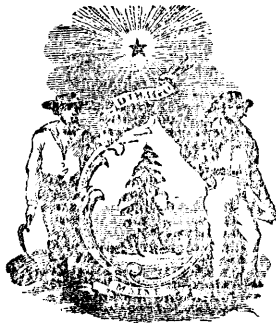

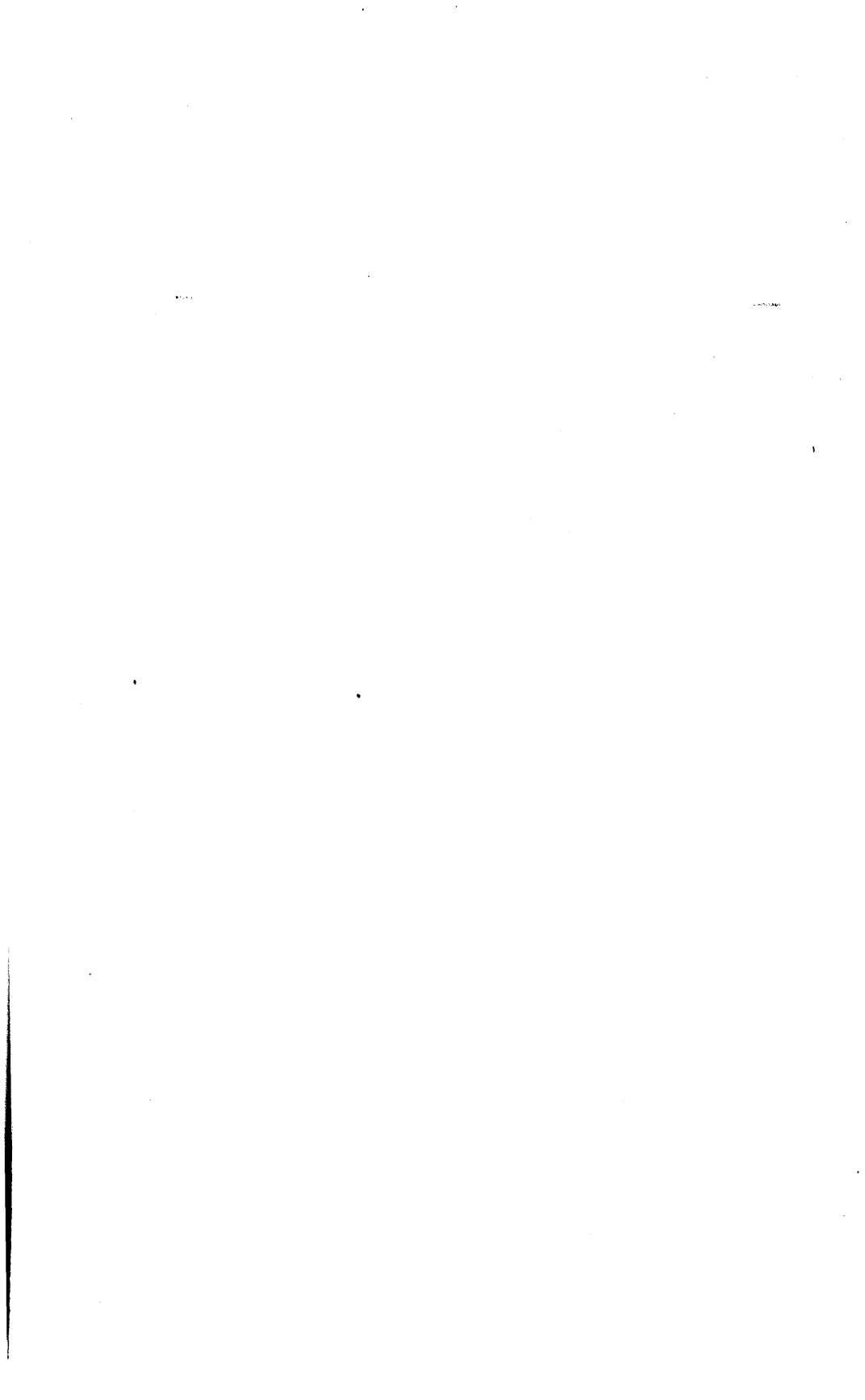

*To the Honorable Governor and Council:*

As required by section seventy of chapter two of the Revised Statutes, I have the honor to herewith transmit a "printed detailed account of the state of the treasury," containing a complete record of receipts and expenditures of all public money during the year ending December 31, 1889, and a statement of the estimated receipts and expenditures for the year 1890.

Also, in this report will be found a detailed statement of the refunding of the public debt, together with the disposal of the sinking fund.

## SINKING FUND.

As the bonded debt of the State matured in 1889, the disposal of the sinking fund, which was established in accordance with Section 5, Chapter 225, Public Laws of 1868 for the purpose of meeting the payment of the bonds falling due October 1, 1889, became a necessity and the legislature of 1889 passed an act to provide for the refunding of the Public Debt, section 7 of which reads as follows :

SEC. 7. The treasurer of state, with the approval of the governor, in writing, is hereby authorized and directed, at such times and in such amounts as they may determine, after public proposals therefor, separate from any sale or exchange of bonds under this act, to sell all of the bonds in the sinking fund, and to apply the proceeds thereof, to the purchase, or payment, of the bonded indebtedness of the state, maturing October first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine; and such proceeds, are hereby appropriated for the purpose of purchasing or paying said bonded indebtedness.

As the law required that public proposals should be received for the purchase of this fund, the following advertisement was inserted in the leading financial papers, under date of July 10, 1889.

Of the bids received in response to this advertisement, that of R. L. Day & Co. of Boston for the Massachusetts and New Hampshire bonds on a two and nine-tenths per cent basis and five dollars bonus, was the most advantageous to the State, and accepted.

The bid of Brewster, Cobb & Estabrook of Boston for the Gov. 4½ per cent bonds at 106 13-16 was accepted, and the Gov. 4 per cent bonds were sold to the Treasurer of the United States at the market price of 128.

The par value of the sinking fund amounted to \$965,296.33 at the close of business December 31, 1888, as shown in my last report, and the interest received between December 31, 1888, and August 1, 1889, on bonds belonging to this fund, amounted to \$30,473.00, making the total par value of the sinking fund on August 1, 1889, (not including accrued interest on the Massachusetts and New Hampshire securities) \$995,769.33.

This sum was made up in detail and disposed of as shown in the following table and the amount realized was deposited in the Suffolk National Bank, Boston, and applied in payment of an equal amount of the bonds before referred to, and which became due October 1, 1889:

BONDED DEBT.

The bonded indebtedness of the State on the first day of January, 1889, as shown in my last report, amounted to \$3,967,400 but the actual debt is \$500 in excess of this sum, the error occurring as follows: In 1873 the State paid from the current funds of the office for three coupon bonds of the loan of October 1, 1869, No. 453 for \$300 and Nos. 713 and 714 for \$100 each, aggregating \$500, which were destroyed at the fire in Boston, November 9, 1872 and a certificate for this amount, to represent the bonds destroyed, was given to the State Treasurer by the Governor and Council, with instructions to place same to the credit of the sinking fund, and this sum was not only added to the sinking fund as a credit, but was also deducted from the total amount of the bonded debt, and the debt has been reported each subsequent year, \$500 less than actually existed.

The entire bonded indebtedness of the State on January 1, 1889 was therefore \$3,967,900, all of which matured during the year and same has been refunded in a manner that should be eminently satisfactory to every tax payer in the State.

For the purpose of renewing and extending the bonded indebtedness of this state, which matures June first and October first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, and of paying the temporary loan authorized by section six of this act, the treasurer of state is hereby authorized to issue new bonds in sums of not less than one thousand dollars each, with coupons attached for the payment of the interest, at the rate of three per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest payable in Boston or at the treasury of Maine; or registered bonds, for the whole or any part thereof, transferable by assignment, in amounts of not less than one thousand dollars each, with interest at the rate of three per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest payable at the treasury of Maine. Of the bonds so issued, fifty thousand dollars shall be payable per annum, for twelve years, beginning with the year eighteen hundred and ninety; seventy thousand dollars per annum, for ten years, beginning with the year nineteen hundred and two; seventy-eight thousand dollars per annum, for ten years, beginning with the year nineteen hundred and twelve; and all additional bonds that may be required for the purposes aforesaid, shall



be payable in eight equal annual payments, beginning with the year nineteen hundred and twenty-two. No bonds shall be issued in excess of the amount required for the purposes aforesaid. Each bond so issued shall be signed by the treasurer, countersigned by the governor, and attested by the secretary of state, with the seal of the state. The treasurer may sign said coupons or his name may be engraved thereon.

SEC. 3. The treasurer of state, with the approval of the governor, in writing, is hereby authorized, subject to the provisions of section five of this act, to exchange all or any of the bonds authorized by section two of this act, for an equal amount of the bonds of the state, maturing as aforesaid, now outstanding, on such terms as in his judgment and in the opinion of the governor shall be advantageous to the state, but at a valuation not less than the highest price received for bonds sold under this act.

SEC. 4. So many of the bonds authorized by this act as may be issued to renew and extend the bonded indebtedness maturing June first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, shall be dated and bear interest from June first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine. All other bonds authorized by this act shall be dated and bear interest from October first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine.

SEC. 5. The treasurer, with the approval of the governor, in writing, shall advertise in such papers as they deem expedient, for proposals for the sale or exchange of the bonds aforesaid, stating in such advertisement, as near as may be, the amount of bonds to be negotiated, the maturity thereof, and the time of delivery, with such provisions as to the form and reception of proposals as they deem expedient. And the treasurer, with the approval of the governor, in writing, may sell or exchange, or deliver, or contract to sell or exchange and deliver, said bonds or any part thereof, to the party or parties who agree to receive the same, or any part thereof, at the highest rate of premium; or, he may reject any or all of such proposals, as they adjudge to be best for the interest of the state. In case all or any of the proposals are rejected, the treasurer, with the approval aforesaid, may re-advertise as often as necessary, subject to the aforesaid conditions, and with the approval aforesaid, sell or exchange, or contract to sell or exchange and deliver, as aforesaid, all or any part of the bonds authorized by this act. For the faithful performance of all contracts made under the provisions of this act, the treasurer shall require a bond or bonds, with sufficient sureties.

SEC. 6. In order to provide for the payment of such of the bonded indebtedness of the state, maturing on the first day of June, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, as shall not have been renewed and extended as aforesaid, the treasurer is hereby authorized to procure for the state, such temporary loan or loans, as may be necessary, and give its notes therefor, payable within five months, with interest, not exceeding four per cent. per annum; and the proceeds of such notes, are hereby appropriated to the payment of said bonded indebtedness maturing June first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine.

SEC. 7. The treasurer of state, with the approval of the governor, in writing, is hereby authorized and directed, at such times and in such amounts as they may determine, after public proposals therefor, separate from any sale or exchange of bonds under this act, to sell all of the bonds in the sinking fund, and to apply the proceeds thereof, to the purchase, or payment, of the bonded indebtedness of the state, maturing October first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine; and such proceeds, are hereby appropriated for the purpose of purchasing or paying said bonded indebtedness.

SEC. 8. The proceeds of all bonds issued under the provisions of this act, are hereby appropriated to the payment of said bonded indebtedness maturing June first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, and October first, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, and to the payment of such notes as may be issued under sections six and ten of this act.

SEC. 9. Upon delivery to the state treasurer of any registered bond, issued under this act, by the original holder or assignee thereof, or upon delivery to the state treasurer of any such coupon bond, at any time, an equivalent registered bond, or bonds, in form as aforesaid, shall be issued to such holder, or assignee, in substitution therefor.

SEC. 10. All bonds paid or purchased, or received by the treasurer for exchange or registration, under the provisions of this act, shall be effectually effaced, canceled and destroyed. And the treasurer shall keep a register of all registered bonds issued under the provisions of this act, showing the serial number, date and amount of each certificate, to whom issued, when payable, and also a like description of the bonds received in lieu thereof.

SEC. 11. In order to provide for the payment of such of the bonded indebtedness of the state maturing on the first day of Octo-

ber, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, as shall not have been renewed and extended as aforesaid, and the temporary loan or loans authorized by section six of this act, the treasurer of state is hereby authorized to procure for the state, such temporary loan or loans as may be necessary, and give the notes of the state therefor, payable on such time, not exceeding one year, and with such rate of interest, not exceeding four per cent. per annum, as may be expedient. The proceeds of the notes authorized by this section are hereby appropriated to the payment of said bonded indebtedness and said temporary loans.

SEC. 12. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 13. This act shall take effect when approved.

All proposals received in answer to this advertisement were for the purchase of the new three per cent bonds authorized by the aforesaid act, and were as follows :

Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank bid for \$250,000 of the June issue at an average rate of  $102\frac{3}{4}$ ; \$400,000 of the October issue at an average rate of 103.

Greenwich Savings Bank bid for \$1,676,000 of the June issue at  $103\frac{1}{2}$ .

Simon Borg & Co. bid for \$1,676,000 of the June issue at 103½ ; \$884,000 of the October issue at 103.

The legislature of 1889 passed the following resolve, which was approved by the Governor March 7, 1889 :

WHEREAS, The State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, has on deposit under section 4 chapter 130 of the Statutes of the United States, approved July 2, 1862, and resolves of the legislature of the State of Maine, approved March 25, 1863, and March 24, 1864, and February 24, 1881, and March 10, 1883, one hundred and eighteen thousand three hundred dollars (\$118,300), in bonds of the State, all of which become due in 1889.

*Resolved*, That the treasurer of the State be authorized and directed to issue a new registered bond in favor of said college for the sum of one hundred and eighteen thousand three hundred dollars (118,300.00), bearing interest at the rate of five per cent., payable semi-annually, to bear date of June 1st, 1889, A. D., and payable in thirty years from said date, the said one hundred and eighteen thousand dollars in bonds of said State, as above set forth, to be cancelled when said new bond for one hundred and eighteen thousand

three hundred dollars is issued, as hereinbefore described, that the treasurer of State is authorized and directed, and said treasurer shall issue to said college a bond for the same, which shall be nonnegotiable, and, as before herein provided, said bond shall be signed by the treasurer and countersigned by the governor and attested by the secretary of State, and the treasurer and his successors in office shall pay to the treasurer of said college the interest on said bond from time to time, in equal semi-annual payments from the date of said bond until the maturity of the same.

Agreeably to the above resolve, special State of Maine nonnegotiable registered bond No. 1001 for \$118,300 00 with interest at five per cent per annum, was issued to said college June 1, 1889, and the old bonds held by the college were cancelled on the same date.

The Maine State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts received under the will of the late Hon. Abner Coburn, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, which amount the said college requested the State to take in trust and the legislature of 1887 passed the following resolve, which was approved by the Governor March 16, 1887.

*Resolved,* That the treasurer of state be authorized and directed to receive from the Maine State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, situated in Orono, in the county of Penobscot, in trust, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, bequeathed to said college by Honorable Abner Coburn; and said treasurer shall apply the same in payment of the debt of the State or Maine, and shall issue to said college an nonnegotiable registered bond for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July in each year, at the treasurer's office. Said bond shall be payable in thirty years from the first day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and shall be signed by the treasurer, countersigned by the governor and attested by the secretary of state; and the state treasurer and his successors in office, shall pay to the treasurer of said college the interest on said bond from the time he receives said sum until the maturity of the bond.

Under this resolve, I issued to the college a special State of Maine nonnegotiable registered bond No. 1000, for \$100,000, with interest at four per cent per annum, and deposited the money received for same, in the Suffolk National Bank, Boston, to be used in payment of an equal amount of the old bonds when they became due.

The Maine Insane Hospital also received under the will of the late Hon. Abner Coburn, a bequest of \$50,000, which sum I was instructed to receive in trust for said hospital by a resolve approved by the governor, March 10, 1887, which reads as follows :

*Resolved*, That the treasurer of the state be authorized and directed to receive from the Maine Insane Hospital the sum of fifty thousand dollars, bequeathed to said hospital by Hon. Abner Coburn ; and said treasurer shall apply the same in payment of the debt of the State of Maine, and said treasurer shall issue to said hospital an unnegotiable registered bond for the sum of fifty thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July in each year, at the treasurer's office ; said bond shall be payable in thirty years from the first day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven ; shall be signed by the treasurer, countersigned by the governor, and attested by the secretary of state ; and the treasurer and his successors in office shall pay to the treasurer of said hospital the interest on said bond until its maturity.

In accordance with above resolve, special State of Maine unnegotiable registered bond for \$50,000, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, was issued to said hospital and the proceeds deposited in Suffolk National Bank, Boston, to meet an equal amount of State of Maine bonds falling due October 1, 1889. The old bonded debt, as shown on page 29,

*To the Honorable Governor and Executive Council:*

The committee appointed by the Governor and Council under the authority of chapter 71, section 2, Revised Statutes, to examine the accounts of the State Treasurer, as embodied in his annual report for the year ending December 31st, 1889, have, in the discharge of their official duties, made a careful examination of the books and papers in the office of the State Treasurer, and find them correctly cast and vouchers on file for every item charged in his account.

The Treasurer's statement and account of receipts and expenditures for said year, as stated in his report, were found to be correct.

The books of the office are properly kept and all vouchers pertaining to the business of the department neatly filed and numbered, in accordance with the excellent system adopted in that department years ago.

The systematic and plain manner in which accounts are kept with the several cities, towns and plantations on the books of the office, greatly aided the committee in their work of investigation.

The former high standard of the management of the treasury department has been fully maintained; and the committee feel that much credit is due the efficient State Treasurer for the skilful and successful manner in which he has managed the financial affairs of the State the past year; and the State is to be congratulated upon its strong financial stand-

ing, as evinced by the sale of its three per cent. bonds in New York markets, at a premium of over three per cent. on their face value. A record so gratifying to every citizen of the State deserves, at our hands, recognition in this report.

The amount of cash on hand at the close of the year 1889, was \$62,678.41; of this sum \$16,559.64 was in currency and checks in the vault in the Treasurer's office, and \$46,118.77 was on deposit in banks within the State and in Suffolk National Bank, Boston. The last named bank allows interest to the State on its deposits, which amounted, during the year, to \$5,308.90.

The bonded indebtedness of the State, on January 1, 1889, as appears by the Treasurer's report, was \$3,967,900.00 all maturing during the year, and the same was paid in the manner provided by the refunding bill of the Legislature, approved March 13, 1889—save \$96,500.00 which had not been presented for payment.

The present bonded debt of the State, as represented in the Treasurer's report, is \$2,748,800.00, in this amount is included \$96,500.00 old issue still outstanding, and which will be paid, when presented, from the current funds in the treasury.

As required by law, the committee destroyed by burning, in the presence of the State Treasurer, all State of Maine bonds redeemed during the year, amounting to the sum of \$3,871,400.00, a record of the same and the number and amount of each bond is on file in the Treasurer's office.

The securities in the sinking fund of 1868, in charge of the State Treasurer, amounting, August 1, 1889, to the sum of \$995,769.33, at their par value, were disposed of in the manner provided by law, and the proceeds of their sale, including the premium received, (viz: \$239,904.71) applied towards the payment of the State debt due October 1, 1889.

The committee, in compliance with law, destroyed by burning, in the presence of the Treasurer, all coupons paid by the State Treasurer, on account of the public debt, during

the year 1889, amounting to the sum of \$101,106.00, as charged on his books, exclusive of \$127,876.50 interest paid on registered bonds, vouchers for which were on file in his office.

The committee also destroyed in like manner, all registered bonds received by the State Treasurer during the year, for re-issue, amounting to \$284,000.00.

The committee find in the hands of the State Treasurer, placed there in conformity with law, trust funds amounting to the sum of \$183,832.64, deposited by the several associations hereinafter named, for the benefit of their certificate holders. The securities and cash of each association on deposit, were examined and found to agree in character and amount, as shown by the State Treasurer in his report. The deposits are as follows :
