REPORT.

LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1881.

To the Governor and Council of Maine:

In compliance with the provisions of law the undersigned, Land Agent, has the honor to make the annual report of the operations of the Land Department for the year ending November 30, 1881.

SALES OF LAND.

Sales of land, except to settlers under the act "regulating the sales of land for settlement," are now made under the direction of the Governor and Council, and are limited to small quantities, often requiring careful investigation to ascertain what the interest of the State is, if any. Large as well as small tracts of land have heretofore been conveyed by both Maine and Massachusetts by *conditional* deeds. In a few instances the grantees were careful to get a release deed, after complying with the conditions named in their deed, so that they had record evidence that was conclusive that their title was complete. But in a majority of cases no such precaution was taken, and it is somewhat difficult to ascertain with any degree of certainty in all cases whether the conditions of their deeds have been complied with.

It is respectfully suggested, whether there should not be some record in the County Registries of Deeds in the several counties where these lands lie, showing that these conditions have been complied with and the titles perfected. Schedule A exhibits the amount of land conveyed to settlers, upon the surrender of their certificates and proof that the conditions named therein had been fully complied with.

Schedule B exhibits the amount of land conveyed to Swedish immigrants under acts of the Legislature approved March, 1870; February, 1871; February, 1872; and January, 1873. There are still thirty-seven of these certificates outstanding. Since 1873, all Swedish settlers that have taken up land for settlement have done so upon the same terms as other settlers under the settling act.

Schedule C exhibits the conveyances made under Resolves of the Legislature. These were cases where it appeared to the members of the Legislature that the grantee had equitable rights that the law did not allow the Land Agent to adjudicate upon.

Schedule D shows the amount of land conveyed for cash. These sales are made by order of the Governor and Council. It will be noticed that three of these are to Swedes. They preferred to pay the thirty-five cents per acre in cash instead of in work on the roads as contemplated by the settling act; and as they had taken up their lots and made improvements on them with the evident design of becoming permanent settlers, it was thought advisable to sell them their lots for cash.

Schedule E exhibits the number of Islands sold during the past year. There are numerous applications now on file in the Land Office for islands and ledges on our coast, and as the Land Agent has no personal knowledge of the value of them, and their value does not appear to warrant the expense of a personal inspection, no action has been taken upon them. Our sea-coast (lined with almost numberless islands) has become a fashionable "summer resort" for large numbers of the inhabitants of the crowded cities on the Atlantic coast, and the inviting, cool summer breezes are drawing a large population on to these islands during the heated summer season. This "summer travel" is not likely to decrease but appears to be increasing every year. Small and barren islands, hitherto of no value, are sought for by these pleasure seekers, and houses have been erected for their accommodation. The title to these small islands has not been considered of any consequence, but when expenditures of money are to be made upon them, it becomes a question of some importance to know who holds the title.

Schedule F exhibits the number of lots conveyed under a resolve approved March 17th, 1835, giving to "Revolutionary Officers and Soldiers and their Widows," two hundred acres of land. The State of Maine set apart four townships for that purpose, viz: Townships number 8, range 3; D, range 1, W. E. L. S.; and Townships number 3 and 4, "Indian Purchase." Certificates were issued to the claimant upon proof of three years' service, and whenever these certificates were surrendered to the Land Office, either by the grantee or his assignee, a deed was delivered. Seventeen of these certificates are still outstanding, as shown by Schedule H.

Schedule G shows the number of settlers' lots put under contract the past year and a "Land Certificate" issued. Nearly all these lots had been previously taken up by other parties and certificates issued, but failing to comply with the terms of the "settling act" they had forfeited their right.

Schedule I exhibits the amount of land now under contract to "actual settlers" in the several townships set apart for settlement. Several of these lots have been paid for, but other settling duties have not been performed. In others there is a controversy about the real owner, while in another class of cases certificates have been assigned and lost or destroyed, rendering it difficult to decide who is equitably entitled to a deed.

LAND AGENT'S REPORT.

Collections.

It will be seen by the tables of receipts and disbursements in the annexed Appendix, that there has been paid into the State Treasury from the Land Office the past year, five thousand three hundred fourteen dollars and twenty-one cents, as follows, viz:

On account of "permanent school fund"	\$4,470	74

The amount paid on account of "permanent school fund" was the avails of certain notes in the Land Office that have been collected the past year. There is but little, if any, more that can be collected on the "permanent school fund" account. There are a few old notes, as shown in the schedule of "bills receivable," published in this report under the head of "school fund," bearing date from 1841 to 1848, the youngest note being a little more than thirty-three years old.

The sums collected on account of "reserved lands," were for stumpage of timber cut on the "reserved lands" in the following plantations, and were paid into the State Treasury and credited to the several plantations for a school fund. Whenever a plantation is organized and raises and expends money for the support of schools in compliance with the law, the State Treasurer is authorized to pay to said plantation annually the interest of the funds in the treasury for the support of schools therein.

The indications are that there will be more collected the ensuing year from this source than during the past year. The care and custody of the "reserved lands" devolves upon the Land Agent until the "incorporation into a town." This is an important part of his duties, as it will be seen, by the State Treasurer's report for the present year, that there is now in the State Treasury about one hundred and fifty-five thousand dollars that has been collected and paid in by the Land Office since the passage of the law authorizing the sale of timber and grass on the "reserved lands." The interest on the funds accruing from the sale of the timber and grass is a great help to these plantations when they first establish their schools and need assistance more than at any subsequent time.

MASSACHUSETTS DEEDS.

An appropriation was made by the last Legislature to paythe expense of recording the deeds of lands in Maine given by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts-copies of which were obtained by the Hon. P. P. Burleigh while he was Land Agent, and placed on file in the Land Office. Thesedeeds, together with the deeds given by the State of Maine, (which are recorded in this office) cover all the sales of land^{*} in this State since 1784. The copies above referred toappear to have been made at the time the original deeds. were given and placed on file in the Land Office in Massa-It has been ascertained by examination of the chusetts. records in the State House in Massachusetts, that some fifty copies of those deeds are missing. It is respectfully suggested that it may be good policy to have the list complete, as the deficiency is small and could be supplied without a The "records of deeds" in this office would great expense. then show all sales of land made by Maine and Massachusetts. since the Revolutionary War.

LAND AGENT'S REPORT.

WALLAGRASS.

The Legislature of 1881 passed a resolve approved March 18th, 1881, entitled a "Resolve in regard to settlers' lots in township number seventeen, range seven, now Wallagrass plantation," directing the Land Agent "to investigate who are the present and lawful claimants of the settlers' lots in said plantation, and when so ascertained, he shall deed said claimants the whole or parts of lots, as the case may be. *Provided*, *however*, that this resolve shall not be so construed as to instruct or direct the Land Agent to deed any lands heretofore conveyed by the State."

The facts are believed to be as follows:

September 1st, 1853, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts conveyed to Cyrus S. Clark and William H. McCrillis, by conditional deed, several townships and parts of townships of land lying in the State of Maine. Township number seventeen, in the seventh range, (Wallagrass) was then held by Maine and Massachusetts in common and undivided. In the deed above named, Massachusetts conveyed to Clark and McCrillis, "all the right, title and interest which said Commonwealth had on the first day of August, in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-two, in and to township numbered seventeen of the seventh range, west from the east line of said State of Maine, and also all the timber, logs and lumber cut on said township since said first day of August, and all claims of said Commonwealth therefor, and all claims against trespassers after said date." The condition named in said deed was, that "said Clark and McCrillis, their heirs and assigns, shall well and truly pay, satisfy and discharge, according to the tenor thereof, the six several promissory notes given by them," which, with another note mentioned in said deed, amounted to some two hundred and twenty thousand dollars, and were payable in the years 1854, 1855, 1856, 1857, 1858 and 1859. There was a reservation named in said deed as follows: "Reserving also the lots to settlers on the several townships and tracts above described which have heretofore been conveyed, contracted or bonded to settlers by said Commonwealth, or awarded to them by the report of the Commissioners under the treaty of Washington, dated Dec. 25th, A. D. 1844."

October 5th. 1853, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts conveyed to the State of Maine, by deed of that date, all the interest said Commonwealth had in lands in Maine, except some reservations therein named. One reservation named in said last named deed was "said Commonwealth's interest in township numbered seventeen in the seventh range, west from said east line," (of the State). Messrs. Clark and Mc-Crillis conveyed their interest in these lands to third parties before their notes were paid. In 1859, about the time the last note was due, a petition was presented to the Legislature of Massachusetts praying for an abatement on these notes, and the Legislature passed a resolve authorizing the appointment of a committee "to inquire into and consider the grounds of abatement praved for by the petition of Cyrus S. Clark and William H. McCrillis, also to confer with all parties interested in said tracts, for the purpose of obtaining if practicable an early settlement of said notes, in whole or in part, either by present payment or by new and reliable securities, and to make report thereof to the Governor and Council; and said committee shall have power and authority, with the approval of the Governor and Council, to adjust, compromise and finally settle said notes, and the Land Agent is hereby authorized, under the direction of the Governor and Council, to execute and deliver such deeds and instruments as may be required to carry such settlement into effect." The aforenamed committee, with the approval of the Governor and Council, did make a settlement with the grantees of Clark and McCrillis, and accepted the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars in full for the balance due on the notes named in the conditional deed of Sept. 1, 1853. In accordance with the power and authority vested in them by the said resolve, the Land Agent and Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts gave the said grantees a release deed "of the promissory notes and claims now held by said Commonwealth," and "of all the right, title, interest, estate and claims which said Commonwealth now has, or is, or may be entitled to have or demand in or to all or any of the lands, timber, grass and other property, granted or described in the deed and contract of said Commonwealth to and with the said Clark and McCrillis, dated March 12, 1853, and in the deed of said Commonwealth to said Clark and McCrillis, dated Sept. 1, 1853. Meaning and intending hereby to assign and convey all the indebtedness of said Clark and McCrillis to said Commonwealth as aforesaid, and all lands, timber, liens, rights of entry, forfeitures, property and securities held therefor, as well under and by virtue of said deeds and contracts as otherwise."

This deed is signed by the State Treasurer and Land Agent, and by them duly acknowledged, approved by the Council and signed by the Governor, and approved by the Attorney General as correct in form, and, taken in connection with the resolve hereinbefore mentioned, would appear to be entitled to some consideration.

February 25, 1881, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts by their Treasurer, duly authorized by a resolve of the General Court, approved April 23, 1880, conveyed to the Treasurer of the State of Maine "all the right, title and interest of the said Commonwealth of Massachusetts in and to the settlers' lots, so called, situated in Township number seventeen, in range seven, in the County of Aroostook, in the State of Maine." The Legislature of Maine in 1881 passed the resolve first mentioned. The situation in brief appears to be as follows: Massachusetts sold their interest in Township number seventeen, range seven, to Messrs. Clark and McCrillis, Sept. 1, 1853, and gave a deed conditioned that certain notes should be paid. In the deed, Massachusetts to Maine, Oct. 5, 1853, Massachusetts reserved their interest in number seventeen, range seven. Dec. 20, 1860, Massachusetts gave a release deed of the same to the grantees of Messrs. Clark and McCrillis, as heretofore stated. It is somewhat difficult to see what right, title or interest Massachusetts had to convey to Maine by deed of Feb. 25, 1881.

The proviso in the resolve of March 18, 1881, is as follows: "Provided, however, that this resolve shall *not* be so construed as to instruct or direct the Land Agent to deed any lands heretofore conveyed by the State." It is presumed that the intent of the Legislature was, that no deed should be given of any "land heretofore conveyed by the State" of Maine or Massachusetts.

It will be noticed that in the deed of October 5, 1853, Massachusetts to Maine, the reservation was not "township number seventeen, range seven," but "said Commonwealth's *interest* in township numbered seventeen, in the seventh range " The "Commonwealth's interest" was a claim upon the township until the notes described in the deed were paid or satisfied in some form. The deed of release dated December 26, 1860, duly authorized by resolve of Legislature, would appear to perfect the title in the grantees of Messrs. Clark and McCrillis.

If these settlers are entitled to deeds of the farms they occupy, (which is not the subject now under consideration,) they should have a deed that would give them a title, and not such a deed as would only delude them with the idea that their title was good and probably lead them into expensive litigation that would be ruinous in the end.

It is claimed that these settlers went on to their farms under the direction of a State officer, and have made extensive clearings, erected houses and barns, and have occupied them for more than twenty years,—that many of them have paid for their lands as other settlers have done that have good titles to their lands. If such is the case, it would appear to be dishonorable in the State to give them deeds of their farms that would convey no title. Such a transaction would be in bad faith to our own citizens. After investigating this matter as thoroughly as he has been enabled to, the Land Agent does not feel called upon by the language of that resolve to give deeds in a case that appears to be of so questionable a nature.
