought to have a cordial reception.

Aware that my suggestions last year as to the use of the coroner's inquest in the administration of the criminal law did not meet the approval of the Governor, I have re-examined the question. Another year of observations and experience has only confirmed me in my belief, that in these days the "crowner's quest" has become antiquated, and its cumber-

someness and expense over-balance the merit of antiquity. Authority given to the County Attorney, or Sheriff, or Coroner, to compel depositions in cases of death, &c., would accomplish the desired end, the detection and punishment of the guilty, with more celerity, certainty and economy.

Since my last report I have received many letters from the prosecuting officers of several States, and of the British Canadian Provinces, expressing concurrence in my views then expressed.

The expense of "expert testimony," and the degree of partisanship it sometimes assumes in criminal trials, are evils demanding attention. I spoke very strongly of this in my last report, citing the Smith case. Since then the Hart case has occasioned me to feel still more strongly convinced. In that case were five experts on handwriting, two on one side and three on the other, and all paid out of the County Treasury. Considerable feeling was engendered, and one of them on the stand openly spoke of "we" and "our side."

To my mind, the expense would be materially lessened, for the Court to appoint an expert upon application and after hearing. Either side might apply, and of course the Court would endeavor to select an expert unobjectionable, and at any rate one of high character and repute. The expert could make his examination entirely unbiassed, without temptation or motive for one opinion more than another. The expert of course should be present at the trial, and submit to cross-examination. The Court might upon cause shown appoint more than one. All this, however, is matter of detail. Something ought to be done to check this growing evil. Of course I have reference only to trials where the State has to pay.

By referring to Table G, it will be seen that the large sum of \$57,482.60 has been paid for support of prisoners in the county jails, without counting Aroostook and Piscataquis. From the reports of the County Attorneys only 109 sentences to county jails have been imposed during the year. When it is considered that the \$57,482.60 does not include fuel, lights, repairs and interest, it would seem that imprisonment in

county jails is an excessively expensive mode of punishment. I don't think Courts or officers regard it as a very efficacious mode, or one particularly reformatory. Young or new offenders are made worse by the forced association with hardened criminals inside of the jails, and the old offenders do not care for a short term in jail, where they are sheltered and enjoy leisure and companionship. These observations do not apply to State Prison, nor to jails where the prisoners are kept constantly at work, and not allowed intercourse with one another.

If some cheap, efficacious punishment, could be devised for petit larceny, assaults, intoxication, and such minor offences, in the place of the monotonous two, six or ten months in the county jail, a great step would be taken toward economy and efficiency.

If some punishment could be devised that could be promptly inflicted—that would not injure the health, as confinement often does—that would not keep the man or boy from his labor or school—and yet would impress upon him a lively sense of the power and vigor of the law, it would be a great improvement on the present system. Courts and officers agree that lazy confinement in the common jail is not effective as punishment and worse than nothing for reformation. Here is a problem worthy the attention of the Legislature.

County Attorney Hutchings of Penobscot, urges legislation simplifying indictments for embezzlement. Great difficulty is experienced in framing the indictment to exactly correspond with the circumstances. Especially is this the case, where the embezzlement has been continuous, as by a clerk or book-keeper. He proposes that the indictment shall simply allege the embezzlement of a gross sum between two given dates, and the State be allowed to prove any instance between the dates. The Court could order a specification which would amply protect the accused.

Mr. Hutchings also calls my attention to the circumstance that the State's docket in the Supreme Court is lumbered up with hundreds of petty appealed cases from police courts and trial justices, where no papers are ever entered, and the party suffers default. The county bears the expense of these appeals and very rarely gets it back from the respondents. Mr. Hutchings urges that the appellant should be required to pay the magistrate the fees for the necessary papers and entry in the Supreme Court, which fees the magistrate should account for to the clerk. Such legislation would check the indiscriminate appeals taken in the liquor cases.

Mr. Hutchings recommendations are entitled to great weight, as he is an officer of much experience, ability and conscientiousness. I would add my approval of them.

It is the confident claim of various parties that since the conviction of Nathan F. Hart for murder new evidence has been discovered tending to establish his innocence. If there be such evidence, there should be some way that it could be brought before the courts. I think there should be a general law, allowing persons after conviction and sentence, to apply to the courts for a new trial, in the nature of a review; and authorizing the Court to grant such review, where it is satisfied that justice may be better done thereby. It is better that such cases should go to the Courts than to the Governor and Council.

I am glad to be able to say that no occasion has arisen for any applications for injunctions against any corporations, nor for proceedings in the nature of *quo warranto*. The various corporations have kept within their chartered limits.

The other work of this office in advising on matters of law connected with the administration of the State Government, will appear in the various departments.

In now retiring from this office after an incumbency of three years, I wish to express my thanks for the kind consideration shown me by the Governor and Council, by the Judges of the Court, and by the officers and people of the State.
