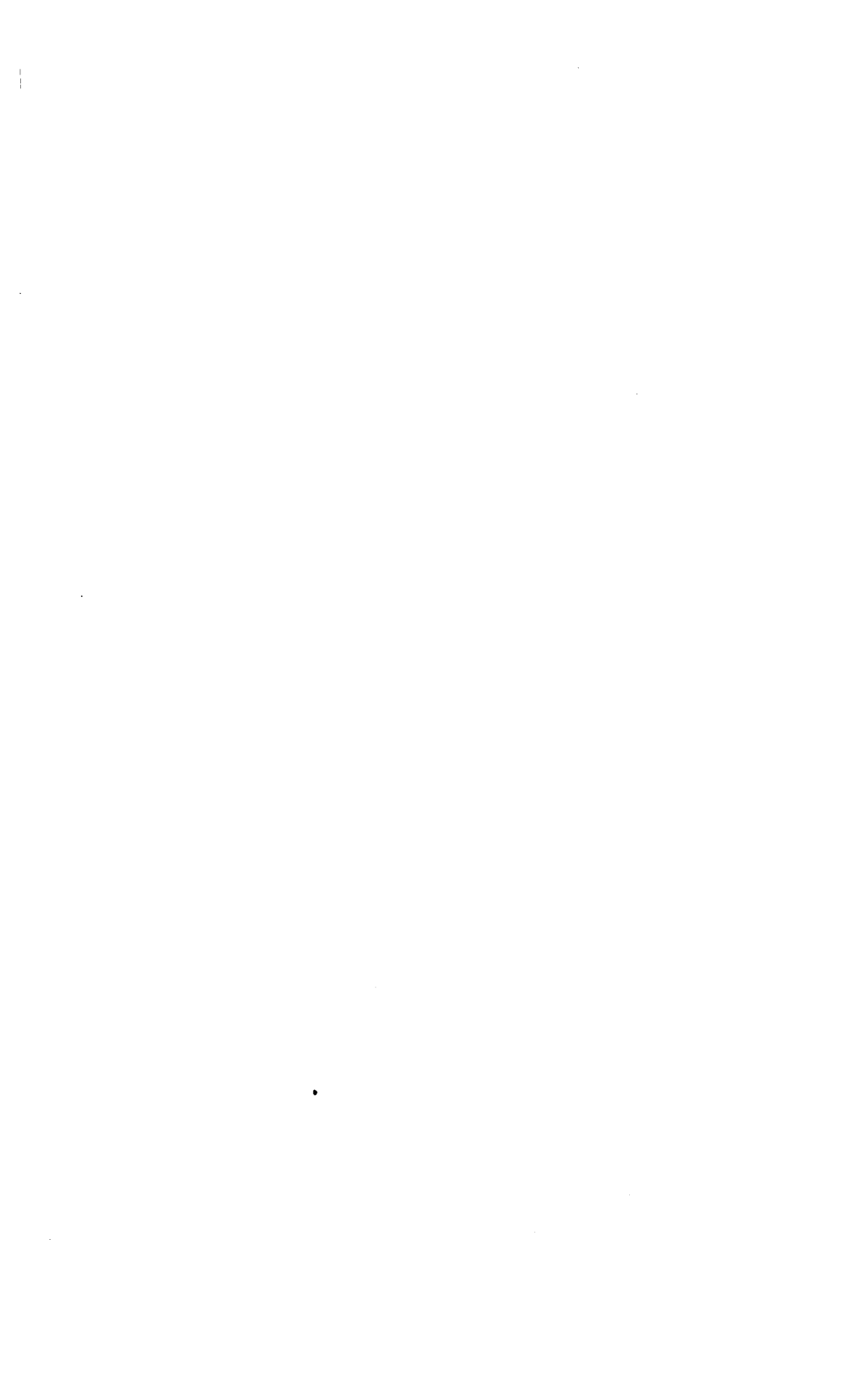

To the Governor and Council:

I submit for consideration my report of the business of this office for the preceding year.

At the date of the submission of my report for the year 1880, the suit against the Maine Central Railroad Company to recover the tax assessed against the corporation, under the provisions of chapter 249, public laws of 1880, was pending.

It has since been submitted to the Law Court, upon questions of law arising in the case involving the constitutionality of the statute by virtue of which the tax was assessed. The regularity of the proceedings of all State officers in the assessment of the tax was fully admitted. The case was argued by Messrs. Drummond & Drummond for the Railroad Company, and by the Attorney General for the State. No decision has yet been rendered.

The suits against the Boston and Maine Railroad, and the Portland, Saco and Portsmouth Railroad Company, for the recovery of the taxes assessed against them by virtue of the same statute, are now pending, and should the decision of the Court in the Maine Central case sustain the constitutionality of the act in question, will be promptly settled without further litigation. The statute under which the foregoing taxes were assessed has been repealed and all State taxes against railroad corporations are now levied under the provisions of chapter 91, public laws of 1881.

The Western Union Telegraph Company continues to resist the payment of taxes assessed in behalf of the State against the corporation, and a suit is now pending before the Court to determine

the constitutionality of the statute under which the assessment was made. Messrs. Baker & Baker appear for the Telegraph Company.

There is pending before the Supreme Court of the United States a writ of error to reverse the judgment in favor of the State, rendered by the State Court, against the Cumberland and Oxford Canal Corporation. At the next session of the Court in Washington the case will be disposed of.

MURDER TRIALS.

The murder of Eliza A. Farr by her husband John G. Farr, was most brutal and cowardly. The trial of the respondent took place before Judge Bonney of the Superior Court for Cumberland county, in January last, occupying several days. John G. Farr had lived apart from his wife nearly a year previous to the date of the tragedy, and on the evening of September 18th, 1880, he entered her boarding house, situated on Free street in the city of Portland, stealthily sought her room, and she, under the influence of fear, attempted to make her escape. Farr drew from his pocket a revolver, pursued her down two flights of stairs, discharging in his pursuit four successive shots at his victim, one entering the head at the inner angle of the eye, lodging in the brain, another striking the right cheek and penetrating the *base* of the brain. The wounds were necessarily fatal and death ensued immediately. It was claimed at the trial, in defence, that there were very many extenuating circumstances connected with the commission of the crime, that the shooting was done during a sudden passion, excited by immediate provocation which for the moment overcame the reason of respondent and that he could not be held for murder. The government claimed that respondent was in full possession of his mental faculties, the shooting deliberate, and that no extenuating circumstances had been shown sufficient to reduce the grade of the offence. The jury found the prisoner guilty of *murder in the first degree* and sentence was immediately imposed, no exceptions having been taken to the rulings of Judge Bonney during the trial. In the preparation of the case and during the trial I was assisted by W. Coombs, Esq., the efficient prosecuting officer for Cumberland county. Farr was defended by Elliot King and H. G. Sleeper, Esqs.

At the January term of the Supreme Judicial Court in the County of Washington, Warren H. Langmore of Pembroke, of the age of ten years, was indicted for the murder of Freeman W. Wright, a

lad of about the same age. It appeared that young Wright was found in a dying condition on the premises of respondent's father, with young Langmore standing over him with a spade in his hand, and several gun shot wounds were found on the face of deceased. Upon the preliminary examination it was thought that death was the result of an accident, but upon a thorough investigation it was found that in addition to the wounds upon the face, two fractures of the skull had been produced by the use of some sharp instrument, either of which was found sufficient to have produced death. Stains of blood were found upon the spade. There had been some difficulty between the boys the day previous at school, and certain threats had been made by young Langmore against Wright. There was evidence tending to show an attempt on the part of Langmore to conceal the body of Wright, and the stains of fresh blood found upon the spade were unaccounted for by respondent. It was argued in behalf of Langmore that the gunshot wounds were the result of an accident, and that the tender years of the respondent would render him irresponsible for any crime.

The government claimed that the respondent alone had a motive for the commission of the crime, that there was a purpose on his part to take the life of Wright, and that his attempt to conceal the body was most conclusive evidence of his knowledge of the nature of the offence committed and he should be held responsible. The jury returned a verdict of *manslaughter*. Judge Libby presided at the trial and the prosecution was carefully and efficiently conducted by County Attorney Charles B. Rounds, the Attorney General being engaged in Cumberland county in the prosecution of Farr. The prisoner was defended by A. McNichol and E. K. Smart, Esqs.

The murder of Mrs. Merrill by her son Charles Merrill, occurred in February last, near Weeks Mills in China, Kennebec county. After the commission of the offence the accused attempted to obliterate all traces of the crime by the mutilation and destruction of the body. After several days had elapsed Merrill was arrested and made a full and free confession of the crime. He exhibited no feelings of sorrow or regret. An indictment was found at the April term of the Superior Court in Kennebec county, and the prisoner, upon his arraignment, notwithstanding the previous confession, voluntarily made, desired a trial which was granted. The jury found him guilty of murder in the first degree and he was forthwith sentenced to imprisonment for life by Judge Whitehouse, who presided at the

trial. The prosecution was assumed by H. M. Heath, Esq., County Attorney of Kennebec, and Loring Farr, Esq., appeared for respondent.

On the twelfth day of July last, Willie Cain, a boy twelve years of age, left his home in Rockport village at one o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of going to a neighbor's to play. He did not reach this neighbor's house; but later in the afternoon was seen going to Lilly Pond, which is situate about a third of a mile from the village, in company with Edward F. Grose, aged eleven years, and Ralph B. Richards aged fifteen. Later in the afternoon these two boys were seen coming from the pond alone. Willie Cain was never again seen alive. Early in the evening alarm was given and diligent search made for him. The Richards and Grose boys on being questioned, at first denied having seen him, but afterward confessed that the Richards boy had taken some money from him against his will and had then pushed him overboard into the pond, (where he was drowned) to conceal the crime, and pointed out to various parties the place. This was as late as eleven o'clock that evening. Thorough search was then made for the body by every means that could be devised, but unsuccessfully until August third, when the body was found lying upon a pile of brush which had lodged in a very shallow stream called Goose River, one mile and a quarter from the pond. His clothing was found on the banks of the stream at a point above the body, leading to the supposition that he might have gone there for the purpose of bathing and been accidentally drowned. In the mean time the Richards and Grose boys had been placed under arrest and were then confined in jail. At the trial it was claimed on behalf of the State, that the boy had been drowned in the pond and his body removed therefrom by the friends of the accused, kept for a time buried about some old lime kiln, of which there were several in the vicinity, and then carried where found; because there was not at any time during the summer sufficient water in the Goose River to float the body; because it had not been at the point where it was found but a few days, as was evident from its condition; because it had been kept in some place not exposed to air, and because lime was found in the hair and in the clothing. A pocket book and knife which were identified as Willie Cain's, and in his possession when he left home, were found in the pond at the point where the boys confessed he was drowned.

It was claimed on behalf of the accused, that they were not at the pond that afternoon, and that their so-called confessions were obtained from them by intimidation and threats. The jury, without hesitation, adopted the theory of the prosecution and brought in a verdict of guilty of manslaughter against Richards but acquitting the younger one on the ground that he was overawed by the larger boy, and, although present, did not actually participate in the crime.

The State's case was most carefully and admirably prepared by J. O. Robinson, Esq., County Attorney, and at his request Hon. Washington Gilbert was appointed to assist in the prosecution, the Attorney General being engaged at Dover, in the prosecution of the Chadbourns. The defence was conducted by L. M. Staples, Esq. Chief Justice Appleton presided at the trial.

On the sixteenth day of September last the family of Charles W. G. Smith was living in the town of Warren. Smith, a man of about thirty years, was then working as day laborer at Rockland, some seven miles away. After he had finished his work for that day, he bought a new revolver, hired a horse and carriage and rode to the home of his family where he arrived in the early evening. There were then in the house, his wife, Delara A., aged eighteen years, their child Charles Albert, aged eighteen months, his wife's mother Deborah V. Robbins, fifty years of age, and Mrs. Mary F. Metcalf. Nothing unusual was observed in his appearance or conduct. After some conversation with his wife of a friendly character, he got into a slight altercation with his wife's mother, Mrs. Robbins, and at once drew his revolver and shot her; then commenced firing at his wife and Mrs. Metcalf, and finally went to the bed in another room and shot his little child, there sleeping, and then made an attempt to set the house on fire. Mrs. Robbins and the little child were killed, his wife very dangerously wounded and Mrs. Metcalf slightly. Smith then returned to Rockland and gave himself up to the officers of the law. The only cause for these murders was a groundless jealousy of his wife, and a cruel, heartless disposition; and the evidence of previous threats shew conclusively that he went to the house fully intending to murder. He was arraigned before Chief Justice Appleton, on an indictment for killing his child, and pleaded guilty. The grade of his offence being shown to be murder in the first degree, he was sentenced for life.

On the morning of June 26th, 1881, Alvin Watson, a respected citizen of Parkman, in the County of Piscataquis, was found mur-

dered. He was a young man about thirty years of age, unmarried and lived alone in the house formerly occupied by his father, about three miles from Parkman Corner. It was evident to the authorities upon an inspection of the circumstances surrounding his death, that he met his fate at the hands of assassins. The condition of the premises indicated that Watson had been aroused from sleep during the night, had met his assailants in the room adjoining his sleeping apartments where the fatal struggle took place. More than fifty knife wounds or stabs were inflicted upon the body of Watson, and thus wounded and bleeding he was dragged from his house and left by the murderers a short distance from the premises. At a distance of a half mile from the home of Watson there lived a family by the name of Chadbourn, consisting of Benjamin, his wife, Wallace Chadbourn, a son of Benjamin, and wife, a deaf and dumb boy Byron, son of Benjamin by a former wife. The first intimation of the murder came from the Chadbourn family, and immediately upon the discovery of the body of Watson there was a persistent and determined effort on the part of Benjamin and Wallace Chadbourn and wives, to convey the impression that Byron, the deaf mute, was guilty of the offense. They volunteered as detectives to discover and point out evidence implicating the dumb boy. They identified a bloody vest found in the house of Watson as the property of Byron. They pointed out a pair of overalls and drawers with blood stains upon them as worn by Byron the evening before. They exhibited a bloody knife belonging to Byron as the instrument used in inflicting the wounds found upon the body of Watson, and in many other ways attempted to divert suspicion from themselves. They were so far successful, that, upon the conclusion of the coroner's inquest, both Benjamin and Wallace were released from the arrest under which they had been placed during the inquest proceedings, and allowed to go at large. The deaf and dumb boy was fully committed to await the action of the grand jury. As time progressed many circumstances connected with the commission of this most brutal crime, came to the knowledge of the government, so strong and convincing, that on the 26th day of July, the respondents Benjamin and Wallace Chadbourn were arrested and committed to the jail at Bangor. An indictment for murder was found at the September term of the Supreme Judicial Court at Dover, a jury was empanelled, the prisoners arraigned and placed at the bar for

trial. Intense public interest was manifested in the case and the trial occupied the attention of the Court for more than two weeks. The prosecution depended entirely upon circumstantial evidence. It was claimed by the Attorney for the State, that the respondents planned and assisted in the execution of the murder and used Byron, the deaf mute, as an unwilling participant, by which they hoped to successfully accomplish their wicked purpose and escape punishment; that it was utterly impossible to believe that that poor, benighted, stricken, timid, dumb boy, who was unaccustomed to deeds of violence, who knew no master except the respondents whom he was accustomed to obey, should have conceived, planned, and gone out alone in the darkness of night to the home of Watson, who was his friend, and executed the deed.

Among other strong circumstances pointing towards the respondents as the guilty parties, it was shown that the deaf mute was on friendly terms with the deceased, that a bitter quarrel existed between Watson and the other members of the Chadbourn family, and that numerous threats had been made by respondents against the life of Watson.

The struggle that evidently took place upon the lounge in the sitting room, the different bloody hand grips upon the various articles of furniture in the room, the bloody foot prints of different sizes and lengths about the house of Watson, proved in a most satisfactory manner that several were engaged in the conflict. Many of the foot prints were of the size and character made by Wallace. The body of Watson exhibited two classes of wounds; one class corresponding with the size of the alleged knife of the mute, the other class with a dirk knife owned by Wallace Chadbourn and found concealed in the Chadbourn house subsequent to the tragedy. Other articles of clothing with blood stains upon them, were subsequently found and identified as belonging to the respondents. A red collar button, worn by Wallace the Sunday previous to the murder, was found near the body of Watson. Spatters of fresh blood were seen on the ear of Benjamin Chadbourn the morning after the murder. The long list of contradictory and improbable statements of the accused subsequent to the murder, in their attempts to exonerate themselves and fasten the crime upon the dumb boy, whose misfortune would afford them protection, had an important bearing upon the case.

The jury, on the night of October third, returned a verdict against both Benjamin and Wallace Chadbourn, finding them guilty of *murder in the first degree*.

In the trial of the case the government labored under many serious disadvantages; while it was conceded that Byron Chadbourn was present and probably may have aided in the commission of the crime, the government was unable through its interpreters to communicate with him to an extent sufficient to render him a competent witness in the case.

The testimony of Professor Carmichael of Bowdoin College, as to the properties of blood, the recognition of blood stains upon the clothing of the Chadbourns, the details of the microscopic, spectroscopic and chemical tests made by him, furnished evidence of an important character to the cause of the government. [Blood corpuscles from the veins of the witness were exhibited to the jury by means of a powerful microscope.] I cannot refrain from expressing my appreciation of the valuable services rendered me by County Attorney J. B. Peaks, in the prosecution. From the moment the crime was discovered, on the twenty-sixth of June, Col. Peaks was unremitting in his efforts to discover the guilty perpetrators, and deserves much credit for the vigilance and care shown in behalf of the government and the thorough preparation of the case of the State.

The prisoners were most ably defended by Hon. Josiah Crosby of the Penobscot bar, and Hon. A. M. Robinson of Dover. Judge Symonds presided at the trial, and in his charge to the jury defined in a clear, impartial, dignified and learned manner, the principles of law applicable to the case.

An indictment was also found against Byron Chadbourn. He is deaf and dumb and has been from infancy; can neither read or write, or use the manual alphabet. He has been accustomed to use certain signs in his daily intercourse with the family, could understand when told to go to the spring for water or to call his father or brother. He could, by certain signs, be made to understand by his family that he had permission to go to the neighbors or that a friend was coming to see him, but when there was any attempt to communicate to him anything that had not been shown him or with which he had not become familiar by his daily associations, all efforts failed. So far as the government was able to determine from investigations made, he had no knowledge

of the existence of a Supreme Being, of the nature or obligations of a judicial oath, or the enormity of the offence charged against him. While in some cases occurring in other countries, the plea has been most successfully advanced that an uneducated deaf mute was not morally or legally responsible, in our own country it has been held, that where they evince an intelligence and ability to distinguish between right and wrong, they are responsible to the law, criminally, and can be put upon trial. Professor Williams of the Hartford Deaf and Dumb Asylum was in attendance at the request of the government, and it was found, upon the most careful and minute investigation, that there was no certain mode of communicating to the prisoner the nature of the charge in the indictment or the details of a trial. Under the provisions of the statutes of the State the respondent was committed to the custody of the Superintendent of the Insane Asylum, to be detained and observed by him, until the further order of the Court. The circumstances attending this case will readily suggest to the Legislative Department of the government the propriety of providing the means and opportunities whereby this unfortunate boy, now under indictment for murder, shall receive the benefits of instruction, that he may be enabled not only to communicate in an intelligent manner a complete history of the part performed by each of the assassins in the commission of the crime, but to conduct his defence in such a manner, when he shall be brought to trial, as shall accord to him all the consideration that is his due. Apparently he is docile and harmless, showing no disposition or desire to inflict injury; and I believe the evidence upon the trial of the father and brother clearly indicated that he was an unwilling participant in the crime, directed and moved by the will and power of others who exercised control over him; and the Legislature will not hesitate in according to the poor unfortunate boy, advantages, even during his incarceration, sufficient to enable him, through an interpreter, to communicate his knowledge of the transaction before a court of justice.

An indictment was found at the September term of the Supreme Judicial Court in the County of York against Sarah F. Whitten for the murder of her infant child, which is undisposed of.

During the present year four citizens of the State, upon trial, have been convicted of murder in the *first degree*. Two verdicts of manslaughter have been rendered, and two additional indictments

for murder have been found and sentence imposed in one upon a plea of guilty, the Court adjudging the grade to be murder of the first degree. Two citizens have been sentenced to imprisonment for life for the crime of arson.

It will be observed by referring to the reports of my predecessors, that the convictions for capital offences during the years 1873-4-5, immediately preceding the abolition of the death penalty, numbered but four—Wagner, Gordon, Lowell and Benner; that during the three years 1876-7-8, immediately subsequent to its abolition, there were five convictions in cases formerly capital—Smith, Day, Prescott, Scribner and Hart. The convictions for murder in the first degree during the present year alone exceed the number during the three years previous to the abolition of the death penalty and are nearly equal to the number occurring during the three years following.

The frequency of these horrible crimes and the fiendish brutality exhibited in the commission of a large portion of them, has naturally created a sentiment in the community for the application of the death penalty in cases of such atrocious character. There are arguments for and against its application; arguments that are satisfactory to the minds and consciences of the adherents and opponents. Any amount of discussion of the question, I apprehend, would have but slight effect upon the convictions already formed by the mass of our citizens.

The laws are for the protection of the public, of society, and are not presumed to be in sympathy with the hardened criminal; and if the law-abiding and peaceable citizens of this State, who desire to live with some sense of security, can be better protected from the assassin's knife or the ruffian's bullet by the restoration of the death penalty, it is a matter that should receive the most careful and serious consideration of the Legislature.

BUSINESS IN THE COUNTIES.

The following tables will give the amount and character of the criminal business transacted in the various counties, the disposition of State cases before the Law Court, and amounts paid out for costs of prosecutions, etc.

The unsettled accounts existing between the State and Alonzo Garcelon, by a resolve of the last Legislature, approved March 18, 1881, were referred to the Governor and Council for adjustment.

In accordance with a resolve approved February 24, 1881, I have obtained from the Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the use of the State, a deed of all the right of the Commonwealth to the settlers' lots, so called, in township numbered seventeen, range seven, in the County of Aroostook.

The official business of this office, in connection with the various officials of the State government, will appear upon the files of the different departments.
